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Body Camera Laws Raise Questions about Access to Footage

In the wake of several high-profile incidents involving the injury or death of citizens during altercations with law enforcement, policymakers and the American public increasingly are calling for the use of body cameras by law enforcement officers. While support for such a requirement is strong and more police departments are expected to adopt body cameras, one question is fiercely divisive: Who should have access to footage recorded on police body cameras?

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Attacking the Opioid Crisis with Policies, Education

Opioid overdose deaths are on the rise across the United States, with overdose rates tripling since 2000. Driving the upward trajectory of overdose deaths are two interrelated trends, according to the CDC: the 15-year-long increase in deaths related to prescription pain relievers and a recent surge in illicit drugs, largely heroin and, more recently, fentanyl. State leaders and medical experts say the fight against drug abuse must be waged on many fronts.

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Pokémon Go Could Lure Voters in 2016 Election

Across the nation the Pokémon Go craze is sweeping people off their feet and out of their houses. Businesses have caught on, purchasing "lures" as a way to attract Pokémon creatures to their location—and to attract consumers to their business. In an election year in which both party's presidential nominees have unprecedented disapproval ratings, our nation's future could come down to voter turnout. And this has candidates wondering, can I catch more than Pokémon with a Pokémon lure—could I catch some voters, too?

States Combat Human Trafficking with Victim-Focused Legislation

During The Council of State Governments' eCademy webcast, "Human Trafficking—How States are Responding," panelists discussed legislation, task forces and funding to combat human trafficking at the state level. Human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery in which people, often children, are forced into sex work or other labor. The Polaris Project, a nonprofit organization that works to combat human trafficking, estimates that the number of adults and children being forced into labor in the United States numbers in the hundreds of thousands.

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Governors Salaries, 2016

The Council of State Governments has been collecting data on gubernatorial salaries for *The Book of the States* since 1937. The average governor's salary grew more slowly during and after the Great Recession, with many states instituting a ban on cost-of-living adjustments; however, as the fiscal health of states has improved, the annual increases normally seen in executive branch pay are returning to a more historically customary level in some states, particularly those that provide cost-of-living adjustments annually.

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Costs and Benefits of the Glen Canyon Dam

A new study conducted by the economic research group Power Consulting suggests that the overall costs of operating the Glen Canyon Dam on the Colorado River in northern Arizona may outweigh the benefits of increased electricity production. The Glen Canyon Dam, completed in 1963, was built to store and deliver water to the arid regions of the Lower Colorado River Basin, as well as provide electricity to surrounding regions and other selected contractors.

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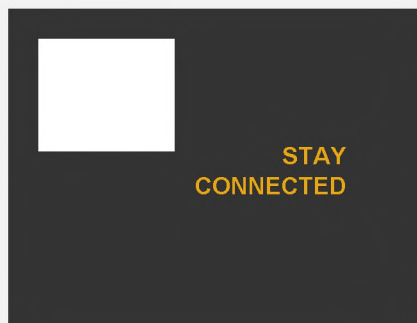
