Fifteenth Annual Wild Quail Management Seminars Scheduled

Bobwhite quail populations in South Carolina and the southeast have been declining steadily over the past 35-40 years due to land use change and reduction in suitable habitat. The 15th Annual Wild Quail Management Seminars, sponsored by the S.C. Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the S.C. State Committee of Quail Unlimited, are designed to instruct landowners and land managers in the proper techniques of creating habitat that will support native populations of bobwhite quail.

Two seminars will be conducted over a three-day period, March 7-9, 2002, at the Webb Wildlife Center in Hampton County. The registration fee is \$75 and includes meals, overnight accommodations and seminar materials.

"Properties that consistently carry medium-to high-density wild quail populations are actively managed to provide quail with all the habitat components necessary throughout the year," said Judy Barnes, DNR small game biologist. "These seminars are designed to improve quail habitat management skills and the information is presented so that anyone with an interest can implement these practices on their own property."

Field demonstrations and classroom instruction will focus on habitat practices including firebreak establishment, prescribed burning, timber management, brush control, discing for natural foods and supplemental food patch plantings. Presentations also will be given on wild quail natural history, biology, diseases and parasites, predation and other factors that may be contributing to the population decline. Speakers will include wildlife and forestry professionals from state and federal agencies.

Approximately 700 people have attended the seminar since its inception in 1987. These sportsmen and sportswomen have positively affected thousands of acres across South Carolina by applying basic techniques to improve habitat on their lands.

Pesticide Certification Exam Fees Increased

Budget cuts have forced Clemson University to increase fees charged for pesticide certification exams and to add a fee to take the pesticide applicator exam.

Examinees will also be required to prepay and pre-register two weeks prior to an exam session. The changes went into effect Jan. 1.

"The Department of Pesticide Regulation is unfortunately one of the victims of a significant statewide budget cut," said Neil Ogg, director of Regulatory and Public Service Programs. "These increases and new fee charges will allow us to maintain our current level of service to the pest control industry and to the people of South Carolina."

The private pesticide applicators license fee will increase from \$1 to \$2 per year, which is pro-rated and dependent on your certification block. The commercial applicators license fee and the pest control operators' business license fee will both double. The commercial applicators license fee will go up to \$50 and the operators' business license fee will increase to \$150.

The following changes and charges for the pesticide certification exam now apply:

1. Core exam: \$75
2. Category Exam: \$25
3. 12A, 12B, and 12D categories: \$50 each
4. Dealer exam: \$25
5. Pre-registration is required. Fees must be paid two weeks before an exam session. There will be no admittance to exam without prepayment.
6. Students, with proof of current ID, are only required to pay \$25.

"Though we recognize the inconvenience the license and exam fee will place on our clients," said Ogg, "without the additional funding, it will be difficult to maintain our day-to-day operations, which are stretched to the limit already."
