Rising Prescription Drug Costs Point to Drug Pricing Reform

On Sept. 21, news that Turing Pharmaceuticals raised the price of a 62-year-old drug by 4,000 percent overnight made headlines. The drug, Daraprim, is critical to the care of HIV and AIDS patients. The sharp rise in price from \$18 to \$750 per pill is part of the all-too-familiar trend of drug-price spiking in the U.S., a topic discussed by state legislators who gathered in Washington, D.C. Sept. 21-23 for the CSG Medicaid Leadership Policy Academy.

More Than 1 in 7 Americans Live in Poverty

According to new data from the U.S. Census Bureau, the official poverty rate in 2014 was 14.8 percent, which means a total of 46.7 million people in the U.S. fell under the poverty line. The poverty threshold for a single person under the age of 65 with no children was \$12,316 in 2014. For a family of four, the poverty threshold was \$24,230.

This year's HIV outbreak in Scott County, Ind., refocused public attention on HIV and AIDS as an ongoing public health issue. Time magazine featured the Indiana story on its June 15, 2015, cover.
