Mom to Trooper: 'Thanks for helping calm my autistic son'

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OKATIE, S.C. (WCIV) — When a mother and her autistic son were stranded on the side of Highway 170 with their disabled SUV, it was a South Carolina Highway Patrol Trooper who came to their rescue.

In a letter to the Highway Patrol, the woman described a Trooper who went above the call of duty to help her and her son stay safe and cool.

The woman says in the thank you letter to State Troopers that her son Jeriah is autistic and just wanted to make it home because he had been sick earlier in the day.

However, their SUV broke down while traveling on Highway 170 near Okatie, stranding them on a busy roadway. She said to make matters worse, not only was the SUV stuck in the roadway, the outside temperature was over 90 degrees.

"If any of you know Highway 170, it can be extremely dangerous when it's time for people to go to work or when they are getting off from work," she wrote. "My son was sitting in the seat nearest the highway and getting very antsy."

The mother called for roadside assistance, who forwarded the call to 911 since she was in a dangerous situation. Ten minutes later, Trooper L/Cpl. Adam Klimek of Troop Six arrived.

"To my son, he was just Officer Adam," she wrote. "After talking and laughing together for about 20 minutes he invited my son and I to get inside his SUV so that we could cool off."

She said Klimek also recognized her son's autism and pulled out a computer so Jeriah could watch *Curious George* in the air conditioned Trooper's SUV while they waited for the tow truck.

"This worked perfectly because it helped him focus on something else. My son was very happy and of course this was an experience that we will never forget," she said.

Klimek took the mother and son to a safe area once the tow truck arrived, and the woman asked Klimek for a photo with her son. But Klimek went just a bit further, giving Jeriah his hat and a badge.

"He also told him that he was officially a patrolman and to make sure that everyone in the car always buckle their seat belt. My son had a grin on his face about that," she wrote.

"As a mother of children with special needs it is very difficult to get the world to understand what we deal with from day to day. This was a very positive experience that I'd like to share."

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
