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Carolina Adventures

New River State Park **Jefferson, NC | Wild and Scenic**

On land or by water, make sure this family-friendly park and river are on your radar for a visit. Believed to be one of the oldest rivers in North America, the New River travels north toward its ultimate destination – the Gulf of Mexico, via the Ohio and Mississippi rivers. It's been that way for thousands of years, and because 26.5 miles of this water is protected as a Wild and Scenic, and the New River State Park accompanies the water with land as old as the hills, you've got a beautiful opportunity to enjoy the whole package.

The park offers camping and special events, including ecology hikes, guided tours, a traditional New Year's Day hike, and lots of nature excursions, both on and off the water. Ten marked trails within the park (some wheelchair accessible) allow families to follow markers and spend an hour or so enjoying nature at its finest (most are a mile or less, with round-trip and one-way options).

Trees include oaks, hickories, maples, pines and, in higher elevations, hemlocks. You'll see dogwood, sourwood and sassafras, as well as gum, yellow poplar, birch and black locust. Wildflowers are rampant. Look for huckleberries, mountain laurel and

hydrangeas. (Ask the ranger about the 14+ species of rare, threatened, or endangered plants in the valley.)

Be prepared to see red-tailed hawks, wild turkeys and dozens of birds. White-tailed deer are often visible but you probably won't spot a black bear. River otters, mink and muskrat may be encountered.

Canoes and kayaks can be rented from local outfitters, and when it's warm enough, the river sites come alive with happy tales of tubing with family and friends.

WOW Factor: Archeologists suggest humans have been here at least 10,000 years. Daniel Boone settled near here. The New River was named by Peter Jefferson, the father of Thomas Jefferson.

Native Americans hunted in the area and used the river for navigation. It's beautiful and relaxing and the flora and fauna are nothing short of spectacular.

Hint: From personal experience, wear long sleeves to tube. Your arms will thank you later. Take extra dry clothes and shoes. State parks are alcohol-free.

Carolina Famous Faces

Peggy Parish

Manning, South Carolina native Peggy Parish graduated from the University of South Carolina with a degree in English and taught for many years in Oklahoma, Kentucky and New York City. She began to write stories for children, as well as review children's books and lead training workshops for teachers. She had an instinctive gift and as her books were published, she began to receive letters of appreciation from children and their parents.

Her philosophy was that children will not read books in which they have no interest, and a love of reading must be in place by the time a child has finished third grade. She wrote a variety of children's books, but by far the most beloved was the series of Amelia Bedelia books, which included *Amelia Bedelia Helps Out*, and *Amelia Bedelia, The Surprise Shower*, among many others.

For those who never spent time with her quirky character, Amelia Bedelia worked as a housekeeper, where her literal take on instructions caused havoc in the home. (She dusts the furniture with dusting powder, for example, and sketches the drapes when asked to "draw" them.) In *Play Ball, Amelia*

Bedelia, the opportunities to confuse baseball terminology are many. (Think about running home, or stealing a base – taken literally.) What inevitably saved the day were the housekeeper’s amazing baking skills. Despite the mix-ups and confusion, her desserts were so delicious that employers simply could not let her go. Hundreds of thousands of children are glad she stayed on.

Peggy Parish eventually left New York and returned home to the small town of Manning, where she died in 1988, after suffering an aneurism. Her nephew, Herman Parish, has continued the *Amelia Bedelia* series, to the delight of children everywhere.

Amelia Bedelia is frequently cited as one of the reasons Wikipedia should be carefully checked before quoting. According to a number of sources, several college students ended an evening of recreational drug use by adding made-up “facts” to listings in Wikipedia. They focused on obscure authors, and among their antics, advised readers that *Amelia Bedelia* was based upon Ms. Parish’s encounters with a maid during time spent living in Cameroon, Africa. There was no time spent in Africa, and no maid. However, Internet browsers can still find this curious note in a variety of Internet listings, picked up as “fact.”

There were the early, small pieces that fit neatly on a pedestal, but soon, his “monumental scale environmental works” appeared, requiring truckloads of saplings, and volunteers to help the visions become reality. The world took notice.

The Mystery Fish Robust Redhorse (*Moxostoma robustum*)

Note: Our ongoing feature shares information about Carolinas endangered animals. Some are cuddly, others – not so much. All are important and the Wildlife Federations of both Carolinas are working hard to raise awareness of these important creature assets. Enjoy!

Since its discovery in 1869, much about the Robust Redhorse has remained a mystery. It wasn't until 1991, when many individual fish were captured in a Georgia river by biologists, that this freshwater fish began its recovery and has since been successfully restocked in rivers of Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

The Robust Redhorse provides an important ecological benefit for the rivers they inhabit; they feed on a very invasive species of bivalves called Asiatic clams. These clams reproduce rapidly and largely compete for food with the native species. Adult robust redhorse fish can reach up to 30 inches long and weigh as much as 17 pounds, though the average is 25 inches and 9 pounds.

Since these fish inhabit rivers with a heavy history of pollution and ruin, the robust redhorse continues to be threatened by human activity. They are also easily overlooked due to misidentification to other common, closely-related fish during fishing activities.
