When it opens, the port will begin handling an estimated 20,000 containers per year from BMW, by all accounts the reason the intermodal transfer facility is opening in the first place. A fivefold increase in volume over five years makes this facility a significant engine for the Upstate's economy. The importance of this region to the Port of Charleston is not lost on the Ports Authority. The volume of port business that originates in this part of the state is why the idea of an inland port was considered. As Newsome said in his presentation last week, the inland port was not a "build it and they will come" proposition.

The appointment of state Sen. Paul Campbell to head the Charleston County Aviation Authority didn't exactly bring the authority board together, as shown by its 7-6 vote to approve him for the job. But the former Alcoa executive says he is committed to winning over those who opposed him, and we hope he can bridge the divide. The authority has never been more important in the economic life of the Charleston metropolitan area. The Berkeley County Republican already has big challenges ahead of him in addition to the board. There is a major terminal expansion looming, a potential reconsideration of the sale of airport property to Boeing, and, for Mr. Campbell, a steep learning curve in a demanding job for which he has minimal aviation-related experience.

Union Pier handled 50,079 tons of non-containerized freight between April and June. The cargo of mostly steel wire rod and coils for tire production marked an 85 percent increase from the 27,109 tons of cargo handled in the preceding nine months of the fiscal year that ended June 30, SPA officials said today.

An ongoing trend of lower dropout rates in South Carolina's public schools is a positive sign that effective steps are being taken to ensure students finish high school. Success in reducing dropouts is vital because graduating from high school is an essential first stride toward some measure of financial stability for those who are growing up in the 21st century economy. According to data provided by the state Department of

Education, South Carolina's overall dropout rate has fallen to 2.5 percent in the 2011-12 school year from 3.9 percent in 2007-08. In raw terms, the number of students who have dropped out of school was 5,232 in the most recent school year compared to 8,032 in 2007-08.

Another factor is Duke's decision last year to adjust the location of the nuclear sites.

The military faces one of two options in order to meet mandatory across-the-board budget cuts, says Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel: chopping the number of personnel or limiting its technological edge. That might mean reducing as much as 29 percent of soldiers, 18 percent of Marines and three Navy carriers through 2019. The budget cuts, known as sequestration, have forced the Pentagon to craft a number of contingency plans, all of which Hagel says will affect readiness. At a news conference Wednesday, Hagel said there was a tradeoff between cutting either the number of personnel or modernization capabilities, and he stressed that Defense officials aren't yet sure which way it will go.
