Dear Dr. Burton:

Deanna and Breanna Talley are 12-year-old and 8-year-old African American asthmatics respectively. Both have been on multiple bursts of oral steroids, inhaled corticosteroids, Leukotriene antagonists, short-acting Beta agonists, and nasal steroids. Breanna was hospitalized in April 2007 for status asthmaticus and respiratory distress. I have tried numerous combinations of inhaled corticosteroids without stabilization of their asthma. When this occurred, I did ask their mother to begin Advair, an inhaled corticosteroid and lava combination. We are currently explaining to parents the black box indication for Advair as well as other combination drugs, and, because of the increased deaths in African Americans, their mother has refused for them to take this particular medication. Although Symbicort does have a black box warning, their mother does not have strong negativism toward this product because it was not involved in the Smart Study.

I have previously tried to get Breanna approved for Symbicort with prior authorization. I have met with strong resistance because Advair has not been tried first. I have tried to explain to the pre-authorization people that I cannot force the mothers to give medications to their children that they are not comfortable with. I could be less than honest and have her fill Advair and then report that the drug did not work, but that would be unethical. The older sister, Deanna, has recently had multiple episodes of asthma flares and has now been given samples of Symbicort due to repeated bursts of steroids. I have been able to provide samples at the present time; however, one never knows if there will be delays in shipment or backorders. It is not my understanding there is a possibility this particular drug will be reviewed by Medicaid in May. I would appreciate consideration for these two young ladies being pre-authorized for Symbicort at this time.

As a parent, I do not feel I can force another parent to use a drug they are uncomfortable with even if they are on assistance from the state. I feel that prior authorization for Symbicort is less costly than hospitalization or even considering Xolair.

Thank you for corresponding regarding these patients. I have held several discussions with our pharmacy professional colleagues at the South Carolina Medicaid Agency (DHHS). We are all in agreement that a one-time exception to the coverage guidelines can be permitted in this case. You have given a very detailed explanation as to why it is clinically appropriate in this case to prescribe Symbicort as opposed to Advair. Please proceed to have this family get these prescriptions filled at their chosen pharmacy. If there are any problems, please have the pharmacy call Mr. Mike Blakely at 803-898-2872.

Please note, however, that I could not determine that the two drug combination differed from a clinical perspective. Both have very similar ingredients. We are granting this exception to promote compliance for these children in regards to their asthma therapy.

Thank you again for your very thorough explanation of why this substitution is reasonable in this unique circumstance.
