New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, a Republican, drew praise in his home state for physically embracing President Barack Obama after superstorm Sandy slammed into the Jersey Shore days before the 2012 election. In South Carolina, some felt differently.

**Note:** Mr. Christie's South Carolina visit will complete an early presidential trifecta this year: he has already visited Iowa and New Hampshire as chairman of the Republican Governors Association, and plans to go back to New Hampshire on Wednesday. He appears here Tuesday with Gov. Nikki Haley, who is expected to easily win re-election.
