Col. Asa C. Matthews, appointed a few weeks earlier to negotiate a peace with the Indians. Watie was the last Confederate general officer to stop fighting the Union Army in the Civil War, He signed a peace treaty as to Indian nations and the Union Army of America.

When it comes to American history, one shoe does not fit all. The American Indians had good reason to join the Confederate side in the Civil War, the federal government! And under the American flag that was brought into their villages, federal soldiers killed men, women and children, taking their land and way of life. Racism has no color and it's a two-way street. My progenitor came to the US as an Indentured Servant, a polite way to say he was a slave. He and his son fought in the Revolutionary War. The students at James Simons are in such a unique situation to learn things from each other. Our primary Montessori

classrooms (3,4 and 5 year olds) are the most diverse. When I go into those classrooms to teach classroom guidance lessons, one thing is perfectly clear. they do not see color. It is a beautiful thing to witness and experience. I have been pondering ways to enhance my guidance lessons. I hope to guide the students toward seeing diversity as an opportunity to learn things about each other that you would never learn otherwise. I am a living example of that. I have learned so much from the African American community. and have been very affected by the recent tragedy. As a very young Caucasian woman. I was accepted by a community that nurtured and taught me things I would have never learned otherwise. When the victim's families displayed amazing grace at the bond hearing. I was wasn't surprised at all, for I have been the recipient of this type of love and acceptance.

Finally, I saw your interview on "Today" with Craig Melvin. I am looking forward to next week and pray that the flag issue will be resolved at last. Also. Mr. Melvin mentioned after the interview that you will spend time during the remainder of your term visiting schools. We would be so honored for you to visit our beautiful new building and speak with our diverse population of students. I appreciate you consideration and we would all be humbly honored.

I am going to be very blunt here, I am going to be brutally honest here with my remarks. Yes, I admit that there were sadly many plantations, as well other prominent land owners and other business owners and the average citizen family farm owner of the time whom were spread across the southern states which treated these people very badly and even the housing for those whom were treated as sub-human slaves were just barely adequate to even give shelter to a cockroach let alone to provide shelter to a human being. In these types of conditions to be honest I cannot imagine what it would had been like to have had lived in these types of conditions, including to have be branded, whipped with instruments known throughout history as "The cat with nine tails," and was also known as "The cat o' nine tails." During the infamous Atlantic slave trade while aboard ship the whip was kept stored inside a bag and when the slaves were beaten the whip was known by the slaves as "The cat was let out of the bag." Then there are other issues (too many to list), such as having to be chained down most of your life in order to hopefully keep you from escaping from the plantations and then there

were false formal marriage ceremonies for slave couples which were generally reserved for house servants (many of these slave marriage ceremonies for other slaves were false and immediately afterwards one of the slave partners were immediately sold to another plantation owner or to another farm owner). With "jumping the broom" marriages, slave-owners would have a white minister or a black plantation preacher perform the ceremony and a large feast and dance in the quarters would follow honoring the slave couple. The ceremony could include the slave marriage ritual of "jumping the broom," which required the slave couples to both jump over a broomstick. The custom of jumping the broom could vary from plantation to plantation. On some farms, the slave bride and slave groom would place separate brooms on the floor in front of each other. The couple would then step across the brooms at the same time joining hands to signal that they were truly married. On other farms, each slave partner was required to jump backwards over a broom held at a height of one foot above the ground. If either one of the partners failed to clear the broom successfully, then the other partner would be declared the one who would rule or boss the slave household. If both of the partners cleared the broom without touching it, then there would be no "bossin" allowed with in the slave household.

Honorable Governor Nikki Haley, it deeply saddens me to have heard about what that punk did down in Charleston, South Carolina, to those 9 innocent individuals including then Senior Pastor and South Carolina State Senator Clementa C. The seventeenth amendment effectively removed the direct control from the States in choosing Senators and has left the States as simply another block of voters to entertain at election time without threat of removal from their seat. So I ask why would you honorable South Carolinians not support the repeal of the seventeenth amendment to restore her influence in the US Senate. On another point, removing all religion and morality from the argument I ask the following question of why a politician would support rouge court decision such as Roe vs. Wade that has eliminated millions of voters from the equation since 1973 or the recent decision of gay marriage that by the laws of nature cannot create a future voter?

The above ideas and comments may seem controversial in today's politically correct world but I offer them up as clear logic that was used by our founding fathers to create the genius that is the US Constitution. We have a way to right the ship. I ask that you support the State Convention movement and help foster amendments that will help South Carolina and the morality of our great country. Our school, which was built in 1919, was deemed unsafe in the event of an earthquake. We were relocated to a temporary location in North Charleston for 3 1/2 year during the rebuilding process. Also, we transitioned to a Montessori choice school. During this time, the neighborhood surrounding our school has also experienced changing demographics. For the first twenty five years I was teaching at [REDACTED], the population of the students was 100% African American. We returned to our beautiful new building in January of 2014 and a beautiful thing has transpired. The student population a now a sea of diversity, both racially and socially. The students at [REDACTED] are in such a unique situation to learn things from each other. Our primary Montessori

classrooms (3,4 and 5 year olds) are the most diverse. When I go into those classrooms to teach classroom guidance lessons, one thing is perfectly clear, they do not see color. It is a beautiful thing to witness and experience. I have been pondering ways to enhance my guidance lessons. I hope to guide the students toward seeing diversity as an opportunity to learn things about each other that you would never learn otherwise. I am a living example of that. I have learned so much from the African American community, and have been very affected by the recent tragedy. As a very young Caucasian woman, I was accepted by a community that nurtured and taught me things I would have never learned otherwise. When the victim's families displayed amazing grace at the bond hearing, I was wasn't surprised at all, for I have been the recipient of this type of love and acceptance.

Finally, I saw your interview on "Today" with Craig Melvin. I am looking forward to next week and pray that the flag issue will be resolved at last. Also, Mr. Melvin mentioned after the interview that you will spend time during the remainder of your term visiting schools. We would be so honored for you to visit our beautiful new building and speak with our diverse population of students. I appreciate you consideration and we would all be humbly honored.
