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Pharmacy Costs Work Group Releases Findings as Part of #NASHPconf16

Last week in Pittsburgh, as part of our Annual State Health Policy Conference, NASHP released [findings](#) from our Pharmacy Costs Work Group that outlines 11 solutions for reining in pharmaceutical costs. The solutions offered in the newly released [findings](#) serve as a toolbox for states.

The findings outline 11 specific proposals:

1. Leveraging transparency to create public visibility and accountability;
2. Creating a public utility model for oversight of in-state drug prices;
3. Bulk purchasing and distributing high-priced, broadly-indicated drugs that protect the public's health;
4. Utilizing state unfair trade practices law;
5. Seeking the ability to re-import drugs from Canada on a State-by-State basis;
6. Pursuing Medicaid waivers and legislative changes to promote greater purchasing flexibility;
7. Enabling state action as a PBM;
8. Pursuing return on investment (ROI) pricing and forward financing as a PBM;
9. Ensuring state participation in Medicare Part D as Employer Group Waiver Plans;
10. Protecting consumers against misleading marketing; and
11. Exerting active shareholder roles in state pension funds to influence pharmaceutical company actions.

Upcoming CMS Webinar: Identification and Stratification of Medicaid Beneficiaries

Medicaid IAP seeks to improve the care and health for Medicaid beneficiaries and reduce costs by supporting states' ongoing payment and delivery system reforms through targeted technical support. Many Medicaid programs across the country are focusing attention on improving the care of their Medicaid beneficiaries with complex needs that are driving high, but potentially avoidable costs.

As part of the Medicaid Innovation Accelerator Program's (IAP) Medicaid Beneficiaries with Complex Needs and High Costs (BCN) program, CMCS has been working with five states (District of Columbia, New Jersey, Oregon, Texas, and Virginia) since October 2015. As work continues with these states, IAP BCN is launching a four-part national dissemination webinar series highlighting lessons learned and sharing resources; these webinars are open to all states and interested stakeholders. The first of the national dissemination webinar series kicks off on **October 31st from 2:00 pm to 3:30 pm ET** with a focus on ***Identification and Stratification of Medicaid Beneficiaries with Complex Needs and High Costs***. During this webinar states will learn about the different types of data and data analytics often involved in the design and implementation of BCN initiatives (i.e., profiling, hot spotting, impactable assessment, risk stratification). Participants will hear from two subject matter experts:

- Tracy Johnson, PhD, Director of Health Care Reform Initiatives for Denver Health.
