WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House says that President Barack Obama will expand a national monument on the island of Hawaii, creating the world's largest marine protected area. Obama's proclamation will quadruple in size a monument created by President George W. Bush in 2006. The Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument will contain 563,000 square miles, more than twice the size of Texas.
