South Carolina's unemployment rate continued a nearly yearlong decline last month, falling for the 10th month in a row, state officials said Friday. The state's jobless rate was 5.5 percent in March, according to the Department of Employment and Workforce. That's down from 5.7 percent in February and is the lowest South Carolina's statewide unemployment has been since March 2008.

South Carolina's jobless rate hit historic lows in March. The unemployment rate fell from February's rate of 5.7 percent to 5.5 percent — the lowest it's been in six years, according to the state Department of Employment Workforce.

More than two-thirds of the states reported job gains in March, as hiring has improved for much of the country during what has been a sluggish but sustained 4 1/2-year recovery. The Labor Department said Friday that unemployment rates dropped in 21 states, rose in 17 and were unchanged in the remaining 12.
