The word palliative means to “lessen the severity of without curing; to alleviate.” This type of care is considered to be a form of pain management, also referred to as supportive care, given throughout all stages of cancer or other life-threatening diseases. For example, a person who is receiving cancer treatment may experience nausea and vomiting as a side effect. Treating the symptoms of nausea and vomiting throughout chemo or radiation is considered to be palliative care, easing the symptoms and side effects, but not providing an actual cure for the disease. Aside from easing physical pain, one of the primary goals of palliative care is to help improve the quality-of-life for a loved one and their family. By trying to incorporate the total person in meeting their social, emotional and spiritual needs, palliative care is meant to be a relief of symptoms, rather than a cure. [...more](#)
