How many dolphins did I just see? One way to figure out how many individual dolphins you are observing is to look at their dorsal fin (fin on their back). Scientists use dorsal fins to identify individual dolphins. Some fins are smooth and sleek, while others are ratty and scarred. Bottlenose dolphins frequent our waters year round. Their numbers peak in the fall when groups of dolphins migrate to South Carolina and further south for the winter.
