### *Breaking News - Gobeille v. Liberty Mutual: Defeat for State All-Payer Claims Databases*

In a **6-2 decision** released today, the U.S. Supreme Court has dealt a blow to state all-payer claims databases. By upholding a lower court's decision, the Court ruled that states may no longer require self funded plans to submit claims data – that action is preempted by ERISA. In its decision in *Gobeille v. Liberty*

*Mutual*, the Court was unpersuaded by the arguments presented by Vermont and the 11 amicus briefs filed in support of that state's position. Indeed the Court concluded that "[P]reemption is necessary to prevent States from imposing novel, inconsistent and burdensome reporting requirements on plans." [Read the full blog](#) .
