A criminal probe by state and federal investigators is continuing to determine who hacked into South Carolina Department of Revenue files in 2012, exposing millions of taxpayers' personal data, and one federal official Wednesday called it a "priority investigation."

**Note:** Doug Mayer, a spokesman for Haley, said the governor "continues to work with law enforcement officials to bring the criminal who attacked our state to justice, and can assure the public that the minute we know exactly who was responsible for this attack and have him or her in custody, they will be the very first to know."
