The State Budget and Control Board met in the Conference Room of the Governor's Office in the Wade Hampton Office Building at 11:00 A. M., Tuesday, April 27, 1965, with all members of the Board present. Also attending were Messrs. J. M. Smith, State Auditor, P. C. Smith, Assistant, Furman McEachern, Director of the Division of General Services, and Tatum Gressette, Director of the State Retirement System.

On April 22, 1965 Governor Donald S. Russell resigned and was immediately succeeded by Lieutenant Governor Robert E. McNair.

This meeting was called by newly inaugurated Governor McNair for a general discussion of Board policies and procedures.

No business was brought up for action and the meeting adjourned at 11:30 A. M.

RUTLEDGE BUILDING

Remembering her hazardous beginnings as a free and independent State, South Carolina in naming this mighty building pays tribute to two of her patriot sons, brothers who nourished and sustained her in the days of her weakness.

JOHN RUTLEDGE, 1739-1800

President of South Carolina, 1776-1778, Governor at home and in exile, 1779-1782, Signer of the U. S. Constitution, 1787, Chief Justice of the State, 1791-1795, and of the United States, 1795.

EDWARD RUTLEDGE, 1749-1800

Signer of the Declaration of Independence, 1776, Captain of Artillery and Lieutenant-Colonel, wounded and taken prisoner in the defense of liberty, 1779-1781, member of the General Assembly, 1782-1798, Governor, 1798-1800.
