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Governor Nikki Haley News:

The State: Gov. Nikki Haley says she is setting her own agenda in State of the Union response

Gov. Nikki Haley said Thursday she plans to address the challenges in South Carolina and the nation that she thinks are the most important in her Republican response to President Barack Obama's State of the Union address next week.

Note: Haley declined to reveal details of what she plans to say, except to repeat that she is giving an "address" to the nation rather a "response" to Obama.

Note: "I certainly am not one to compete against the president or try to imply that I could be," Haley told reporters. "I just wanted to take this as an opportunity to express the challenges that I think we have seen in our state but also in our country and the solutions ... and the opportunities that can be there.

Note: "This will be very much just an address that allows me to talk to the country in a way that I think talks about things that I believe are important."

Post and Courier: Gov. Nikki Haley proposal adds 144 prosecutors statewide to deal with domestic violence cases

Gov. Nikki Haley wants to spend \$19 million to hire 144 prosecutors so that police officers no longer are the ones prosecuting domestic violence cases in South Carolina. Haley unveiled a number of requests and executive orders in a press conference Thursday aimed at reducing instances of domestic violence in South Carolina, which has been ranked No. 1 in the nation for the rate of women murdered by men.

Note: "I was mortified when I learned that law enforcement (officers) were the ones that were prosecuting these cases," Haley said.

Note: Haley said the state needs to change the culture in the way it handles domestic violence cases. "You have to fix it from the ground up, there has to be a culture change," she said. "If we really are going to have the backs of the people who have to deal with domestic violence then we need to have the culture in the way we communicate it. These people are not victims. They are survivors."

Progress is being made in South Carolina's fight against domestic violence, but more time is needed to study the problem and come up with ways to combat it, Gov. Nikki Haley said Thursday. At a Statehouse news conference, Haley told reporters she has signed three new executive orders pertaining to the issue, which was a major topic during last year's legislative session.

Note: Haley also said that her executive budget for the coming year would allocate funding to help combat the problem, including about \$19 million to fund new prosecutors to handle domestic violence cases, many of which are now prosecuted by law enforcement officers, who are often going up against privately funded attorneys on the defense side.

Note: "I was mortified when I learned that it was law enforcement who were prosecuting these cases," Haley said.

A bill to increase the state's gas tax is among the first issues that the state Senate will take up when lawmakers return to Columbia Tuesday.

Note: However, Democrats likely will fight a large income tax cut, which Republican Gov. Nikki Haley has demanded as part of a roads deal.

Despite claims that movement on a roads bill will be quick, there was plenty of division among lawmakers Thursday. State Sen. Tom Davis, R-Beaufort, who filibustered the road funding bill last year, said the Senate could return the bill to the House as early as February if a consensus on reforms, funding and tax relief is reached soon after the legislative session reconvenes Tuesday.

Note: Gov. Nikki Haley said she'll sign off on a gas tax increase only if it includes a two percentage point income tax rate reduction. The reduction is not part of any proposal.
