Thank you for sending your Flat Stanley to visit me in South Carolina. Stanley and I had a great time touring the Statehouse and Governor's Mansion.

The state flag is based on a design by Colonel William Moultrie in 1775 for use by South Carolina troops during the Revolutionary War. Colonel Moultrie chose a blue color which matched the color of their uniforms and a crescent which reproduced the silver emblem worn on the front of their caps. The palmetto tree symbolized Colonel Moultrie's heroic defense of the palmetto-log fort on Sullivan's Island against the attack of the British fleet.

The state flower is the Yellow Jessamine, as it is indigenous to every part of the State. It is a climbing woody vine with evergreen leaves and blooms small, yellow, tubular, fragrant clusters. The state bird is the Carolina Wren, which is also found all over South Carolina. It is a small bird with a reddish-brown body, black tail, and a conspicuous white stripe over the eyes. The song of the wren sounds like "*tea-ket-tle, tea-ket-tle, tea-ket-tle*" and may be heard year-round, day and night, and in all kinds of weather.
