#### **Florence Morning News:** Haley stops in Pee Dee for disaster relief event

During a Monday morning visit in Kingstree, Gov. Nikki Haley helped pack disaster relief kits and talked to local flood victims about their options for repairing damages done to their property during the “1,000-year flood.” The event, held at the Williamsburg County Recreational Complex, was a part of Haley’s “Team South Carolina” initiative, aimed at providing resources to families and businesses impacted by flooding across the state.

**Note:** “Team South Carolina is out to help everybody, and we’re not going to stop until we come out of this stronger than when we started,” Haley said. “We’re going to keep coming back to these areas until they feel like they’re on their feet again.”

**Note:** “There is a real need out there, and I will tell you we have done a great job with debris removal and getting our roads back open, but turn into a neighborhood and you’ll see devastation real quick,” Haley said. “If you are a person who has been blessed, pay it forward and go help these people rebuild.”

Over 3,000 households have already signed up for FEMA assistance in Clarendon County. Mike Wade with FEMA says they've presented over \$50 million for the state, but leaders here say there's still a lot of need. On Monday, Governor Nikki Haley helped put care packages together during the Team South Carolina event in Manning, a one-stop resource center for that Haley has been hosting across the region.

**Note:** “We’ve got some still water laying on the ground we’ve got some mosquito problems, we’ve got mosquito trucks coming in this area from other counties, then we’ve also got a lot of people in need. So if you see we’re doing free tetanus shots, we’re making sure we have cleaning kits for everybody, we’ve got food supplies, we’ve got dippers all those things just to help them get on their feet. Then we want them to register with FEMA” said Haley.

On Monday, two Team South Carolina flood relief events took place in the lower Pee Dee that Governor Nikki Haley attended. One of the events was in Manning while the other was in Kingstree.

**Note:** She slipped right in and spent the morning packing supply boxes and talking to people. “I don’t mind taking pictures but we got a job to do. And my job is not just behind the desk my job is to make sure they are packing boxes and that we are getting this out to the people,” Haley said.

**Note:** “We are going to keep coming to these areas until they feel like they are back on their feet again. And this is happening faster than we hoped, but it is not fast enough for me,” explained Haley.

#### **Manning Live:** Haley: Help on the way for ‘mosquito problem’

Gov. Nikki Haley said during a stop Monday in Manning that two teams from outside of Clarendon County came in Monday and will be in the county Tuesday to combat the county’s ongoing mosquito problem. The

critters have gotten worse since the 1,000-year flood that caused other problems with infrastructure and homes throughout Clarendon and other hard-hit areas in the state.

**Note:** Haley's stop was part of the Team South Carolina event hosted at the Clarendon County Community Center behind Weldon Auditorium. The event served as a "one-stop" for those in need of relief from the recent torrential downpour that put more than 20 inches of rain on Clarendon County in a three-day span in early October. "This is South Carolina working together," Haley said. "We want people to know that, if you didn't have any damages, please pay your blessings forward. But if you do have damage, you don't have to come to us. We will come to you."

**Note:** Haley said she understands that South Carolina residents are "frustrated with the process (of filing for federal aid)."

**Note:** "But we know there are proper steps that you have to go through," she said. "We want you to apply with FEMA whether or not you have insurance or whether or not you're a small business."

South Carolina's leaders are again asking the state Supreme Court to throw out a deadline for the Legislature to come up with a plan for improving schools in poorer, rural areas. A month ago, justices gave lawmakers until Feb. 1 to produce a plan for providing students with a constitutionally mandated adequate education.

**Note:** Legislative leaders and Gov. Nikki Haley have said they could not meet the deadline, calling it "arbitrary," arguing that the Supreme Court is violating the separation of powers doctrine with its Sept. 24 order and was failing to take into account the time needed to pass legislation.
