Onenl Christoball Begonias belong to the genus *Begonia* (including *Semibegoniella* and *Begoniella*). With over 900 species, they represent almost all of the family *Begoniaceae*. Tubers mainly from South America and Central America, some species also grow in tropical Africa or Southeast Asia. The name was given in the seventeenth century a plant native to the Caribbean by a French botanist, Father Charles Plumier in honor of Michel Begon, the governor of Santo Domingo (1680) and Intendant of the Marine in Rochefort (Charente-Maritime) (1688) which is currently the National Conservatory of begonia. Since the eighteenth century, many species (*B. Pearce*, *B. boliviensis*, etc..) Were used to obtain thousands of horticultural varieties (plant borders or apartment) whose flowers form large colored pompoms white, red or yellow velvet accented by large, dark foliage. Two main groups can be distinguished into seven subgroups. François Félix Crousse (1840-1925), horticulturist from 1863 to 1904, was the world specialist begonia and created hundreds of varieties in its claws located at the site of the present Begonia Street in Nancy.
