Design Principles for HCBS Case Mix: A Primer

The University of Michigan Institute of Gerontology released a project about case mix payment design for Home and Community Based Services as part of a grant from the Centers for Medicare

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& Medicaid Services. The Primer is a design guide for state policy makers who are considering acuity-based resource allocation. Included in the report is: background information on different HCBS case mix approaches, the steps in the development of a case-mix resource allocation system, essential decision points to consider during the state policy development process, and best practice recommendations. This Primer is recommended as a tool for policy makers, state staff, and stakeholders to better understand the basic components of case mix.

Federal Grants Awarded to States to Bolster Adult Protective Services Programs

In 2011, a GAO report placed elder abuse in the public eye. To continue this fight, the Administration for Community Living (ACL) is awarding the first-ever federal grants that are specifically designated to improve the Adult Protective Service Systems in the states. The grants are being awarded to Alabama, Colorado, the District of Columbia, Illinois, Iowa, Massachusetts, New York, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Washington, and will total up to \$2.8 million for up to two years. Walter R. McDonald & Associates, Inc. is also receiving a grant for almost \$850,000 to provide support to state grant recipients and to manage ACL's National Adult Protective Services Resource Center.

ACL Announces "No Wrong Door" Grant Awardees

The Administration for Community Living (ACL) awarded almost \$5 million in grants to 13 states to advance the development of their "No Wrong Door" systems. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and the Veteran's Health Administration (VHA) have an ongoing partnership that is supporting these grants. Eight of the states, Connecticut, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Oregon, Vermont, Washington, and Wisconsin, already have "No Wrong Door" systems in place and this funding will help them to advance their initiatives. The remaining five states, Alabama, Colorado, District of Columbia, Hawaii, and Virginia, are launching new initiatives. Each grantee is taking a different approach to the system in their state, which will help other states to find the best options for their populations of older adults and people with disabilities.

Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services

Final Rule to Advance Electronic Health Records

On Tuesday, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and the Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) released the final rule for 2015 Edition Health IT Certification Criteria (2015 Edition) and the final rule with comment period for the Medicare and Medicaid Electronic Health Records (EHRs) Incentive Programs. These final rules simplify requirements and add flexibility to provide electronic health information for health care providers and consumers in the exchange of information. The final rule seeks to move the industry of health care away from a paper-based system where important data can be lost. CMS and ONC are seeking public input on the Medicare and Medicaid Electronic Health Records. The proposed rule has been published in the Federal Register with a 60-day comment period. All comments must be submitted by **Tuesday, December 29, 2015, at 5 p. m. ET.**

Comments Needed on New Payment System to Improve Health Care for People with Disabilities

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) is considering alternative methods to pay healthcare providers. They are seeking public input through a Request for Information (RFI) on implementing a Merit-based Incentive Payment System (MIPS). Additionally, CMS is considering offering reimbursement to providers for improving quality, accessibility, and health care outcomes for specific populations that face barriers to care. Stakeholders are encouraged to comment with positive and negative feedback that will influence the payment approach CMS and Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Burwell will adopt. The proposed rule has been published in the Federal Register with a 60-day comment period. All comments must be submitted by **Monday, November 2, 2015, at 5 p.m.**
