## Rebecca Lynn Watson Personal Statement

Its 12:30 AM and the squeals of twelve little girls drown out the sound of the crickets in the nearby woods. Welcome to my life as a Girl Scout Assistant Camper Director. I have wrangled thousand plus pound horses through knee deep mud and hail while riding the high school rodeo circuit, had my roping horse flip over on top of me when the cow stopped under her, yup, I thought I could handle just about anything but apparently wrangling twelve little girls who are shrieking because they think spiders are in their cots is like herding cats.

Starting my first year at Clemson University I thought I was prepared, after all, this was the second mile in my 5k of living my dream since age 3 of becoming a veterinarian. I had lived through some tough times that made me a strong person like these four life-changing events: getting mauled in the face by a dog and having plastic surgery to repair the damage, living through a fire that burned down our community center while I was inside, having taken some spills on my rodeo horses that others came away with serious injuries and a few did not survive from, and helping my mom care for my grandfather who nearly died of a blood clot eight years ago. So I thought college was no problem, a "walk in the park". What I did not count on was a serious case of nerves that almost sent me "running for the hills" and staying home. It caught me quite by surprise because I was always someone to meet a crisis head on and no challenge ever seemed too big. I had always used our high school Cross Country motto, "Don't chase your dreams, run them down!" and here I was stopping in the middle of the race. I guess the cliché is true, I was a big fish in a little pond in high school and a little fish in a big pond in college and that thought terrified me. But like in any race when you feel like you cannot take another step, I put my foot forward and looked ahead.

Through all my life experiences with animals from growing up on a farm, providing daily care, the many hours spent being mentored and working for several veterinarians I learned basic skills such as physical assessment, blood drawing, in-house blood and specimen testing, reading x-rays, restraint during physical exams for all animals, giving injections and even suturing my own horse when she cut a gaping hole in her muscle under the instruction of my veterinarian has matured me and given me the discipline to reach my goal of becoming a veterinarian. As a long time animal owner, I bring compassion for both animals and their owners because I know the heartbreak of losing beloved pets. However, I have also witnessed the gratification in the eyes of a child when their pet survives, and the relief on the farmer's face when his livelihood has been restored by the quality care and management of his livestock from his trusted veterinarian. You will find that I am natural leader with the capacity to be a good team player without appearing presumptuous, not only diligent and lively, but I can multi-task with ease, am a dedicated student, have sharp business and finance skills, have good customer service and communication skills, quick decision-making, time management skills and can even wrangle twelve squealing little girls.

In pursuing this career, my objective is to provide a rural area practice with affordable veterinarian care and to open a 24/7 emergency clinic. This arises from there not being any emergency clinics or

veterinary offices that provide round the clock care. My county has a high kill shelter, a policy which they are slowly trying to change. I would like to focus on educating the community as to the importance of the spaying and neutering of pets while striving to make it affordable to all.

With a degree in veterinary medicine I can use my passion for giving back to my community to affect not only animals, but also people through education of quality animal care and the lifetime commitment of owning an animal. Growing and maturing through all the life experiences that I have had, I now feel prepared for the dedication of veterinary school and for a career in veterinary medicine. It takes a calm level head, determination, and sometimes the nerves of steel to become and be a veterinarian. By choice I am not "running for the hills", I am lacing up my favorite trainers for the final mile, with each stride I take in life I am one step closer to the finish line of running down my dream, as Dr. Rebecca Lynn Watson, DVM.

Rebecca Watson

My definition of resiliency is to continue your passion against all odds no matter how much the world tells you that you cannot do it.

As a child my pony and grandmother passed away. Even at age six I was determined to remember both of them and her desire for me to ride. So as a little girl I would sit in the stands and watch the pretty girls with fast horses run by me at the SC High School Rodeo and I had stars in my eyes. When I rolled up in my little trailer and \$500 horse, here came your average middle class income family but the group I was competing with had horses over \$75,000, trainers and stable hands, some of them changed horses like I change clothes. I was in over my league financially, but not in southern girl grit. So for four seasons, I put that grit and resiliency to being competitive and every year placed in the top ten to fifteen in my categories of Pole Bending, Barrel Racing, Goat Tying and Breakaway Roping in the state. When I wanted to compete in the Queens contest for rodeo, that required a trained horse in reigning pattern. So, I trained my horse to do it as well. The other contestants has a horse for each division. I learned that in life someone will always have more funds or opportunities than you but what you do with what you have been given determines how well you will perform in life. I could have said well I do not have the best of everything so I will not compete but I said no me and my horse have just as much heart and determination as the others.

When I was trapped in our burning community center, that killed one firefighter, I took it all in stride. I was never afraid or when I was mauled in the face by a dog and had to have extensive plastic surgery I didn't run and hide. I continued my dream of being the veterinarian just like I always had before the attack. When competing in rodeo/horse shows I took some serious spills and hobble away with minor injuries, some of my competitors where not that lucky, some with serious injuries and one death. My huge roping horse flipped over on me when a calf stopped under her and the only thing that saved me was my head ended up on under the saddle. The crowd jumped to their feet as I laid there lifeless but came too and got up and tended my horse. Then there were other incidents, one of which when I was performing and my horse lost her footing and rolled over my leg and ankle. It was intense pain but I vet wrapped the foot and ankle and rode without a stirrup to finish all the events for the evening and keep my high point status for the season. During my Cross Country and Track and Field career I endured many knee injuries and even a sliding growth plate in my hip but was determined to carry my team to the state finals because I was one of our top runners.

At Salkehatchie Summer Service, I seemed to take on the impossible houses. One particular house was very bad. We had worked most of the week with little progress and the adult site leader wanted to quit. Even though I was only sixteen I said no, I am staying to finish. We rallied the whole camper of sixty to come work late into the night to finish the home. The next year we found out the house had a leaking roof so one other girl and myself raised the \$2,000, organized volunteers and returned to give her a brand new roof. At Girl Scouts, my troop of seven girls including myself raised over \$14,000 of materials and labor to build a storage shed and picnic shelter for the Connie Maxwell Children's home. We actually built of it ourselves, except for the concrete pad and shingles where labor was donated.

So as you can see no is not in my vocabulary or life. To me it is important to be resilient because that carries you through the hard times and when people tell you that you cannot accomplish your goals. I believe my resilient nature will carry me through veterinary school and beyond because in life you can never give up, even when others believe it is impossible.
