The Commission agreed to supply \$2,000.00 to General Homes B. Springs, Director of State Selective Service, to be used in preparing and printing a history of the Administration of the Selective Service System in this State from its inception in September, 1940 to the date when the agency will be terminated. The Secretary was directed to advise General Springs to forward such bills to the Commission for payment, as the work progressed.

The Commission agreed to provide as much as \$500.00 for a State float to be entered in the Azalea Festival in Charleston on April 22nd. Mr. R. M. Cooper was designated by the Commission to arrange for this float and to have charge of other details in connection with the Festival as far as the State of South Carolina is concerned.
