
Keynote Presentations

Pat Kelsaw - A California native, Pat earned a BA in communications and a teaching credential from the University of California, Davis. As an elementary school teacher, Pat taught in the Rio Linda (Sacramento area) and Los Angeles Unified School Districts. Being a passionate advocate for youth, families and communities inspired Pat to return to school to obtain a Masters in Social Welfare from U.C. Berkeley. Working in maternal and child health for over 25 years, Pat received numerous commendations for her paid and volunteer work with community health programs. As a grant writer and a former program officer, Pat has garnered over \$2.5 million in funds for community initiatives and programs. As a training associate with Leading To Change, Pat has presented across the country to youth and adult audiences, including the Alabama Community Educators Association, California/Sierra Health Foundation Youth Summit, and South Carolina Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy. Prior to joining the LTC staff, Pat was the executive director for an adolescent health clinic in Rock Hill, SC. To fortify her love for teaching, she works as an adjunct instructor for several local colleges in the Carolinas.



Ahmed Touré is an alumni of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and at age 25, has spoken to over a hundred events, touring from New York City to Los Angeles and almost everywhere in between. A native of New York with ties to the Ivory Coast, he brings the Rockstar element to his sessions by engaging the audience and inspiring them to aspire. Within the past year he's inducted thousands of teachers, managers, supervisors and other professionals into the "Rockstar Lifestyle". DR. TAMMY PAWLOSKI

Tammy Pawloski grew up in the impoverished areas of rural Horry and Allendale counties of South Carolina, and, after earning an undergraduate degree in early childhood education from USC-Aiken, she returned to the region to teach kindergarten, first, fourth and fifth grades. Pawloski earned her Ph.D. from the University of South Carolina in 1988. She currently holds a dual appointment of Professor of Early Childhood Education and Director of the Center of Excellence to Prepare Teachers of Children of Poverty at Francis Marion University. Prior to joining the faculty of FMU in 2000, she served in a similar capacity on the Columbia, Aiken, Salkehatchie, and Beaufort campuses of USC, and at Ventura College and Pepperdine University in Southern California.

In addition to her work with under-resourced students, Dr. Pawloski's research interests include family, school, and community partnerships and best practices in early childhood education.

RAISING READERS IS IN THE BAG— Kathy Sanders, Children's Librarian- Cooper River Memorial Library, Charleston County Public Library

In 2012, the Charleston County Public Library launched a grant-funded family literacy initiative to inspire students and promote a love for reading in at-risk communities. Centered on Anna McQuinn's book *Lola at the Library*, this art-infused workshop allowed librarians to work with caregivers and children to share read-aloud strategies, information about the library's pre-literacy resources and ways that families could create a literacy-rich environment at home. Challenges and Opportunities with High Poverty Children:

Change the Experience - Change the Brain

Research is clear that life with limited key resources can impact brain development, and the achievement gap between under-resourced children and their wealthier peers is widening. Children of Poverty score far lower on virtually every standardized test than their more economically advantaged peers, and the dropout rate for low-income students is five times greater than that of their high-income counterparts.

Why is this happening and what can schools, teachers and providers do?

The good news is that while life in poverty often provides a shaky foundation for school success, Early Care Providers and schools can make the difference! Music, video, and powerful graphics will be used in this fast-paced presentation to explore why access to resources matter and which research-based strategies yield best results. Learn how to reframe the challenges faced by teachers and providers in high-poverty schools as opportunities for changing the futures for under-resourced students.

LENDING OUR VOICE TO THE HISPANIC COMMUNITY—Miguel Rullan and Ana Frey

When working with the Hispanic community it is important to understand the cultural differences that have a direct impact on how Hispanic families respond to everyday situations. For instance, language and cultural barriers often contribute to underuse of medical and mental health services; mistrust of authority figures, results in underreporting of crime; and in some cases, immigrations status is the core issue that has a hand in all of the above. In this session we will discuss how Hispanic families deal with these issues as well as how Hispanic parents deal with special needs children given the social norms and cultural differences that abound in this community. We will explore the impact that a diagnosis has on parents and their respective community and we will explore the evolution of advocacy when social stigmas and grieving cycles are dissimilar than those identified in the American Community.

SAFE IN, SAFE OUT! - Kendra Brown, Criminal Justice Instructor

Have you ever been shocked because you were a victim of a crime? Being victimized and being mentally scared; it can be costly and dangerous. In this class you will get personal examples on preventing yourself from becoming a victim, as well as proactive tips for prevention as well. We will discuss taking things out of our environment that can be used against you, getting you safe In the house, Safe Out.

OAE's 101—Tara Carroll, SC First Sound Program Manager/Audiologist

This session will provide an overview of how to use otoacoustic emissions for hearing screening and tips for success. A demonstration of the OAE will be done as part of this session.


