##### **New States Fight Obama Transgender Policy, Big Biz Supports**

Ten more states joined the fracas Friday over an Obama administration directive barring employers and schools from gender identity discrimination, as major corporations including Intel, Capital One, eBay, Hilton Worldwide, LinkedIn, Biogen, MassMutual and United Airlines chimed in against North Carolina's law banning transgender people from using certain public bathrooms.

The U.S. House on Thursday nixed a U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission proposal for "universal proxy ballots" that would make it easier for activist investors to defeat corporate boards' candidates during the annual proxy process.

##### **'Privacy Shield' Data Transfer Pact Approved By EU Leaders**

European Union member states on Friday gave their stamp of approval to the Trans-Atlantic Privacy Shield data transfer deal, paving the way for the pact to be formally approved by EU and U.S. officials in the coming days.

##### **Verizon Pushes FCC Commissioners On 5G Plan**

Verizon on Thursday outlined before the Federal Communications Commission suggested guidelines for the agency's proposal to open up the spectrum for 5G applications, noting that companies need flexibility to transfer, share and acquire the millimeter wave spectrum.

### House Rejects Axing IRS Commissioner's Pay

The House of Representatives rejected an amendment Thursday that would have cut Internal Revenue Commissioner John Koskinen's pay through the end of President Barack Obama's term, before passing its latest spending bill.

### NYC Missing \$59M Over Senior Homeowner Tax Break Flub

Weak oversight of a tax exemption meant for low-income senior homeowners has cost the New York City government \$59 million over the past seven years, but its Department of Finance said it was staffing up to fix the issue, according to a report Thursday.
