Dear Bill:

On November 5, the Commission on Higher Education considered requests for funds from Capital Improvement Bonds submitted by the public colleges and universities. The action taken by the Commission on each request will be transmitted to you by separate correspondence.

In the review of these requests, the Commission noted a number of projects which meet exceptional requirements. These include the provision of basic facilities at the emerging senior institutions; renovation of a facility at The Citadel to meet accreditation requirements; renovation of the main teaching hospital at the Medical University; and the replacement of boilers in the energy facility at South Carolina State. These specific projects are listed below in Table 1. Table 2 lists the other projects which were favorably considered at the meeting on November 5.


