Results from the first year of statewide testing through ACT and ACT Aspire indicate that the majority of South Carolina students across multiple grade levels aren't prepared to succeed in school and failed to meet college-readiness benchmarks. Statewide, 11th-grade students, all of whom took the ACT college-readiness test for the first time, failed to meet the college-readiness benchmarks in all four ACT subject areas: English, mathematics, reading and science.

Note: She said state lawmakers and Gov. Nikki Haley should be commended for recognizing the state needed to measure whether its students were prepared for two-or-four year colleges or industry certification.

Fewer than half of all South Carolina seniors are ready for college, according to their results on the ACT exam, assessments released Friday by the state Department of Education show. For the first time last spring, all high school juniors statewide were required to take the ACT college entrance exam. The ACT measures students' college readiness in four subject areas — English, math, reading and science — on a 36-point scale.
