South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley was at the RNC Wednesday night and she gave a ringing endorsement to... Cleveland. When asked by NBC News' Jacob Soboroff if she was going to support GOP nominee Donald Trump, Haley responded: "It's great to be in Cleveland." Haley was one of several high-profile Republicans during the primary season who came out against Trump, going so far in February as to say that he was "everything a governor doesn't want in a president." Asked again Wednesday if her non-response was a non-endorsement, Haley replied: "I wouldn't be here if I didn't want to make sure that Hillary was not going to be the next president." "Are you going to vote for him?" "Of course," Haley said, making her first — albeit tepid — endorsement of Trump since the campaign started.

Republican National Convention delegate Jerry Rovner of Pawleys Island expects to see a lot of energy from nominee Donald Trump during his acceptance speech tonight in Cleveland. Despite some notable absences from the convention, including Gov. John Kasich of Ohio, Rovner believes Republicans will leave united behind Trump. "People from a lot of areas are coming to Trump," he said. They see the November election as a pivotal point in American politics, he said, with the next president appointing a number of Supreme Court justices. Rovner said he was impressed with Trump's children on Tuesday night. "You can judge people by their kids, how nice and polite and educated they are. You've got to be impressed with Trump's kids." He said Melania Trump's speech on Monday was "fabulous" and the resulting coverage about part of it being cribbed from a speech by Michelle Obama was "petty."

NOTE: Rovner said he's become a fan of South Carolina Lt. Gov. Henry McMaster, who placed Trump's name in nomination at the convention. "He's a real gentleman, and made us all proud of South Carolina," Rovner said. "He's been on the floor with us the whole time." Gov. Nikki Haley has been less enthusiastic about the GOP nominee. She told her delegation that she would support him but didn't mention his name, according to Rovner.

A man badly in need of a big moment, Donald Trump on Thursday faced the most important speech of his presidential campaign, a last chance to make his case to skeptics at a convention marked by divided loyalties and unwanted distractions. The newly crowned Republican nominee had hoped for a triumphant turn at the podium, but he has instead been plagued by fresh political and policy headaches: His most tenacious primary rival, Sen. Ted Cruz, still refused to endorse him — and

happily took the convention stage anyway. And Trump's own exposition of his foreign policy views was rattling allies at home and abroad. The candidate said he just wanted people to come out of the Republican National Convention knowing this fact: "I'm very well-liked." But it is clear he'll need more than that if he is to end his four days in the spotlight achieving more good than harm. Trump raised the stakes in an interview in which he said he would set new conditions before coming to the aid of NATO allies. The remarks, in an interview published Thursday with The New York Times, deviated from decades of U.S. foreign policy doctrine and seemed to reject the 67-year-old alliance's bedrock principle of collective defense.

A defiant Sen. Ted Cruz declared Thursday he's no "servile puppy dog" as he faced a torrent of GOP criticism over his refusal to endorse Donald Trump on the Republican National Convention stage.irate convention delegates predicted Cruz had committed political suicide by accepting a prime-time speaking slot Wednesday only to urge Republicans to "vote your conscience," not vote for the nominee. Although the Texas senator had not been expected to offer an effusive endorsement of his primary foe, many GOP delegates had hoped and expected to hear some expression of support as they struggle to unite their party to defeat Democrat Hillary Clinton this fall. Instead they got the opposite Wednesday night as Cruz's defiance ripped apart their showcase of GOP unity moments before vice presidential nominee Mike Pence took the stage. The result was a moment of high drama in the convention hall, as delegates booed Cruz angrily and waved their arms, and some even rushed the stage. Only Trump's sudden appearance in his family's box, dispensing smiles and waves, quieted the simmering crowd.

Associated Press: Trump hedges on NATO protection against Russian aggression

Republican nominee Donald Trump hinted the U.S. may revisit NATO's longstanding policy of defending its allies against possible Russian aggression if he becomes president, saying that some allies aren't holding up their end of the bargain. Trump told The New York Times that he would decide whether to protect the Baltic republics against any incursion by Russia based on whether those countries "have fulfilled their obligations to us." His remarks came ahead of his speech to formally accept the Republican nomination for president late Thursday, and dominated the day's convention-related chatter, even though they are in line with his views questioning the United States' global role. In 2014, the 28-member alliance created a rapid-reaction force to protect the most vulnerable NATO members against a confrontation with Russia. Last week, President Barack Obama pledged unwavering commitment to defending Europe, adding that "in good times and in bad, Europe can count on the United States."

NOTE: Republican Sen. Lindsey Graham, an outspoken Trump critic, said Thursday that Trump's statements make Putin "a very happy man." "The Republican nominee for president is essentially telling the Russians and other bad actors that the United States is not fully committed to supporting the NATO alliance," Graham said.

U.S. Sen. Lindsey Graham criticized Donald Trump for saying the United States may not always defend its NATO allies and called on Trump to correct the statement in his acceptance speech for the GOP presidential nomination. He cited them not fulfilling “their obligation to us” including through adequate military spending. Graham called on Trump to correct his statement.

Ted Cruz’s refusal Wednesday night to endorse Donald Trump on the Republican National Convention stage drove chatter among S.C. delegates at their breakfast Thursday. The consensus for many was that the move was a huge misstep on Cruz’s part. Bob Barnwell, a Richland County alternate whose first pick was U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio, said Cruz’s speech – in which he called for Republicans to support candidates up and down the ticket, but did not formally endorse Trump – was “classless.” Susan Aiken, a delegate from Anderson, said she thought Cruz was leading up to an endorsement, but then she could tell he was not going to give Trump the official nod. “I would have handled it differently, and I’m not sure what his motive was,” Aiken said, adding that the move likely will hurt Cruz if he decides to run for president later. “It’s fine if you disagree and you want to go another direction, but don’t do it at the convention when you have the opportunity to unify the party. “On the other hand, he may have made Donald Trump even stronger by doing that because a lot of people were listening, and they may see it as well, we’ve got the right candidate,” she added.

An organization tied to the Muslim cleric who Turkish leaders blame for last week’s failed but bloody coup in that strategic Middle Eastern country spent thousands of dollars in recent years wooing influential South Carolinians, including taking legislators on all-expense-paid trips to that ancient land. The group, Atlantic Institute of South Carolina, has offices in both Columbia and Greenville, where it runs a school. The group says it promotes education, understanding, dialogue and interfaith tolerance. However, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan contends the group is subversive, has infiltrated Turkey’s government, military, social and educational institutions and organized the failed coup. After the coup was put down last week, Erdogan’s government launched a sweeping purge of those seen as linked to the cleric or his philosophy, removing tens of thousands of educators, military officers, justice officials and other governmental officers.

A second prisoner in less than a month has been killed by his cellmate at a maximum security South Carolina prison. The Corrections Department said in a news release that 24-year-old Ryan Mansfield was killed early Thursday morning in his cell at Lieber Correctional Institution near Ridgeville. Prison officials didn't say how Mansfield was killed. Prison records show Mansfield was serving a five-year sentence for burglary and grand larceny from Richland County. He was set to be released in March. Authorities say Mansfield was killed by 34-year-old Michael Brice. The investigation continues and no charges have been filed. Brice started a 13-year sentence for drug and weapons charges from York County in January. A prisoner was also killed by a cellmate at Lee Correctional Institution on June 22.

An inmate at Lieber Correctional Institution in Ridgeville was killed during a late-night incident with his cellmate, prison officials said. Ryan Mansfield, 24, was killed around 1:50 a.m., Thursday after an altercation with his cellmate, 34-year-old Michael Jerome Brice. No charges were immediately filed. Mansfield was serving a five-year sentence for grand larceny and second-degree burglary, non-violent, from a conviction in Richland County. He began serving his sentence in February 2015. He recently was transferred to Lieber in May from the medium-security Ridgeland Correctional Facility. Brice was incarcerated in January and is serving a sentence of up to 13 years for trafficking methamphetamine, distribution of crack cocaine and possession of a firearm by a felon out of York County.

A state inmate was killed at Lieber Correctional Institution because of an altercation overnight, a corrections official said. Ryan Mansfield, 24, died around 1:50 a.m. He was serving time for grand

larceny and burglary charges out of Richland County, according to records by the S.C. Department of Corrections. He's been in custody since February 2015 and had a projected release date of March 2017. His death was the result of an alleged incident with his cellmate Michael Jerome Brice, said Stephanie Givens, agency spokeswoman. Brice, 34, was taken into the agency's custody in January for several drug charges and possession of a firearm out of York County. His projected release date was January 2027.

A lawyer defending the man charged in the Charleston church shootings wants a judge to keep some video and other evidence out of his federal hate crimes trial, and says explaining why in public could harm prospects for seating an impartial jury. Dylann Roof, a 22-year-old white man, faces the death penalty if convicted in the shootings of nine black parishioners who welcomed him into their Bible study at the Emanuel AME Church in June 2015. Authorities said Roof posed with the Confederate battle flag before the killings and talked of trying to start a race war. Assistant U.S. Public Defender Sarah Gannett says the evidence she wants blocked includes videos, transcripts and other documents affecting Roof's constitutional rights to be free from unreasonable searches and self-incrimination. In a court filing Wednesday, she asked to be allowed to file the motion under seal, arguing that "their public disclosure could affect the court's ability to select an impartial jury and conduct a fair trial in this high-profile Federal Death Penalty Act case."

Columbia City Hall is developing new guidelines for what is acceptable for city workers to say on social media, including when using their personal accounts. Last week, three firefighters were fired

over statements they made from their personal Facebook accounts about Black Lives Matter protesters who had blocked a major access route to the city on July 10. City manager Teresa Wilson said Wednesday the new policy will be more specific than current rules and will be in tandem with department policies for police and firefighters. The citywide policy, which she said was in the works before the July 10 rally, will be in effect within two weeks. It will spell out punishments that will range from reprimands to terminations, she said. Wilson would not release a draft version, saying it remains under review by the city's legal staff.

The State: S.C. July gas prices are the lowest in 12 years

South Carolina has the lowest gas prices in the country, with an average price of \$1.86 per gallon, according to AAA Carolinas. That's the lowest price for July in 12 years. Nearly 90 percent of gas stations in the state are selling gas at under \$2 a gallon, the motor club said. The average prices are about 55 cents less than a year ago and 16 cents less than a month ago. AAA Carolinas said the lower prices are causing millions of Americans to take long road trips this summer. AAA Carolinas said gas prices likely will remain comparatively low for the rest of the summer. That's because U.S. crude oil supplies are about 13 percent higher than a year ago, while gasoline stocks have increased to 240 million barrels as refineries produce significant amounts of fuel. This is the highest ever mark for gasoline supplies during the month of July, according to Department of Energy records.

Authorities are looking for five men in connection with a home invasion that left a man dead and a woman injured in South Carolina. Berkeley County Chief Deputy Mike Cochran tells news media outlets that the victims were returning to their home in Huger in the Francis Marion National Forest about 2:30 a.m. Thursday, when the men confronted them. Cochran says the men forced the man and woman inside and there was a fight. Twenty-seven-year-old Kadeem Johnson was shot and killed. The woman was taken to a hospital in Charleston. Her condition was not known. The suspects fled in two cars they took from the home. One car was stopped about 5 miles away and the men inside fled into the forest. A teen charged with shooting at vehicles on Interstate 20 in March has no immediate court date set after his first court appearance Thursday. Kyle Pratt did not show up in court Thursday morning – he is confined in the Lexington County Detention Center after a judge denied bond for the March incident. His attorney, Ben Stitler, met with the 11th Circuit Solicitor's Office at the hearing. "We're trying to work out a way to end the case," Stitler said. Stitler said he hopes to have a resolution to the

case within a couple of months. Deputies charged Pratt with seven counts of attempted murder, three counts of discharging a weapon into a vehicle, possession of a weapon during a violent crime and possession of a stolen pistol. Pratt struck three vehicles containing seven people while shooting with a pistol from the Quattlebaum Road bridge, according to the Lexington County Sheriff's Department. One person was hit by a bullet, officials said.

Charleston County Coroner Rae Wooten released a statement this afternoon, saying that she would not issue warrants in an inquest into a Mount Pleasant toddler's March 2013 death. She wrote that after consulting with the attorney general and reviewing the response, it is her discretion not pursue the case. "As such, in light of the solicitor's public statement following the inquest proceedings that any charges brought forward will be dismissed, it is my belief that proceeding with the issuing of any warrants would only serve to consume judicial and public resources with no expectation that those responsible for the death of Elijah Washington will be held accountable." Meanwhile, there will be no temporary restraining order issued against the coroner.

Authorities say a man found dead from the heat in his South Carolina home had only a fan to cool him down. Laurens County Coroner Nick Nichols told media outlets that 74-year-old Robert Hamilton had likely been dead for a week when he was found by his landlord at his Ware Shoals mobile home Sunday. Nichols says it was 100 degrees in the home when first responders arrived and an autopsy found Hamilton died from heat stroke with a lung disease contributing to his death. Nichols says Hamilton's landlord said an air conditioner was broken and a fan was blowing in the bedroom where Hamilton was found dead. National Weather Service data says the highs near Ware Shoals were 99 degree around the time Hamilton died.

The State: USC raising fraternity, sorority fees to pay for Greeks-only parking garage

The University of South Carolina has a plan to address the parking squeeze at its downtown Greek Village, but it will cost fraternity and sorority members now. The school plans to charge fraternity and sorority members \$125 more per semester, starting this fall, to help pay to build a 1,200-space parking garage nearby in about two years, according to an email sent to USC students. USC estimates the garage, to be used exclusively by fraternity and sorority members, will be completed by the fall of 2018 or early 2019, pending approval by school trustees. But that means upperclassmen will pour money into a project they likely never will use. Joe Stuhrenberg, president of USC's fraternity council, said Greek leaders voiced their opposition to the plan when briefed by school administrators in April.

McCall Farms has been a staple of Florence County's economy for more than a century and will remain so with a \$23 million investment that will ramp production and create hundreds of new jobs by 2020. Although officials with McCall Farms were not immediately available for comment, Florence County Administrator K.G. "Rusty" Smith Jr. said the expansion will create about 150 jobs over the next four years. "They're an outstanding corporate citizen and have always provided job growth and

economic enhancement throughout the county," Smith said. Smith said his understanding of the project is that McCall Farms will build a facility in northern Florence County this year and two more in 2017 and 2019, respectively. He said each building could be about 150,000 square-feet and set in different parts of the county.

Foreign investment has helped Greenville grow into an emerging city with a "European feel," said Mayor Knox White in a panel discussion at the Global South Metro Exchange conference Thursday morning. "You can't walk around downtown Greenville without hearing German. Just looking at Michelin, the number of people who've lived in Greenville who are from Clermont[-Ferrand, France] and the number of people who've lived in Clermont from Greenville is in the hundreds," White said. "There's a very European feel in downtown Greenville and that's on purpose." White was referring to French-owned Michelin and the many German-owned companies in the Upstate, including BMW in Greer, shaping Greenville's culture as it continues to grow. But foreign investment in the Upstate did not start with Michelin, which came to Greenville 40 years ago. White credits the region's formerly dominant textile industry as what opened the door to companies from Germany to China.

Associated Press: Black therapist says police shot him with his hands raised

A black therapist who was trying to calm an autistic man in the middle of the street says he was shot by police even though he had his hands in the air and repeatedly told them that no one was armed. The moments before the shooting were recorded on cellphone video and show Charles Kinsey lying on the ground with his arms raised, talking to his patient and police throughout the standoff with officers, who appeared to have them surrounded. "As long as I've got my hands up, they're not going to shoot me. This is what I'm thinking. They're not going to shoot me," he told WSVN-TV (<http://bit.ly/2ac7zm1>) from his hospital bed, where he was recovering from a gunshot wound to his leg. "Wow, was I wrong." The shooting comes amid weeks of violence involving police. Five officers were killed in Dallas two weeks ago and three law enforcement officers were gunned down Sunday in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Before those shootings, a black man, Alton Sterling, 37, was fatally shot during a scuffle with two white officers at a convenience store. In Minnesota, 32-year-old Philando Castile, who was also black, was shot to death during a traffic stop. Cellphone videos captured Sterling's killing and aftermath of Castile's shooting, prompting nationwide protests over the treatment of blacks by police.

Associated Press: France: Truck attacker had accomplices, planned for months

The truck driver who killed 84 people on a Nice beachfront had accomplices and appears to have been plotting his attack for months, the Paris prosecutor said Thursday, citing cryptic phone messages, more than 1,000 calls and video of the attack scene on the phone of one of five people facing terror-linked charges. Prosecutor Francois Molins said the five suspects currently in custody face preliminary terrorism charges for their alleged roles in helping 31-year-old Mohamed Lahouaiej Bouhlel in the July 14 attack in the southern French city. Molins' office, which oversees terrorism investigations, opened a judicial inquiry Thursday into a battery of charges for the suspects, including complicity to murder and possessing weapons tied to a terrorist enterprise. The suspects are four

men — two Franco-Tunisians, a Tunisian and an Albanian — and one woman of dual French-Albanian nationality, Molins said. The driver was a Tunisian man who had been living in Nice for several years.

Associated Press: Brazil arrests 10 in alleged Olympics terror plot

Brazilian police arrested 10 people who allegedly pledged allegiance to the Islamic State group on social media and discussed possible attacks during the Rio de Janeiro Olympics, officials said Thursday. Justice Minister Alexandre de Moraes said in the capital, Brasilia, that 10 suspects had been detained and two more were being sought. All are Brazilian, and one is a minor. The gender of the people was not given. Police acted because the group discussed using weapons and guerrilla tactics to potentially launch an attack during the Olympics, which begin Aug. 5, Moraes said. However "they were complete amateurs and ill-prepared" to actually launch an attack, Moraes said. "A few days ago they said they should start practicing martial arts, for example." Still, Moraes said even disorganized groups should be taken seriously.

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
