The State: Gov. Nikki Haley cancels NY fundraising trip

South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley canceled a plans to attend a New York fundraiser on Wednesday so she could remain in the state after five Lexington County children were found dead in Alabama and a Charleston County sheriff's deputy was shot and killed, her campaign said.

Note: "With the horrific tragedy in Lexington and the shooting of law enforcement officials in Charleston last night, the governor believes her place is with the people of South Carolina and decided not to travel out of state," Haley deputy campaign manager Rob Godfrey told The State.

The moves are among a series of reforms announced by the state Department of Social Services aimed at improving the handling of abuse and neglect cases at the agency, which was heavily criticized earlier this year in legislative hearings over its handling of such cases, some of which ended in death.

Note: Gov. Nikki Haley stepped in to help improve things at the Richland County DSS office, announcing in May that a 20-member team of caseworkers from other parts of the state was being loaned to the Richland County office to help cut caseloads and that a second shift for caseworkers would be initiated.

In an address to the nation, President Barack Obama will outline an expanded military and political effort to combat Islamic State militants in Syria and Iraq, possibly including airstrikes in Syria, officials said.
