NEW APPROACH Greenville schools address no zeros

Some middle schools in Greenville County won't give zeros to students even if they never turn in an assignment or cheat or plagiarize homework.

It's part of a new approach middle school principals decided to pursue this year that was billed as a way to motivate students by taking away the grade-crushing score of a zero on their class grades.

When the issue arose as a question in a January school board workshop, Superintendent Burke Royster said teachers were still giving zeros, just fewer of them. While that may be happening at some schools, particularly Hillcrest Middle School, which the district highlighted for its efforts to implement a policy for teachers to bound students until

Kasich wins close battle for second place in Republican primary

MANCHESTER, N.H. - Republican Donald Trump and Democrat Bernie Sanders rode a wave of voter frustration with American politics to commanding victories in Tuesday's New Hampshire primaries, adding crucial credibility to their upstart candidacies.

Sanders swept majorities of men, women, independents and young people in his win over Hillary Clinton, but faces challenges in the more diverse states to come next on the primary calendar. Trump appealed to those seeking a political outsider, and he could benefit from a persistent lack of clarity among the more mainstream Republicans struggling to challenge him.

President's budget would pull plug on mixed oxide

WASHINGTON - The unfinished \$4 billion plutonium recycling project in South Carolina would be abandoned under President Obama's proposed budget for fiscal 2017.

After years of cost overruns and searches for cheaper alternatives, the Obama administration wants to finally pull the plug on the mixed oxide (MOX) fuel fabrication facility at Savannah River Site.

The budget released Tuesday, the last one Obama will propose before leaving office next January, would allocate just \$270 million to start winding down the project.

The enthusiasm behind Trump, a real estate mogul who has never held political office, and Sanders, who says he is a democratic socialist, underscored the public's anger with the current

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

And so it begins. After months of buildup and tens of millions of dollars spent to make them household names, the Republicans and Democrats who want to be president are descending on South Carolina.

Palmetto Politics

If you go by polls alone, billionaire businessman Donald Trump remains the favorite on

the still-crowded GOP side, while former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton is widely expected to turn back Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders.

But polls don't vote, meaning the candidates' ground games, personal contacts, TV ads and surrogates still have a good chance to sway the outcome. So will the hundreds of

members of the media "from off" who will flood South Carolina for the nation's traditional first-in-the-South votes.

South Carolina Democrats have 59 convention delegates up for grabs, while the Republicans have 50.

N.H. voters hungry for change pick Trump, Sanders

MANCHESTER, N.H. — Republican Donald Trump and Democrat Bernie Sanders rode a wave of voter frustration with American politics to commanding victories in Tuesday's New Hampshire primaries, adding

crucial credibility to their upstart candidacies.

Sanders swept majorities of men, women, independents and young people in his win over Hillary Clinton, but faces challenges in the more diverse states that come next on the primary calendar. Trump, appealing to voters seeking a political outsider, could benefit from the persistent lack

of clarity among the more mainstream Republicans struggling to challenge him.

"We are going to do something so good and so fast and so strong and the world is going to respect us again, believe me," Trump said at a victory rally.

Ohio Gov. John Kasich grabbed second in New Hampshire after posting

nearly all of his campaign resources into the state. Jeb Bush and Marco Rubio vied for third along with Ted Cruz, the Iowa caucus winner, ensuring all would press on to the next voting contest in South Carolina.

Sanders, at his own raucous rally, said his victory sent a message "that

S.C. attorney general sues over MOX delays

Aims to force federal government to finish reactor-fuel facility

WASHINGTON — S.C. Attorney General Alan Wilson has filed a lawsuit to force the U.S. Department of Energy to finish the mixed-oxide fuel fabrication, or MOX, project at the Savannah River Site, the same day President Barack Obama submitted his final federal budget proposal to Congress calling for the program's termination.

Wilson threatened to sue at the end of 2015 at the urging of Gov. Nikki Haley. "The federal government has a responsibility to follow through with

Its promises," Wilson said in a statement Tuesday. "The Department of Energy has continually shown disregard for its obligations under federal law to the nation, the State of South Carolina and frankly the rule of law. The federal government is not free to flout the law. This behavior will not be tolerated. We are committed to using every legal avenue possible to ensure compliance."

MOX originally was intended to reproduce weapons-grade plutonium into commercial nuclear reactor fuel.

Suspect in 2 brutal attacks freed on bail

Summerville police refused to share details, identify man who's now in Berkeley custody

As Summerville police kept secret the details of two brutal assaults and refused to publicly identify a man they said could be a serial rapist, the suspect posted a lowball on four felony charges and walked free last week.

Thomas Michael Powell, 28, of Thomaston Avenue in Summerville faces a kidnapping charge in each of the two attacks against women he met online. He also was jailed on counts of first-degree criminal sexual conduct and assault with intent to commit the same crime. All told, the charges carry up to 120 years in prison.



Powell

The police said Powell held one woman at knife-point in mid-January before she screamed and got away with a slashed hand. A short time later, the authorities said, he raped another woman and left her bleeding from knife wounds.

A day after Powell's arrest late last week, a judge set bail at \$5,000 on each of his charges, and he was released within hours. But all of this happened

Presidential race now turns to SC

Palmetto State primaries will sharpen parties' focus

South Carolina is where the 2016 presidential races are expected to come into better focus after a jumbled start in Iowa and New Hampshire.

For Democrats, supporters of front-runner Hillary Clinton see South Carolina as the firewall to stop U.S. Sen. Bernie Sanders of Vermont, who nearly beat the former secretary of state in Iowa and defeated her Tuesday in New Hampshire.

Among Republicans, New York billionaire developer Donald Trump, the national front-runner, is coming off a win Tuesday in New Hampshire, following U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz's victory in the Iowa caucuses.

Trump and Cruz are atop the S.C. polls — good news for voters who want a candidate promising to tear down almost everything in Washington.

But some in the GOP establishment fear Trump and Cruz will turn off minority, younger and female voters in the general election. The anti-Trump, anti-

Cruz establishment still is looking for its best candidate among former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, Ohio Gov. John Kasich and U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio of Florida.

Furman University political scientist Danielle Vinson sees two different races: "Those fighting for Trump and Cruz who say, 'We want an outsider,' versus everyone else who wants a practical candidate who can beat Hillary Clinton and won't embarrass you along the way."

GOP RACE

Starting with Ronald Reagan in 1980, S.C. Republicans had a streak of choosing the eventual GOP presidential nominee. That record was broken in 2012, when S.C. voters chose former U.S. House Speaker Newt Gingrich over Mitt Romney.

This year, seven Republican hopefuls already have announced plans to campaign in South Carolina, including more than 40 events ahead of the party's Feb. 20 primary.

Trump has ruled S.C. GOP polls since the summer, drawing well from moderates to evangelicals, much to the surprise of pundits. The real estate mogul regularly draws thousands to rallies across the

Revised plans ease concerns

The Beach Co. unveils revised plans for Cardinal Newman site redevelopment

New plans include fewer apartment units, square footage for commercial use

This time, more Forest Acres residents in support than against

The Beach Co. of Charleston on Tuesday appeared before about 75 Forest Acres residents with a peace offering in hand.

Just last month, residents gave the developer an earful at a planning commission meeting. They explained at length their fears that the mixed-use development planned for the former Cardinal Newman School site would exacerbate traffic problems on the busy, shop-lined stretch of Forest Drive between Beltline Boulevard and Trenholm Road.

This time, at a Forest Acres City Council public hearing, The Beach Co. came with revised plans meant to ease those concerns.

Fliers the developer passed out indicated the size of the planned development, called Forest Acres Village Square, has been scaled down.

The new plan listed 256 luxury apartments, down from nearly 300, and 42,000 square feet of local restaurants and boutique shops, down from 54,000.

The Beach Co. originally estimated the project would add nearly 3,100 cars daily to Forest Drive, which is nearing its capacity of about 30,000 cars per day.

But Tuesday, Ned Miller, The Beach Co. development manager overseeing the project, told the crowd the revisions would trim about 650 cars from that estimate. The project's price tag also dropped, from nearly \$60 million to close to \$58 million, he said.

"This was not an easy change to make, but it balances the traffic concerns with the goal of making this a thriving part of the community," Miller said during the company's presentation.

The proposed changes appeared to help the developer's cause, though some residents still were conflicted or downright opposed to the plans.

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Obama plan nixes MOX

State sues over missed MOX deadline same day as budget proposal

After attempting to place the Savannah River Site's MOX facility in a cold standby two years ago, President Barack Obama is now looking to completely terminate the project and move forward with another plutonium disposal method, beginning in 2017.

Just hours after the budget rollout Tuesday, S.C. Attorney General Alan Wilson announced that he is once again suing the U.S. Department of Energy

and others for missing a key deadline at the MOX facility and for not paying the associated fines of \$1 million a day.

Regardless of the pathway moving forward, the goal of the nation's plutonium disposition program is to meet an agreement with Russia that states each country must dispose of 34 metric tons of

weapons-grade plutonium.

Budget proposal

Obama's fiscal year 2017 budget proposal calls for the termination of the MOX project, which includes the Savannah River Site's Mixed Oxide Fuel Fabrication Facility.

Released on Tuesday morning, the proposal seeks a "change in plutonium disposition" approach and



Sanders, Trump triumphant in New Hampshire primaries

MANCHESTER, N.H. — Republican Donald Trump and Democrat Bernie Sanders swept to victory in Tuesday's New Hampshire primaries, adding crucial credibility to their upstart candidacies and underscoring voters' insistence on shaking up American politics.

Trump and Sanders entered Tuesday's contest as favorites in New Hampshire, but needed to deliver on expectations after second-place finishes in Iowa's leadoff caucuses. Trump appealed to voters seeking a political outsider, while

Sanders was buoyed by those seeking a candidate who they felt cared about people like them.

"When we stand together, we win. Thank you, New Hampshire!" Sanders celebrated on Twitter.

Hillary Clinton echoed Sanders' calls for taking on Wall Street banks and tackling income inequality, but cast herself as more prepared to make good on her policy pledges. "People have every right to be angry. But they're also hungry, they're hungry for solutions," she said after congratulating Sanders on his victory.

For some Republican leaders, Trump's victory in New Hampshire and Ted Cruz's win in Iowa added urgency to

their efforts to coalesce around a more mainstream candidate to challenge them. However, it appeared unlikely New Hampshire's contest would clarify that slice of the field, with Ohio Gov. John Kasich, Florida Sen. Marco Rubio and former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush all locked in a tight race, along with Cruz.

New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, who has staked his candidacy on New Hampshire, lagged behind the pack in early vote counts.

Sanders pulled from a broad coalition of New Hampshire voters, gathering a majority of votes from men, independents and voters under 45, as well as a slim majority of women. Hillary Clinton won the majority of those over 65 and those with incomes over \$200,000 a year, according to early exit polls conducted by Edison Research for The Associated Press and the television networks.

Clinton's campaign argues she will perform better as the race heads to more racially diverse states, including Nevada and South Carolina. Both New Hampshire and Iowa are overwhelmingly

Trump nails victory in New Hampshire

NASHUA, N.H. — Donald Trump nailed down a decisive first victory in New Hampshire's presidential primary Tuesday, showing his unorthodox campaign can translate the large crowds at his rambunctious rallies into the votes that determine delegates. Ohio Gov. John Kasich, an afterthought in Iowa, popped up in

second. New Hampshire showed voter anger is for real, but it seemed unlikely to give much clarity to the search for a strong establishment alternative to Trump.

Right behind Kasich: a cluster including Texas Sen. Ted Cruz, former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush and Florida Sen. Marco Rubio, all looking for a strong showing



Champion dog heads for Westminster

Top-ranked Spanish water dog in U.S. is from Ridgeland

Jango will compete at Westminster Dog Show next week

Co-owners Faith Ott and Janet Rahn have three dogs in competition

Janet Rahn knew she had a championship-caliber dog the moment she watched him jump from Faith Ott's car nearly three years ago.

Jango has certainly lived up to the hype.

The 2 1/2-year-old Spanish water dog picked up top honors for his breed in October at the

American Kennel Club show in Somerset, N.J., and in December at the AKC/Eukanuba National Championship in Orlando, Fla. Next week, Jango and his owners will look to complete the triple crown by picking up best of breed honors at the Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show in New York.

"I said to Faith, 'That's our champion,'" Rahn said. "There's only been two dogs that have come along and take my breath

away, and he did when he stepped out of that car."

Jango is one of three Spanish water dogs the business partners and close friends have competing at Westminster in New York next week, along with 3-year-old Sancho and 1-year-old Maya.

The three are all Top 10-ranked Spanish water dogs in the U.S. — Jango being the top ranked — and three of just 10 Spanish water dogs admitted to Westminster in 2016, the first time the breed has been invited to the prestigious dog show. Jango is a celebrity in his own right, with more than 22,000 fans on his official Facebook page.

Their dogs will also compete in the herding dog group in New York next week, one of the toughest groups in the dog show
