Gov. Nikki Haley said Monday that she continues to support allowing persecuted immigrants to come to South Carolina - as long as they're not from Syria. Republicans in the House and Senate called on Haley to oppose all international refugees. A similar letter signed by 13 House Republicans called it "unquestionably clear that these terrorists will execute whatever means necessary to infiltrate and murder innocent civilians."

Note: Interpreters "saved our American lives, so in turn we save theirs by bringing them," she said, noting it's personal. Two interpreters who worked with her husband Capt. Michael Haley's unit in Afghanistan in 2013 came to the U.S. through the program, she said.

Note: "It is my understanding that while our national security agencies are working tirelessly to vet potential refugees, there remain gaps in available intelligence for those fleeing Syria," she wrote, while agreeing that the United States should try to help people forced to flee their homes "for the most awful reasons, such as religious persecution."

South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley, after requests from lawmakers, has asked the federal government not to send any Syrian refugees to South Carolina.

Note: Haley sent a letter to Secretary of State John Kerry stating that "... until I can be assured that all potential refugees from Syria have no ties to terrorist organizations, I am requesting that the State Department not resettle any Syrian refugees in South Carolina."

Note: Haley stated in the letter that it is her "first and primary duty to ensure the safety of the citizens of South Carolina," and she believes it is "impossible" for federal officials to "thoroughly vet" those fleeing Syria.

WCSC: Haley to State Dept.: Don't send Syrian refugees to SC

In a letter to U.S. State Department, Gov. Nikki Haley requested Monday that no Syrian refugees be settled in the Palmetto State because of a potential threat to national security. Haley wrote to Secretary of State John Kerry, expressing "concerns with the vetting process of refugees from conflict-zones, specifically Syria."

Note: "After reviewing recent public statements and personally speaking today with intelligence officials, it is my understanding that while our national security agencies are working tirelessly to vet potential refugees, there remain gaps in available intelligence for those fleeing Syria," she wrote. "This lack of historical and verifiable intelligence with many Syrian refugees makes it difficult, if not impossible, to thoroughly vet individuals seeking to enter the United States as a refugee."
