**Horry News:** South Carolina joins growing list of states not wanting to accept Syrian refugees

It's not a great day in South Carolina for the tens of thousands of Syrian refugees the Obama Administration is looking to resettle here and other parts of the U.S. In a state that spends hundreds of millions annually on tourism marketing, security concerns are driving Gov. Nikki Haley's decision to join more than half the nation's governors in opposing refugee resettlement in their states.

**Note:** "While our national security agencies are working tirelessly to vet potential refugees, there remain gaps in available intelligence for those fleeing Syria," the letter states.

**Note:** "While I agree that the United States should try to assist individuals in such dire situations, it is precisely because of this situation in Syria that makes their admission into the United States a potential threat to our national security," the letter continues. "For that reason, I ask that you honor my request and not resettle any Syrian refugees in South Carolina."

South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley says South Carolina will not accept any Syrian refugees unless she can get assurances from the U.S. government that they have no terrorist ties. Haley sent a letter to U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry Monday outlining her concerns about the resettlement process in the wake of last Friday's terrorist attacks in Syria.

**Note:** "As a governor of a state that plays a small role in administering part of the federal refugee resettlement program, I have concerns with the vetting process of refugees from conflict-zones, specifically Syria," Haley wrote.

More than a dozen S.C. lawmakers Monday called on Gov. Nikki Haley to block international refugees from coming to South Carolina. The calls came after attacks that killed more than 120 people in Paris over the weekend, renewing fears of terrorists coming to the United States while posing as refugees.

**Note:** Haley has backed the efforts of faith groups in Spartanburg to resettle refugees in South Carolina. However, late Monday, Haley asked the U.S. State Department not to resettle any Syrian refugees in South Carolina, citing the difficulty of checking their backgrounds.

Police in South Carolina shot and killed a man early Tuesday after he fired at them while they were trying to arrest him on drug-related charges, a city spokeswoman said. One officer was shot and wounded and the other was injured in the struggle, which happened around 1:30 a.m., said Ashley Hunter, a spokeswoman for the city of Cayce, just southwest of Columbia.

The Environmental Protection Agency proposed tougher new limits on Tuesday on smokestack emissions from nearly two dozen states that burden downwind areas with air pollution from power plants they can't control. At the same time, the EPA moved to remove two states - South Carolina and Florida - from the "good neighbor" rules, saying they don't contribute significant amounts of smog to other states.
