### Governor Nikki Haley News:

**Post and Courier:** As victims honored, lawmakers concede domestic violence isn't top priority

Lawmakers aren't optimistic there will be any follow-up next year after last session's bruising battle to pass domestic violence reforms, including a partial gun ban, despite assuring victims and advocates that was just a start. The acknowledgement came on the same day as the annual Silent Witness ceremony on the Statehouse steps where victims' relatives honor and remember the past year's casualties of domestic violence as they have for 17 previous years.

**Note:** The S.C. Domestic Violence Task Force, created by Gov. Nikki Haley in January, is expected to provide additional recommendations to tackle domestic violence later this year. The diverse task force of some 65 state, local and nonprofit agencies developed 19 statewide recommendations and 10 local actions in August.

**Note:** Eric Bland, an attorney for Paul and Angie Hammond, said the couple also is demanding to hear from Gov. Nikki Haley, who has not spoken publicly about the shooting since voicing support of the prosecutor months ago.

A series of new inspections, conducted by the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control, found violations at all three of the state's abortion clinics. Governor Nikki Haley requested the review after the release of viral videos posted on YouTube by a pro-life Center for Medical Progress.

**Note:** "What I wanted to find out is if we were seeing those kinds of things at Planned Parenthood. I owed it to the citizens of South Carolina to check to make sure that wasn't going to happen," Haley said.

**Note:** Asked about the very different results achieved by inspections after her letter, Governor Haley noted a change in management at DHEC. "Keep in mind there's a different director. So what I wanted was to make sure they were inspected properly, so they went through and were very thorough and some things they found were fine and some were really wrong and so our job is to make sure they gave us a full report of that they found," Haley said.

State Rep. Jenny Horne, who received national attention this summer for her anti-Confederate flag speech, will formally announce next week she's running for Congress, challenging incumbent Republican Mark Sanford in the coastal 1st Congressional District. Horne, an attorney who has represented Summerville as a Republican in the Legislature since 2008, said Thursday she won't be discussing a possible bid for Congress until next week.

**Note:** Sanford, the state's former governor, has represented the 1st District seat since 2013. He returned to Congress that year after winning a heated, multi-candidate Republican primary after then-incumbent Tim Scott was picked by Gov. Nikki Haley to fill a U.S. Senate seat vacancy.

Nine hours after a killer ended his shooting rampage at Charleston's Emanuel AME Church, police got their first tip on the identity of the likely killer, investigative documents released Thursday show. At 6:20 the morning after the massacre, a man telephoned the police call center saying he was "positive the subject was someone he knew and had recently spent time 'hanging out with' named 'Dylann' " in a Lexington neighborhood called Ridgecrest.
