Heading Toward the Finish Line

Dear Friends:

South Carolina has one of the longest legislative sessions of any state; we start in January and conclude in June. Twelve days remain in the first half of the 121st session and the scorecard for completed legislation is grim. The House has been productive passing legislation both large and small (50+ bills last week). However, the Senate logjam has halted progress in nearly every area.

The Road Fix

After months of work, last month the House sent the Senate a plan to fund statewide road improvements. As soon as it arrived in the Senate it was shredded and replaced with their plan to raise nearly \$800 million in taxes each year by increasing the state gas tax more than 70%. Conservative senators balked at the huge tax hike. This week Senate Republicans floated a proposal they said would raise more money for road work, but also provide some income tax relief and change how the state's transportation agency is governed. That plan is more aligned with the House plan. Prospects are dim to pass a road plan this year.

Protecting Our Rivers

A House agricultural subcommittee took nearly four hours of testimony this week listening to those for and against a proposal that would require mega-farms get a permit to withdraw large amounts of water from rivers and streams. Many worry such large withdrawals will cause environmental damage to our rivers. House District 86, which I serve, is the focus of the issue because of the creation of a large potato farm and potentially, more farms to follow. Most importantly, everyone had their say in helping set the foundation of understanding for any alterations of the River Act. Consideration of this issue has been described as a "milestone in agriculture". Therefore, we must take our time, listen to all comments and base legislation decisions on science not emotion. The earliest any action will come is 2016. ([Read more in Aiken Standard](#))
