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## Spotlight: Rural Infrastructure Authority

This week, the **South Carolina Rural Infrastructure Authority (RIA)** announced nearly \$6.2 million in grant awards, the first round of grants in Fiscal Year 2015. The grants will fund 20 water and sewer projects in 16 counties across the state. By providing financial assistance for needed infrastructure improvements, the RIA helps rural communities by enhancing quality of life for local residents as well as supporting new and existing business. Approximately 1,250 businesses and 9,000 residential customers are expected to benefit from this round of grants.

A second round of grant applications will be accepted through March 16, 2015 for infrastructure projects that solve public health or environmental quality problems or help to build local capacity to support economic and employment opportunities.
