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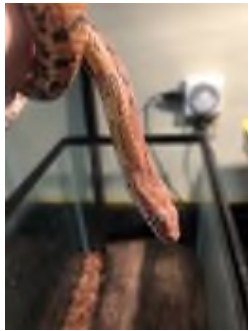

Have you ever seen a cornsnake in opaque mode? As a snake grows, it will shed its old skin in one large piece. This happens 4-12 times a year depending on age/size of the snake. If a snake is dull or cloudy in appearance, that is a normal part of shedding. Milky eye appearance is also normal. Snakes do not have eyelids so there is a scale called the spectacle that helps protect the eye. They usually remain opaque for 4-7 days and shed 4-7 days after that. They may soak in water and rub their face against rougher surfaces to help remove the old skin. This is the cornsnake that lives at Edisto Beach State Park in opaque mode.
