Dear Governor Haley:


My name is Kenneth E. Williams, but everyone calls me Keno. I am scheduled to appear before the members of the parole board in June 2016 for the second time. But before I do I would like to ask "what else can I do in order to be granted parole"?

Unlike most that has appeared before the parole board, I don't have the money to hire a fancy attorney to represent me before the parole board. On the contrary, what I do have as far as representation that will appear with me is God first, Clemson University professor emeritus Romando James, my god-mother Evangelist Betty J. Watson, my mother Rosa, and one of my 4 siblings Sheila. And, I have enormous community support that has written in support of me being granted parole.

Presently, I have done all I know how to do to stay away from trouble and follow the policies, procedures and rules that are governed throughout SCDC. I've worked and taken classes since my incarceration June 1994. Also, last year (2015) I received my EPA certification. When I am granted parole I already have a full-time job with Affordable Heating & Air under owner Drake Hunter (Phone # 864-381-2007), and a part-time job as a research assistant under the supervision of Clemson University professor emeritus Romando James (Phone # 864-650-2891). I'll be residing with my mother Rosa at 208 Chelsea St. Moore, SC 29369 (Phone # 864-909-4364).

Now, if there's anything more that I can do to be granted parole please let me know before I appear before the members of the parole board June 2016. I know that once I'm granted parole I will be another one of South Carolina Department of Parole success stories. Thanking you in advance for your time and considerations.
