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

We add our support in favor of this health policy decision.

Expanding Medicaid coverage to newly eligible adults below 138% of the federal poverty level will cover, as has been estimated, nearly 300,000 uninsured South Carolinians. Today, Medicaid does not cover many low-income adults without dependent children -- a large portion of the uninsured. The majority of uninsured adults have no regular source of health care, forcing them to delay or forego needed care when they are sick, dramatically limiting their access to preventive services, reducing productivity and threatening their health.

Through the Affordable Care Act, the U.S. government is helping states cover uninsured persons, funding most of the associated costs of extending Medicaid to this low-income population. The Federal government will assume 100 percent of the cost of covering newly eligible individuals for the first three years and will cover 90 percent of the costs thereafter.

The mission of Catholic health care calls us to serve vulnerable persons and to advocate for all those in need. Increasing access to Medicaid will give nearly 300,000 uninsured South Carolinians the dignity of health insurance.
