Female Service Members in the Long War

September 11, 2001 is a day burned into the consciousness of all Americans old enough to remember that day. For members of the U.S. military, it was also the beginning of more than 14 years of war, variously called the war on terror, Operation Enduring Freedom (Afghanistan), Operation Iraqi Freedom (Iraq), Operation New Dawn (Iraq), and the Long War. The Long War encapsulates the repeated deployments into combat zones in Afghanistan and Iraq, as well as the Horn of Africa, and to humanitarian assistance operations.

National Suicide Prevention Month: Update 2015

In 2014, the National Action Alliance for Suicide Prevention's Research Prioritization Task Force released a Prioritize Research Agenda for Suicide Prevention, which emphasized the importance of targeting interventions to specific risk groups as well as vulnerable times and settings. Broad measures and messages aimed at whole populations, as well as an expanding repertoire of treatments, haven't had a measurable impact on the national suicide rate—41,149 in 2014, the most recent year for which we have data.
