German industrial conglomerate Robert Bosch GmbH, which employs about 4,000 people across South Carolina, will continue investing in the United States, where its business last year fared better than elsewhere around the world, a member of the company's management board said Wednesday in Fountain Inn.

Note: Also speaking to about 100 people gathered under a big white tent for the ceremony was Gov. Nikki Haley. Talking to reporters about Tuesday night's Republican primary in South Carolina's 1st Congressional District, Haley said she hasn't thought about whether she'll make an endorsement in the coming runoff between former Gov. Mark Sanford, her one-time mentor, and Charleston County Councilman Curtis Bostic. Haley told reporters Sanford had called her Wednesday morning but she hadn't yet spoken to him.

Locals scored a rare victory this week when they stopped a developer from sticking another 462 houses on decreasingly rural Johns Island. It's a tough blow for the land- owners, but they can take solace in one thing: at least they can keep paying peanuts for property taxes. The Wooddale Partnership LLC - which includes County Councilman Vic Rawl as one of several owners - is paying a whopping \$673 a year in property taxes on 470 acres that Charleston County values at about \$3.8 million.
