Year-round Beauty Delights in Spring

Whether alone or in a group, flowering dogwood (*Cornus florida*) never disappoints me with its sublime springtime floral display. In late March to April the showy white "flowers" appear before the leaves unfold. These gorgeous, 3- to 4-inch wide showy white petal-like bracts lure me like the Sirens from Greek mythology. (A botanist will gleefully inform you that the "flowers" of flowering dogwood are not actually flowers, but bracts, which are modified leaves that look like petals; the true yellowish-green flowers are clustered in the

center of these bracts).

These lovely floral bracts give rise to showy red berries in the fall. The fruit are complemented, if not upstaged, by the leaves that turn a stunning red to reddish-purple, which secures its place in the landscape as an essential spring and fall ornamental tree. However, I would argue that the horizontal branches and flat-topped crown of flowering dogwood provide year-round interest.

Numerous flowering dogwood cultivars exist from white to pink to red “flowered” forms. Although plagued by a few prominent insects and diseases (notably dogwood borer, dogwood canker anthracnose, and powdery mildew), there’s been a strong push at breeding disease-resistant dogwoods.

Site flowering dogwood in the right location: partial shade (shade from afternoon sun) and the edge of woodlands. When growing in a relatively stress-free environment, this exceptional native American understory tree will captivate you year-round.

Clydesdales Coming to Horse Country

“Week of the Horse” Leads up to Block House Steeplechase

The world-famous eight-horse Budweiser Clydesdale hitch will make a special appearance in Landrum, SC, on Wednesday, April 29, as part of a “Week of the Horse” celebration leading up to the 69th running of the Block House Steeplechase on Saturday, May 2, at FENCE (the Foothills Equestrian Nature Center).

The Budweiser Clydesdales make hundreds of appearances a year, but not usually in a town of Landrum’s size. Their visit here was the brainchild of

Patty Otto, owner of The Hare & Hound Restaurant in Landrum, who was able to organize the visit with the help of area distributor Budweiser of Spartanburg.

The Clydesdales will be on North Trade Street in Landrum starting at 5pm, available for viewing and visits from the public. The parade will start at 6pm and feature, in addition to the Clydesdale hitch, members of local military groups and representatives of other horse breeds from the area. Groups of dramatic black Friesians, lively gaited Paso Finos, and mini-donkeys pulling carts, among other equines, will appear.

About Budweiser's "Gentle Giants"

Horses chosen for the Budweiser Clydesdale hitch must be at least three years of age, stand approximately 18 hands – or six feet – at the shoulder, and weigh an average of 2,000 pounds. They must be bay in color, have a blaze of white on the face, and have four white legs and a black mane and tail. A gentle temperament is very important as hitch horses meet millions of people each year.

Each Budweiser hitch travels with a Dalmatian, a tradition that dates back to the early days of brewing, when the dogs were trained to protect the horses and guard the wagon while the driver was inside making deliveries.

of the wings and got their name from the grasshopper-like trill they make when singing. The breeding range of these sparrows spans southern Canada all the way to Central America and across most of the U.S. They winter in the southern U.S., including North Carolina down to Florida and all the way west to Arizona and Mexico.

Grasshopper sparrows need large open grassland with a few woody perches to defend their territory. Territories can be as large as 250 acres. These birds are highly sensitive to habitat changes and will abandon nesting areas with the slightest disturbance. These disturbances are typically habitat fragmentation and loss due to farming zones, urban sprawl, and reforestation efforts. High predation from domestic and feral cats has also impacted the population.

They are a very illusive and secretive species that build well-hidden nests at the bases of grass clumps. Females are known to run in imitation of a rodent and then feign wing injury as a distraction after being flushed from the nest.
