Around 4pm today, a large fire extinguisher went off during a routine test in an auxiliary building (not a reactor building) at HB Robinson in Darlington. This caused a depletion of oxygen levels requiring the employees to be evacuated from two buildings. By around 6pm, the situation was taken care of -- no state resources were requested, no first responders were needed, no injuries were sustained, and no damage was caused (just clean up from the large fire extinguisher will be needed).

This caused the plant to move to Alert Status (the second lowest of four total emergency levels) for that brief time. DHEC assured that EMD did all it was supposed to do in notifying surrounding counties, etc.

No state action expected.

He died on 27 December 2011 in Paktia Province, Afghanistan, in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. According to initial reports, he was a passenger in a Maxxpro while conducting a mounted patrol when the vehicle struck an IED. Private First Class Whitmire sustained fatal injuries as a result of the blast.

Private First Class Whitmire was assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 720th Military Police Battalion, 89th Military Police Brigade, Fort Hood, Texas.

His parents, Donald C. and Jennifer Ann Whitmire, reside in Simpsonville. He was a graduate of Hillcrest High School, Class of 2010. Some of you may know his uncles, Robert Whitmire and Carl Whitmire, who ride with the Patriot Guard.

PFC Whitmire is scheduled to return to South Carolina from Dover AFB on 5 January 2012 at 10:00 AM at the Greenville-Spartanburg International Airport.

The following is a copy of the obituary found in the Greenville News:

PFC Justin M. Whitmire, U.S. Army, 20, lost his life in Afghanistan on Tuesday, December 27, 2011, while serving our country.

Justin was born November 19, 1991 in Greenville, to Donnie "Donnie" Craig Whitmire and Jennifer Ann Yeargin Whitmire. He loved to fish and was an avid Clemson fan. He was a graduate of Hillcrest High School, and served on the Speech and Debate team. He helped to start the broadcast journalism program at the school and was a member of the National Forensic League. He was known as Mr. Fix-it by his family and friends and was a faithful Big Brother to Adam Rogers. He was a member of Faith Renewed Outreach Center and the Renovate Student Ministries. Justin was stationed at Fort Hood and was assigned as a medic in the 720th Military Police Company. He was awarded the Army Service Ribbon, the National Defense Service Medal, the Army Achievement Medal, and the Purple Heart.

Surviving, in addition to his parents, are a brother, Craig Whitmire; a sister, Jessie "Jessi" Whitmire; paternal grandparents, Clarence and Lora Whitmire; maternal grandparents, Steve and Pat Surett; aunts and uncles, Mike and Teresa Whitmire, Tom and Rene' Yeargin, Kristie and Jeremy Pierce, and Stephen Surett; and several cousins.

Visitation will be 4:30-8 p.m. Friday at Faith Renewed Outreach Center in Mauldin.

Funeral services will be 1 p.m. Saturday at Simpsonville First Baptist Church, officiated by Pastor Terry Rogers and Pastor Stephen Morton. Burial, with Full Military Honors, will be in Cannon Memorial Park. A funeral escort will be provided by the Patriot Guard.

Around 3pm today, a gasoline tanker overturned in downtown Spartanburg. While the capacity of the tanker is 8,500 gallons, the volume of spillage – if any – is unknown at this time. Nearby businesses have been closed and the area has been evacuated. A private company has been called for clean-up, and DHEC is en route to the scene.

No injuries. No state assistance has yet been requested.

The Spartanburg County Emergency Manager, Doug Bryson, is at the scene assessing the damage. George McKinney will call with another update within the hour.

Iran building new uranium site

Officer threatens to close Strait of Hormuz oil route

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran has begun uranium enrichment at a new underground site built to withstand possible airstrikes, a leading hard-line newspaper reported Sunday in another show of defiance against Western pressure to rein in Tehran's nuclear program.

The operations at the bunker-like facility

south of Tehran, reported by the Kayhan daily newspaper, are small in comparison to Iran's main enrichment site. But the centrifuges at the underground labs are considered more efficient and are shielded from aerial surveillance and protected against airstrikes by up to 300 feet of mountain rock.

Uranium enrichment is at the core of the international standoff over Iran's nuclear program. The U.S. and its allies fear Iran could use its enrichment facilities to develop high-grade nuclear material for warheads.

Iran — which claims it only seeks nuclear reactors for energy and research — has sharp-

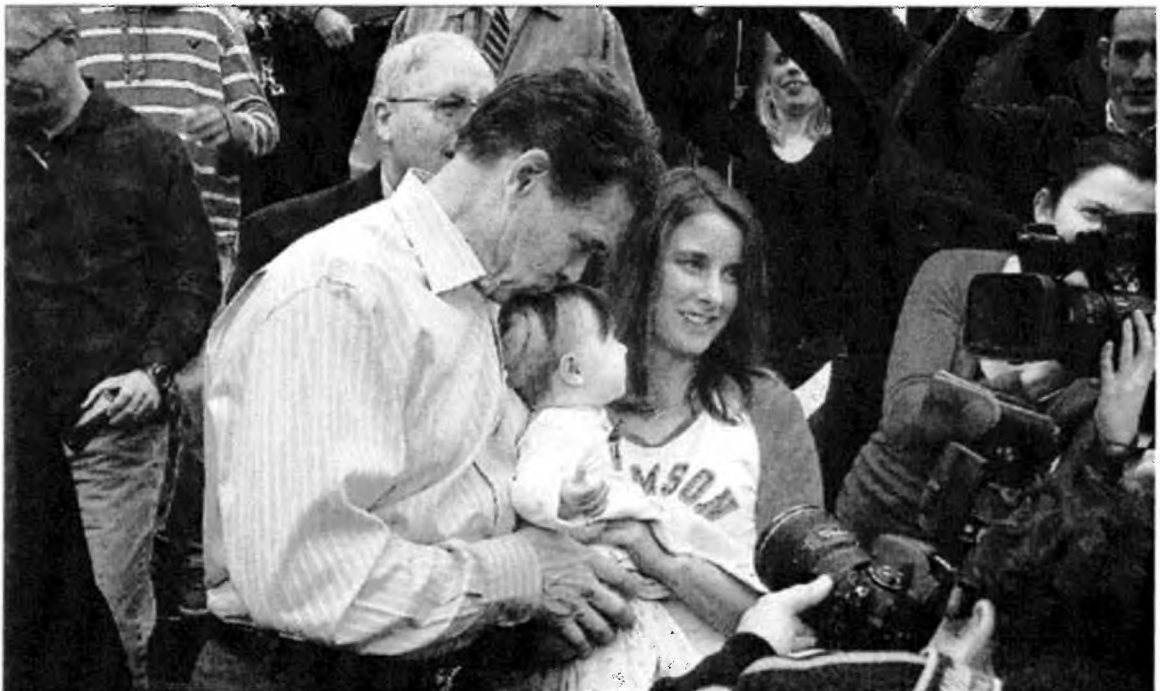
ly increased its threats and military posturing against stronger pressures, including U.S. sanctions targeting Iran's Central Bank in attempts to complicate its ability to sell oil.

A senior commander of the Revolutionary Guard force was quoted as saying Tehran's leadership has decided to order the closure of the Strait of Hormuz, a strategic oil route, if the country's petroleum exports are blocked.

Revolutionary Guard ground forces also staged war games in eastern Iran in an apparent display of resolve against U.S. forces just

Gone in a crush

New law could take away car thieves' advantage

COLUMBIA — In South Carolina it's not very hard for a thief to turn a stolen car into cash before the owners even notice it's gone, so long as the car is more than eight years old.

A South Carolina Senate subcommittee discussed how to thwart those thieves Thursday. A bill proposed by Sen. Joel Lourie, D-Richland, and Sen. Larry Martin, R-Pickens, would require

anyone trying to sell a car to a salvage yard or car wrecker to show proof of ownership — either a car title or auction receipt — if the car was made in the last 15 years. That's up from eight years or less in the current law.

A new provision would require older cars without titles to go through a certification process with local law enforcement to prove it belongs to the seller and isn't stolen. Information would be entered into a statewide database with the South Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles that the State Law Enforcement Division (SLED) could access.

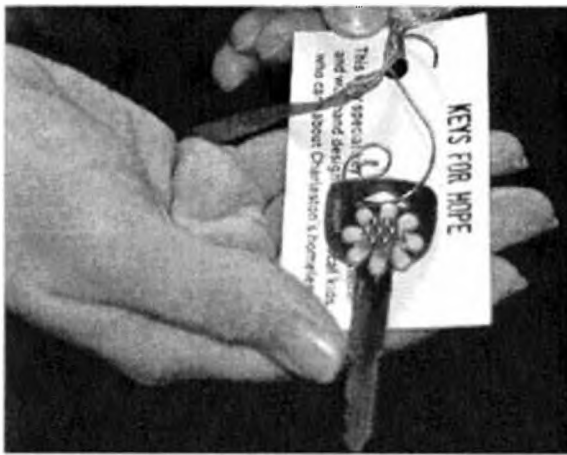

Will S.C. leaders keep cash loophole?

Charleston race spotlights issue

During Charleston's recent mayoral election, a group pumped thousands of dollars into messages praising one candidate and ridiculing another. It was money not publicly disclosed or subject to the state's \$5,000 limit on giving to noncandidate committees.

The stealth campaign was legally possible because of a federal judge's ruling a year earlier — a ruling that did away with the state's rules and limits for noncandidate committees.

It was similar to the so-called Super PACs that have aired ads, usually negative, in the current Republican presidential primary.

Could this become a new scene in South Carolina politics? Lawmakers don't seem in a rush to close the loophole.

Last fall, the group Citizens for a Better Charleston built a website, mailed them and aired TV spots promoting Charleston mayoral candidate and City Councilman William Dudley Gregoire and discrediting incumbent Mayor Joe Riley.

The effort had little effect. Riley blasted it publicly and went on to collect two-thirds of the vote in a five-way race.

State Senate President Pro Tem Glenn McConnell, an opponent of the House Bobby Harrell, both Republicans who live in Charleston, said the legislature might address the issue but must do so cautiously.

"Somebody's changing the tune up," McConnell said. "The thing we have to be very careful about is free speech, and I think it's on the side of free speech. There are some constitutional limits there."

McConnell said there's a difference between efforts to promote a policy position versus a specific candidate.

"That might be able to be tightened down as far as when you're advocating for a candidate versus a policy issue," he said.

Harrell agreed the legislature might make changes, "but we want to be very

Area stores lose \$4,600 to con men

Businesses warned: Callers
are not from Western Union

It's an old scam with a new twist that has already dubbed area businesses out of \$4,600. Scammers typically target private citizens with fake lottery winnings, check depositing schemes, or the lesser seen email from a relative in distress overseas.

Authorities are now warning about a scam that targets business owners and employees. So far, the scheme been successful at least twice in Orangeburg County.

In both instances, the caller identifies himself as a Western Union technical support employee.

Although one business's caller ID indicated Western Union was on the line, company officials have said the individuals calling were not representatives of Western Union, according to incident reports.

The first case came to light Dec. 28 when a Hamburg Highway business in Orangeburg first reported the scam. An employee said a caller who sounded foreign claimed to be Western Union tech support checking their systems.

The caller then had the victim transfer two amounts totaling \$1,876.

The employee later contacted Western Union and was told the money went to a prepaid card. Officials from the genuine Western Union said they would try to stop the card but noted it may have already gone through.

On Dec. 10, a Five Chop Road convenience store owner received a similar call, and the scam became a bit clearer.

The caller gave the employee several of what he said were test numbers which would allow the support tech to determine if the machine was operating correctly.

The caller said the first two numbers, 91405 and 92405, were not successful. The employee was given yet another number, 93405, to test.

It was determined those were not test numbers but rather dollar amounts. The employee realized he had sent \$2,776 to the caller.

Western Union confirmed the numbers were not test numbers.

After law enforcement was called, an Orangeburg County Sheriff's Office deputy arrived at the shop when the caller called again saying another round of test calls to be conducted. The deputy

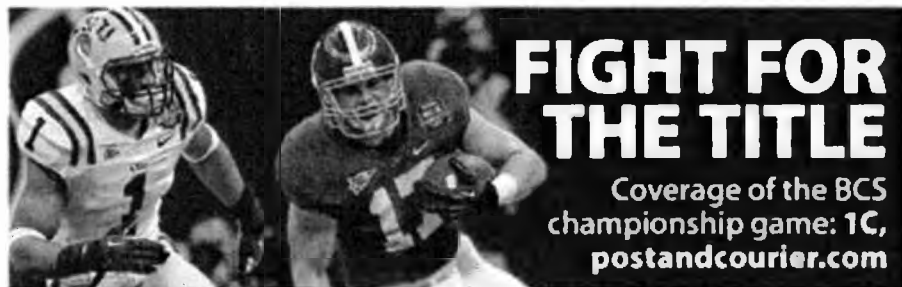

Former Good Neighbor Center, VA in conflict

More than a year after federal authorities investigated the Good Neighbor Center, operations at the troubled North Charleston shelter for homeless veterans remain in disarray.

Nearly half the facility's 32 beds are empty, although recent reports show the area's homeless population is skyrocketing and demand for housing is rising.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in November halted payments on a grant intended to expand the shelter, leaving construction unpaid for work they already completed. The two-story expansion, funded by both state and federal tax dollars, remains unfinished.

The VA in August demanded repayment of more than \$122,000 the shelter management under former Director Nancy Cook. The board of directors moved the lawsuit and federal investigators are then to respond.

School bonuses fail in 4-4 votes

Funds proposed for ex-workers

MOUNT PLEASANT — Charleston County School Board members disagree about whether outsource and laid-off employees should have received the same bonus current employees got in December, and two motions to give those former workers that money failed Monday night.

Some board members said it only was fair to give former employees who, through no fault of their own, lost their jobs with the district, but others said they couldn't justify paying a bonus to people who hadn't worked for the district since last summer.

The school board voted 4-4 twice, first to award the 91 workers who were outsource or reduced in force a \$500 bonus and, after that didn't pass, to provide a \$350 bonus.

The board's vote didn't change on other motion, and Vice Chairwoman Cindy Robinson, Tony Hampton Green, Chairman Chris Fraser and Ann Oplinger opposed the bonuses for former workers.

All board members were present, but the lack of a fifth member meant the controversial issue couldn't be decided. School board member Mary Ann Taylor resigned in November, and the Charleston County legislative delegation is supposed to appoint her replacement this month. Lawmakers

Santorum's rise renews earmark debate

State's senators caught in crossfire

With Rick Santorum's rise in the GOP primaries comes a renewed debate over earmarks — putting South Carolina's U.S. senators squarely in the middle. With earmarks now taboo within the conservative ranks of the Republican Party, Santorum is taking heat for his record of bringing home the bacon to Pennsylvania during his 16 years in Congress, which ended after the 2006 elections.

His response: Yeah, back in those days so did Jim DeMint, South Carolina's tea party favorite junior senator from Greenville.

Meanwhile, U.S. Sen. Lindsey Graham of Seneca is making the

argument that in instances such as the funding of a study on the deepening of Charleston harbor, you want nothing more than to be able to tag funds. Texas Gov. Rick Perry, who hopes to regain a foothold in the race at Santorum's expense, ran a TV ad in Iowa that portrayed Santorum as "feeding at the earmark

trough in Congress," saying he "demanded more than \$1 billion in earmarks" before voters "kicked him out of office in a landslide."

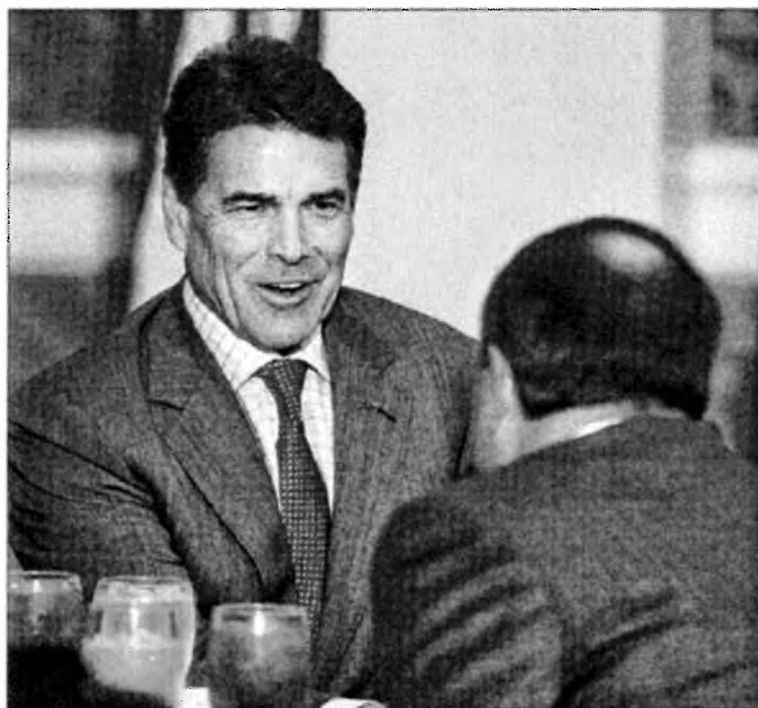
How accurate that figure is isn't easy to discern because Santorum left the Senate before lawmakers were required to start disclosing their earmarks in 2007, said Steve Ellis, vice president of Taxpayers for Common Sense, a Washington-based non-profit, non-partisan budget watchdog group.

But the \$1 billion figure is "pretty safe," considering how long Santorum was in the Senate, "including the go-go years for earmarking," Ellis told GreenvilleOnline.com.

Santorum and Pennsylvania's senior senator at the time, Arlen Specter, put out numerous joint press releases during those years trumpeting their success in funding projects in the state, Ellis said.

Rock Hill schools will launch an "intensive intervention" program for troubled elementary school students.

Until now, principals were left to use traditional discipline to manage children with "extreme" behavioral problems who repeatedly disrupt class or harm others. Those students were suspended.

Starting next week, kindergarten and first-grade students who act that way could be enrolled in an eight-week program that includes daily therapy sessions, small-group academic lessons and family counseling.

Big money fuels GOP race

Super PACs sometimes spending as much as the candidates on campaigns

WASHINGTON — Dubbed "super PACs" and flush with millions of dollars, outside groups backing and attacking Mitt Romney and Newt Gingrich include a hotel magnate, a casino mogul and former partners at Romney's pri-

vate equity firm. They're all over the airwaves in the early voting states, at times spending as much as the Republican presidential candidates themselves.

The names of these super political action committees — "Winning Our Future" and "Restore Our Future," for example — don't

give any clues to the average voter who's behind them. And though big money has always been a part of big elections, this year's efforts are something new, a result of major court rulings easing spending limits by groups not directly linked to the candidates.

In many cases, donors' names will remain a mystery for at least weeks longer. But some are known.

Last week, the pro-Gingrich Winning Our Future PAC received

\$5 million from Las Vegas billionaire Sheldon Adelson. The group is expected to use the cash for new television advertisements in this month's primary elections — \$3.4 million of it in South Carolina — as the former House speaker tries to overtake front-runner Romney in the race for the GOP nomination.

The group said Sunday it was planning to run a half-hour film assailing Romney's tenure at

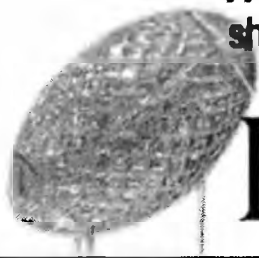

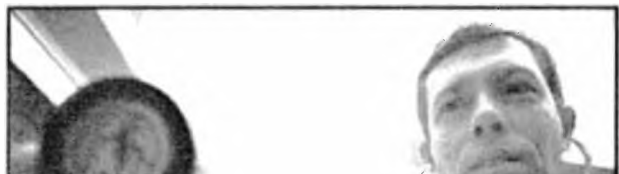

Its sponsor, Sen. Paul Camp-

bell, said it's easier for people to get a job if they have a job of some sort, and his intent is to match people's skills with work that needs done in city or county governments and schools, from electrical work to assisting in classrooms.

"I just think if someone's busy working, they'll be more industrious and more likely to get a job," said Campbell, R-Goose Creek. "Depending on the skill they've got, I think we can put that skill to work. I'm not talking about collecting garbage on the

side of the highway."

Campbell, a chemical engineer, says the unemployed would still have time to search for a paying job, while honing their skills.

His bill is among several involving unemployment benefits set for discussion in a Senate subcommittee meeting Tuesday, the start of the 2012 legislative session.

Another would require laid-off workers to pass a drug test to qualify for benefits, and require the unemployed to pay for the test.

A spokesman for Gov. Nikki Haley said she generally supports the measures.

"Anything that increases accountability over unemployment benefits, enhances workforce training and incentivizes people to get back to work, the governor will support," Rob Godfrey said.

A spokesman for the U.S. Labor Department said the agency won't comment on proposed legislation.

But the senior attorney of the National Employment Law Project said both the drug test-

ing and community service bills conflict with federal law. They also feed negative stereotypes of the unemployed, George Wentworth said.

"The unemployed are just a slice of America. They're you and I without a job," he said. "To suggest that the unemployed are lazy drug abusers who are just sitting around feeds a false, ugly stereotype. Most of these workers are unemployed because we have a horrible labor market."

Romney stumbles before NH primary

NASHUA, N.H. — Republican front-runner Mitt Romney stumbled down the homestretch of the New Hampshire primary on Monday, declaring, "I like being able to fire people who provide services to me" as his rivals intensified already fierce criticism.

"Gov. Romney enjoys firing people. I enjoy creating jobs," said former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman, who has staked his candidacy on a strong showing in Tuesday's primary and has shown signs of gaining ground in recent polls.

Adding insult to any injury, Texas Gov. Rick Perry posted a ringtone to his campaign website that consisted of Romney saying, "I like being able to fire people," over and over.

Romney is the odds-on favorite in New Hampshire, and Huntsman as well as other Republicans who are contesting the state have generally been content to vie for second place in hopes of emerging as his main rival in the South Carolina primary on Jan. 21.

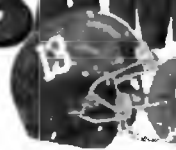
"Second place would be a dream come true," said former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum, as he raced through a final full New Hampshire campaign day that began before sunrise and stretched for more than 14 hours. The former Pennsylvania senator finished a surprising second in last week's Iowa caucuses, but, without money for television ads, he has appeared to struggle as he seeks to convert that into momentum.

Romney, the former Massachusetts governor, won in Iowa by eight votes. A victory in New Hampshire would

Settlement reached in ODPS traffic stop

A settlement has been reached with a man who claimed an Orangeburg police officer used excessive force during a traffic stop.

Thomas Haigler received an undisclosed sum in his civil case against the Orangeburg Department of Public Safety. He claimed an officer was grossly negligent in his handling of the October 2008 traffic stop.

"The exact amount is confidential," said Haigler's attorney, Daniel Luginbill. "That was part of the agreement."

Luginbill said evidently the city felt it faced some risk of losing in front of a jury.

City Administrator John Yow said, "the case was concluded in early December on a compromise basis with no admission of liability on the city or department's behalf."

Yow said the state's Insurance Reserve Fund assigned an attorney to the case. A spokesperson for the S.C. Budget and Control Board, which is over the fund, could not be reached for comment Monday afternoon.

The incident occurred after police followed a driver suspected of drunk driving for about a mile from Magnolia to Shilton Street, according to an



ODPS incident report.

Haigler claimed that he did not resist arrest, but an officer slammed him into his car and then hurled him to the ground, causing serious head, facial and rib injuries.

The officer was initially suspended following the incident, but returned to active duty.

First Circuit Solicitor David Pascoe began investigating the claims of excessive force. He turned the case over to the U.S. Attorney's Office early in 2009 because it has a special task force for investigating allegations of excessive force, he said.

In November 2009, the U.S. Attorney's Office stated that while the officer's actions were aggressive, they did not meet the requisite criminal intent necessary to prove a civil rights violation had occurred.

ODPS Chief Wendell Davis and attorney Norma Jett, who handled the case for the city, could not be reached for comment.

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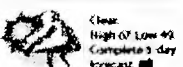

County off I-526 project

Council votes to turn over control to state

Charleston County is out of the interstate-building business. County Council on Tuesday night gave up control of the long-stalled Interstate 526 project on Johns and James Islands. Members voted 7-2 in favor of turning over the nearly \$500 million project to the state Department of Transportation, but it remains unclear whether the road will be finished.

While the vote from the county of having to pay back more than \$11 million already spent on the project, it removes it from local control.

And Summey said, "This is the only life preserver we're going to get." Qualey said he voted against the motion because it meant giving up local control. "I think things that affect local people should stay with local government," he said.

Life may get harder for state's jobless

Proposals would require drug tests, community service

COLUMBIA — The chairman of a Senate panel which has approved tougher requirements for the state's jobless says he's not worried about warnings that the legislation may not be constitutional. Sen. Kevin Bryant, an Anderson Republican who chairs a Senate Labor, Commerce and Industry subcommittee, said lawmakers already are "overwhelmed" by requirements of the federal government and shouldn't stop just because some officials say legislation is unconstitutional.

The proposed changes would among other things require drug tests of those receiving benefits and mandate that they perform community service work.

"If we find that it is in violation, in my personal opinion, we continue to press forward," he said. "I can't base how I vote on a bill based on how some liberal, activist judge is going to throw it out. The courts have their role. We have our role."

But Sue Berkowitz, an attorney and director of the Applesseed Legal Justice Center, which acts as advocates for the poor and jobless, said instead of passing legislation that would be struck down by the courts, lawmakers should be passing measures that make it easier for the jobless to work again, such as help with child care.

"These are good people," Berkowitz said of the unemployed. "We need to remember these people need to eat, they need to have their lights on, they need to be able to have a place to live, they need to be in a position to go on to that next job. We're not thinking about that. And that is heartbreaking."

The comments came after Bryant's panel passed without dissent three bills aimed at tightening laws on benefits for the jobless. One authored by Bryant would

Former York Co. councilman arrested

Lindemann charged with DUI

FORT MILL — Former York County Councilman Paul Lindemann of Fort Mill was charged with driving under the influence and leaving the scene of an accident after police say he struck a mailbox with a vehicle and fled on foot.

Lindemann was booked at Moss Justice Center just before 7 a.m. Tuesday. His bond was set at \$1,244.50, and his first court appearance is Feb. 6.

Lindemann, 42, was involved in a one-vehicle crash in Fort Mill around 1:45 a.m. said Lance Cpl. Billy Elder of the Highway Patrol. The patrol responded to a common Court in the Ruckers community of Fort Mill, where an SUV had struck a mailbox.

A 2003 Lexus SUV was traveling south on Commerce Court, Elder said, when it swerved off the road to the right and struck a mailbox.

The driver, later identified as Lindemann, fled on foot and was arrested soon after, Elder said.

The Highway Patrol had previously identified Lindemann's home address on Hendry Road as the site of the crash, but it occurred four miles away.

Lindemann refused a breathalyzer test, which Magistrate Judge Dan Malphrus said could mean he either refused to take the test or couldn't blow enough air.

Those details will come out in court testimony, Malphrus said during a bond hearing.

Lindemann's driver's license was suspended for 30 days.

Accompanied by an attorney at his bond hearing, Lindemann left the jail shortly after 2 p.m. Tuesday. He said he had "better days," and declined to comment further.

Momentum builds for ex-Mass. governor

MANCHESTER, N.H. — Mitt Romney won a decisive victory Tuesday in New Hampshire's Republican primary, scoring a solid triumph that firmly established him as the favorite to win the 2012 GOP presidential nomination.

Romney, the former governor of Massachusetts, became the first GOP nominee-bent presidential candidate to win both Iowa and New Hampshire's early contests. That should give him momentum as the campaign turns south, toward the next contest on Jan. 21 in South Carolina.

Two Romney challengers made strong showings here in the Republicans' first secret ballot test — Texas Rep. Ron Paul, who drew the campaign's most energized crowds, and former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman, who skipped Iowa's caucuses last week for campaign-related reasons.

With 91 percent of precincts reporting, Romney had 49 percent of the vote. Paul had 23 percent, while Huntsman had 17 percent. Several national news organizations declared Romney the winner and Paul the runner-up, based on analysis of voting trends and exit polls of voters.

Trailing far behind were former House Speaker Newt Gingrich with 10 percent and Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum, with 9 percent. Santorum could not sustain his momentum after he finished only eight votes behind Romney in Iowa.

The candidates now head for South Carolina, where they'll join Texas Gov. Rick Perry, who skipped New Hampshire and is already campaigning hard in the Palmetto State.

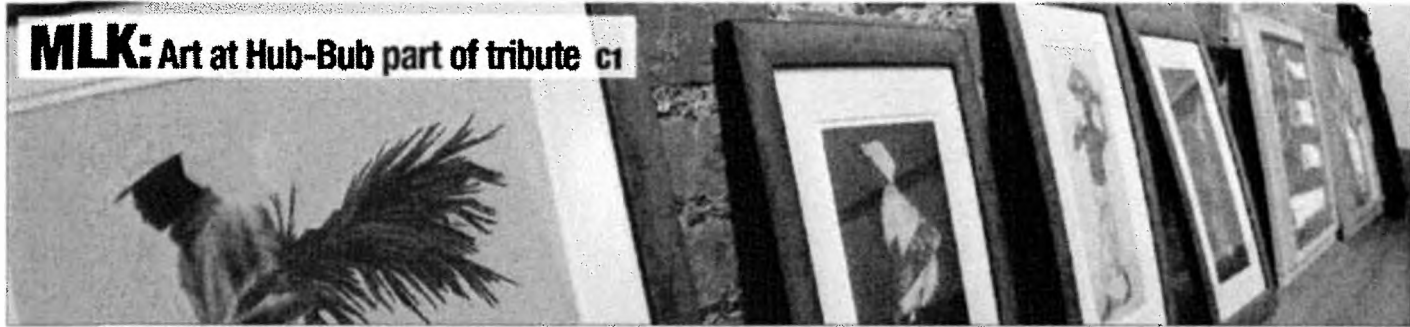

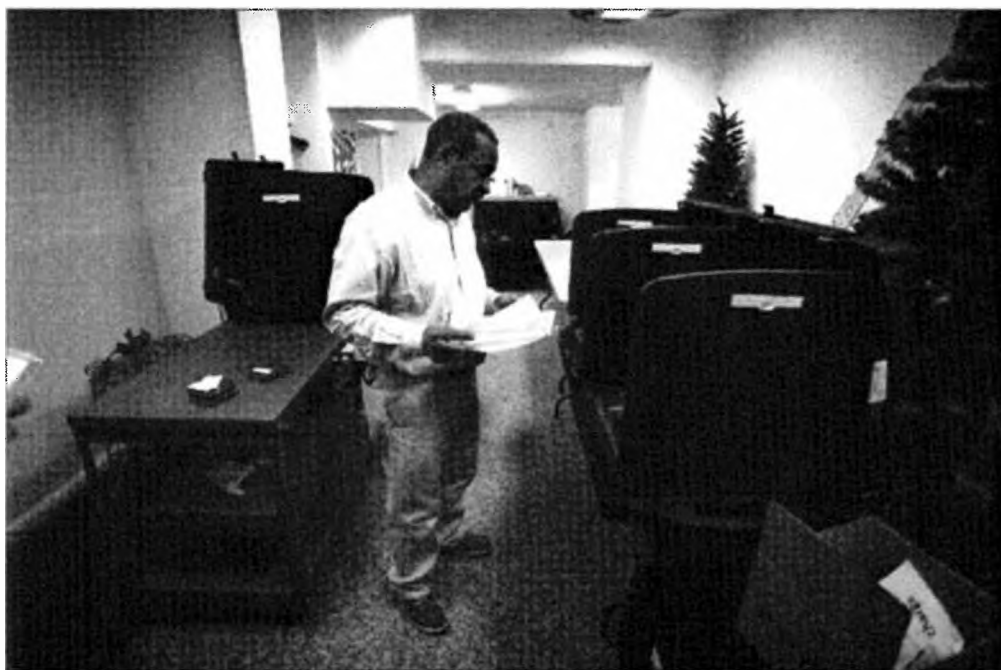

COLUMBIA — South Carolina's General Assembly was gaveled back into session Tuesday with most of its members' sights set on several specific goals, not the least of which is putting the state's retirement plan on a path to fiscal soundness.

Debate is looming in both the House and Senate on dealing with the state's pension system and closing a \$15 billion gap in cash needed to cover long term promises to state employees.

State Sen. Thomas Alexander, R-Walhalla, who chaired a Senate subcommittee charged with recommending retirement revisions, said, "We've

got our hands full. We didn't go looking for this. It came to us, but we are working hard to come together with a plan."

Alexander said his personal goal is to see comprehensive reform that results in a long-term solution.

"I would hope people can come back 30 years from now and say 'those people made some tough decisions, but they put us on solid ground,'" Alexander told a gathering of media representatives.

Rep. Jim Merrill, R-Daniel Island, said the House has already posted a plan for debate that will pay down the current debt and make the system solvent moving forward.

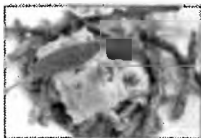

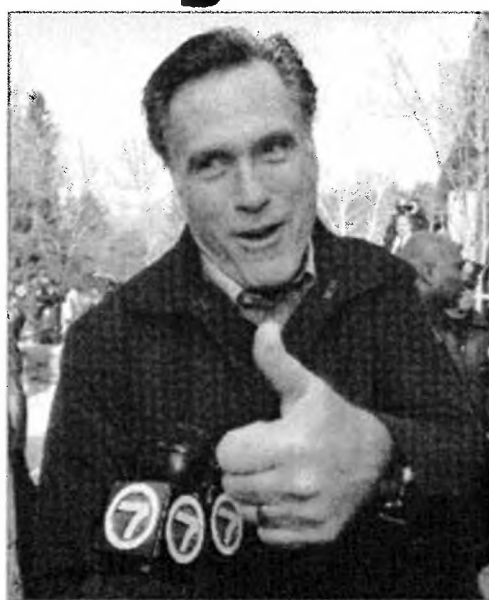

Romney with 37 percent of the vote, followed by Texas Rep Paul with 23 percent, former Utah Gov. Huntsman with 17 percent and former House Speaker Gingrich and former Pennsylvania Sen. Santorum with 10 percent each. With his victory, Romney became the first Republican to sweep the first two contests in competitive races since Iowa gained the lead-off spot in presidential campaigns in 1976.

Romney won in Iowa by a scant eight votes over Santorum, and gained barely a quarter of the vote there.

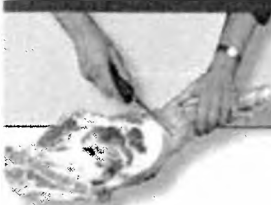

Haley: I'd veto adult cyclists helmet rule

COLUMBIA — South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley laid out her first veto threat of the session, saying Tuesday she will reject stricter helmet rules if they reach her desk.

Haley plunged into a crowd of about 150 bikers wearing leathers and pen-packed vests on the opening day of the January to June session. The state now requires helmets for riders and passengers under 21. But for the first time in years, the session is starting with a bill that would require helmets for everyone.



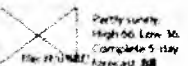

MOUNT PLEASANT — Linda Ruggles sold her blood, scrounged for scrap metal and volunteered for medical experiments to cobble together enough cash to save her home from the clutches of foreclosure this year.

She paid off the bank in the nick of time, but lost her freedom in the process.

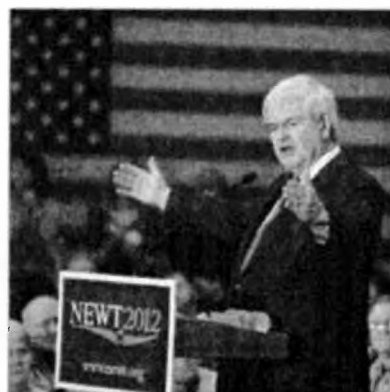

Dead listed as voting in SC

Attorney general urges investigation

COLUMBIA — State officials are calling for an investigation after records determined that more than 900 people listed as deceased also have recently voted, calling into question the integrity of the state's election system as South Carolina's first-in-the-South GOP presidential primary just 10 days away.

What's unclear from the analysis released Wednesday to a House Judiciary Committee panel from the state Department of Motor Vehicles is whether voter fraud was committed by people assuming the identities of the deceased or if poor record keeping has resulted in South Carolina residents being classified as deceased.

Kevin Strawder, director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, did not have answers, saying that would be up to investigators. He based his testimony before lawmakers on state Election Commission records that included when people last voted and matched that with death records.

The panel took no action on his report.

"If you have voted after you are dead, there is a good, strong possibility that you did something illegal," he said to reporters after speaking to the panel. "At that point in time, it comes out of my hands and goes into legal hands.... It's not my job to explain that."

Self Regional faces lawsuit

Document alleges organization erroneously seized plaintiffs' tax refunds

A lawsuit has been filed against Self Regional Healthcare alleging the health care provider erroneously and illegally seized plaintiffs' tax refunds.

The suit, which could become a class action suit, was filed Dec. 28, 2011, at Greenwood County Courthouse. Local attorney Edward McCallum submitted the document.

There are seven plaintiffs initially named in the suit, though

the document claims the class of plaintiffs could be "composed of thousands of citizens of South Carolina."

When contacted Wednesday, McCallum acknowledged the lawsuit, but declined further comment.

According to the suit, the state established in 1988 — and later amended in 1999 — what is known as the Setoff Debt Collection Act. Part of the act was a provision that allowed "claimant agencies," such as Self, to collect delinquent debts through

the S.C. Department of Revenue, which then deducted certified debt from the state income tax refunds of alleged debtors or their spouses.

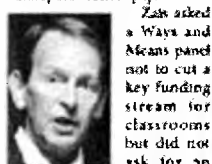

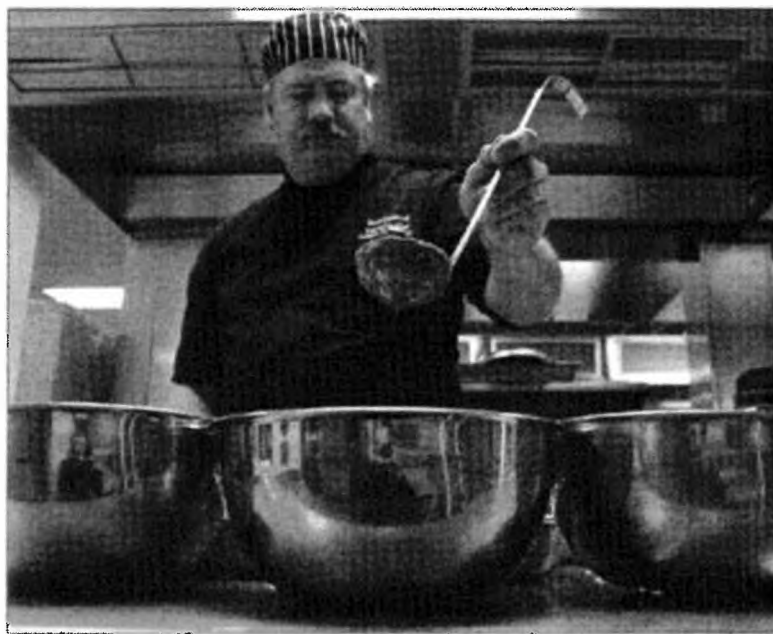

Romney aims for 3rd win

Candidate hopes SC is last stand for his opponents

COLUMBIA — Republican presidential hopeful Mitt Romney braced for a brutal 10 day onslaught in South Carolina as he looks to turn the first-in-the-South primary into the last stand for his Republican rivals.

from the third-floor balcony of the Cross Creek Apartment Complex off Ambrose Run.

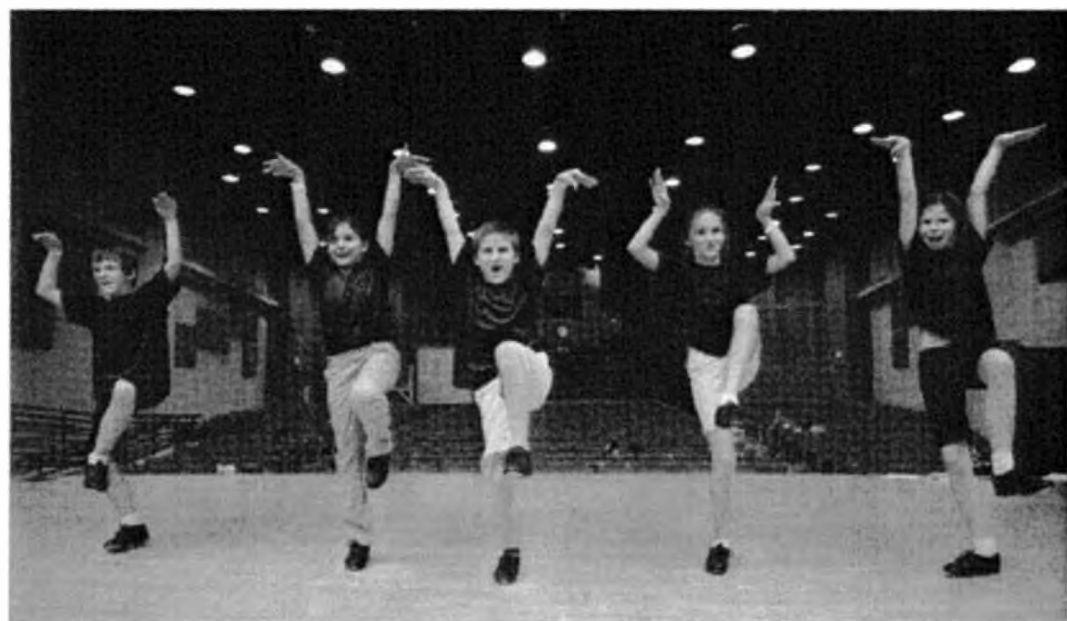
Shayla Bryan was charged with attempted murder and remains in the Beaufort County detention center after being denied bond, according to the detention center's online jail log.

Armed felon arrested for target practicing

SENeca — Local and county police swarmed into a neighborhood Wednesday after gunfire was reported but, after the dust settled, a convicted felon was in jail for target practicing near a trailer park.

At about 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, Okonee County sheriff's deputies responded to a 911 call of shots being fired into a dwelling near J.E. F St., which is the area of B and B Trailer Park. The caller stated that two males were seen leaving the home with a gun in a car.

Deputies, assisted by Seneca police, stopped a car and held its occupants at gunpoint. Several people were in investigative detention while deputies gathered statements and checked backgrounds on the various individuals.

Okonee County Sheriff's Chief Deputy Terry Wilson said

everyone's background checked out, except Matthew Trotter, 26, of Seneca, who is a convicted felon. Wilson said Trotter and others were target practicing in the trailer park and a bystander thought they were firing at a mobile home.

"There was nothing to that call," Wilson said.

Trotter is charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. He was taken to Okonee County Detention Center. No bond amount was available as of press time Wednesday.

This is the second report of shots in the neighborhood in three weeks.

On Dec. 14, Alexander James Marcus, 17, of 316 F St., allegedly chased a 40-year-old male through B and B Trailer Park and fired three shots at the man. Marcus was arrested Dec. 16 and charged with attempted murder.

Dead voters haunt state officials

DMV leader: Records show 900 dead might have voted

COLUMBIA — The director of South Carolina's Department of Motor Vehicles said Wednesday that state records show more than 900 people have voted after dying in the state and he's

asked for an investigation.

DMV Director Kevin Shwedo told legislators about the issue as the U.S. Justice Department questions a new state law requiring people to show photo identification when they vote in person.

"Well over 900 people appear to have voted after they died," Shwedo said, asking the State Law Enforcement Division to look into it.

Shwedo's figure immediately prompted Republican insiders to say that is why the law was

needed. Greg Foster, spokesman for House Speaker Bobby Harrell sent a Twitter message as he sat in the meeting: "SCDMV Dir says 957 dead people voted in last election! This is why we need VoterID."

But it was far from clear what was behind the numbers, said Rep. Bakari Sellers, a Denmark lawyer and Democrat. He pressed Shwedo for details. "How many of those people voted absentee? How many sent in a ballot and then died?" Sellers said.

Shwedo said he had turned up the information and it would be up to others to investigate.

Shwedo analyzed more than 230,000 records on people without state driver's licenses or identification cards. He found state Election Commission data included 30,000 dead people. He said the records involving 900 dead people were turned over to SLED to investigate.

Shwedo said the records also included more than 91,000 people who now appear to live in other states.

Death penalty debated

JEFFERSON — Prosecutors are reviewing evidence and information in the recent slaying of a Kershaw woman who was abducted from Chesterfield County and have not yet decided whether to pursue the death penalty against the man charged in her death.

"(Fifth Circuit) Solicitor (Daniel E.) Johnson met with investigators from Chesterfield and Kershaw County earlier this week to review evidence and information," Dawn Sloan, a spokeswoman for the Fifth Circuit Solicitor's Office, said. "He is still considering how we're going to proceed with the case. We're still in the very early phases of this case. Nothing is set in stone at this point."

Chesterfield and Kershaw County deputies continue to work together on the investigation and Kershaw County authorities have taken the lead in the case because the killing happened in their jurisdiction.

"I think the case is being consolidated. I think everyone's agreed to let everything proceed in Kershaw County," Sloan said.

Beverly Hope Melton, 30, of 3685 Victory Road, was kidnapped after she left a convenience store near Jefferson in Chesterfield County on Dec. 26.

Melton's body was later found in a field near the Mount Pisgah area of Kershaw County.

GOP Candidates head to South Carolina; can Romney be stopped?

COLUMBIA — Mitt Romney swept into South Carolina on Wednesday in pursuit of a confirming victory in the race for the Republican presidential nomination, buoyed by a second straight electoral triumph, bulging campaign coffers and warm words from the state's pre-eminent practitioner of tea-party politics.

"I don't want to be overconfident," said the Republican front-runner. But increasingly, he was talking about his plans for challenging President Barack Obama in the fall, not his primary foes of the moment.

Running out of time, his GOP rivals showed no sign of surrender.

Newt Gingrich welcomed Romney into the first Southern primary state with a fresh attack on his business career and a new television ad painting him as a flip-flopper on abortion. Said former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum, "South Carolina is going to be different. It is wide open for anyone."

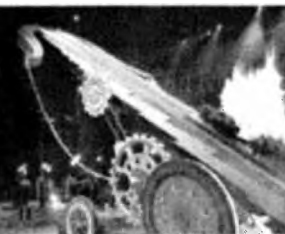

Discipline, management questioned

Driver: Help needed controlling bus riders

An Orangeburg Consolidated School District Five bus driver is asking trustees for help controlling the students.

Ishai Jennings, who drives buses for Orangeburg-area schools, reported that school administrators are not following through in disciplining students who misbehave on buses.

"When we do children write-ups for disciplinary problems and submit them to the schools, they're supposed to take action and return a copy of the form to us, and it's not being done," he said.

Jennings, who claimed to speak for the district's drivers, asked the trustee board on Tuesday to hire monitors to ride the school buses in the mornings and evenings.

Board Chair Mary Berry Ulmer told Jennings that trustees will consider his concerns.

"Those concerns are very important to us. As a board, we will get together, and we will not back down on setting these

In board meetings, the focus is on how students are doing academically, he said. "That's all well and good, but school does not stop once they get out. So much takes place on these buses that the board does not know anything about."

After the meeting, Superintendent Cynthia Wilson said the district has placed monitors on buses that have a lot of referrals, but putting them on every bus could prove to be very expensive.

"We need to weigh the cost and see if we can," she said.

Monitors have to have some training in handling children, or it wouldn't be any help to have them, she said.

"If it's a teacher or a staff worker, we would have to pay their hourly wages," she said.

The district has cameras on 60 to 65 percent of its 64 buses, and that's been very useful, according to Wilson.

"We can show them to principals and parents and that's been very, very beneficial," she said.

"The school is to have cameras on all

as many children on the bus at the same time," Wilson said.

The bus drivers are also requesting unemployment benefits during summer vacation when they don't get paid.

"We need compensation during the summer," Jennings said. "It's reasonable that we get paid. Our responsibilities at home don't stop."

Wilson said that District Five bus drivers are paid by the hour, and they don't get paid during the summer because they aren't working.

"It's a concern that we'd like to address, but given the economic status we've been experiencing ... it's something that we're going to try to work out," she said. An option might be to divide drivers' income in such a way that they can receive a paycheck all year round, she said.

The bus drivers also requested a raise, and Wilson noted that they received a 2 percent increase during the 2011-12 school year.

"We are one of the highest-paying districts," she said. "While not all of them and

Superintendent responds publicly to critical 'feedback'

A retired teacher and community activist says Orangeburg Consolidated School District Five's superintendent has made a number of mistakes since taking office, including giving a large pay raise to the finance head and taking an overly long vacation.

Speaking during OCSD 5's board meeting Tuesday, Deloris Frazier questioned the leadership of Superintendent

Cynthia Wilson. Afterward, Wilson said she appreciates all feedback from the public, both negative and positive.

"I speak to people almost on a daily basis who express an opinion," she said. "It's important to get feedback from people."

Frazier, who has spoken out against agency heads she disagrees with in the past, said she was speaking for a group of eight educators. Six of the members are still employed by the district and afraid to speak out, she said.

Her comments followed a weekend forum with the OCSD 5 Education Association in which employee morale and classroom discipline were major issues.

Frazier said she wants Wilson dismissed, in part, because she announced a \$75,000 salary

Frazier.

"Most staff, personnel and bus drivers do not make that kind of money in a year," she said.

But Wilson reported later that Boland was made supervisor over facilities and maintenance, which put him in charge of an additional 124 employees. His compensation for that was a salary increase of \$13,171, per year, she said.

Frazier also said that Wilson received a \$5,000 bonus and a month's vacation in 2011, before she'd been

in the district a year.

Wilson said, "I did not get a bonus."

She did take a vacation last summer, but Wilson said she didn't get more time off than most superintendents.

"I think I get three weeks, and I get sick days ... one sick day a month and something like three personal days a year," she said.

Frazier also complained about Wilson's decision to shut down the district's parenting program.

Wilson terminated at least six employees "with our young people having babies at an alarming rate here in Orangeburg," Frazier said.

Wilson said the parenting program was closed because the federal funds that paid for it were gone.

The district lost almost \$8

Romney's foes quiet attacks

Focus on Bain Capital role draws steady stream of ire across GOP

GOV. OMER — In a state grappling with high unemployment, Mitt Romney's GOP opponents figured they had an issue that could derail his hopes for a third straight win here in South Carolina.

But was their talk of Bain in vain? Both former Speaker Newt Gingrich and Texas Gov. Rick Perry were far more quiet Thursday about Romney's history with Bain Capital — a venture capital company that he

ran before getting elected governor of Massachusetts. The company shut down some companies that it had bought and laid off workers, prompting Perry to dub Romney a "culture capitalist" earlier in the week.

But this line of attack has drawn a steady stream of fire from many across the GOP spectrum.

During a Romney rally Wednesday, Gov. Nikki Haley said she is "proud of all of our Republican candidates... but

we have a real problem when we have Republicans talking like that. Democrats against the free market. We believe in the free market."

Former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee, who is hosting a FOX News forum with the candidate Saturday in Charleston, said he was surprised to see so many Republicans "embrace that left-wing argument against capital-

ism." "It's terrible for the workers who lose their jobs, and nobody likes to see viable companies closed and destroyed," Huckabee added. "But if downgrading can turn around a failing company, then at least it preserves all the jobs from being lost."

State Rep. Chip Lindsey, R-Charleston, said he will support Perry but is glad he seems to be backing away from calling Romney a "culture capitalist."

"To go back and second-guess Governor Romney and the decisions he

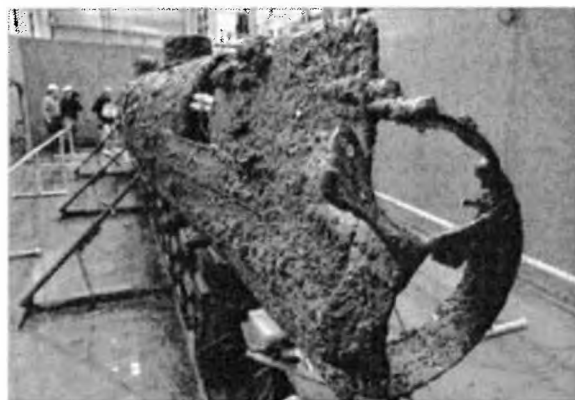

Hunley uncovered

With truss removed, scientists, visitors will get closest look yet at the Civil War sub

Scientists are pretty sure the Hunley isn't sinking, but it sure looks a little better today.

It's that's possible. On Thursday, engineers with Parker Riggings hoisted the Civil War-era submarine's lift truss out of its holding tank at the Warren

Lanch Construction Center, offering an unobstructed view of the Hunley for the first time. Will for

the first time in nearly 150 years. With the 1,200-pound steel support structure removed, the submarine's hope to begin exploring every square inch of its hull for clues as to why the Hunley sank in 1864. The submarine disappeared on Feb. 17, 1864, just after sinking the USS Housatonic, the first time a submarine sank an enemy ship.

MARKET PLEASANT — Food Lion shoppers at three local stores were greeted with "going out of business" signs Thursday, as the supermarket chain announced plans to close 126 stores nationwide, eliminating thousands of jobs.

In Mount Pleasant, where there has been fierce competition among 16 grocery stores, Food Lion is throwing in the towel, closing its two remaining East Cooper locations.

One Food Lion in Mount Pleasant also will close.

"I'm kind of attached to it," she said. "It's just convenient all the way around."

Judge orders arrest

Lindemann faces DUI charge
month after being sentenced
for felony mortgage offense

Former York County Councilman Paul Lindemann, free on bond awaiting a federal prison sentence for lying on a mortgage application, turned himself into federal authorities in Columbia Thursday after a judge ordered his arrest.

The court order followed Lindemann's arrest for driving under the influence and fleeing the scene of an accident in Fort Mill on Tuesday.

The arrest came just one month after U.S. District Court Judge Cameron Currie sentenced him to 18 months in jail for the felony mortgage offense.

On a 2008 home loan application for nearly \$1 million, Lindemann claimed he made more than \$15,000 a month, when his income was much less than that, said John Potter.

Automaker plans to hire 1,000 workers at Spartanburg plant

The X-factory is adding a new model to its lineup.

BMW Manufacturing Co. announced Thursday that it would invest \$900 million and hire 1,000 employees at its Spartanburg County plant during the next three years to add the new X4 and ramp up total production to 350,000 vehicles per year. The company, which currently employs about 7,000, will hire 300 workers this year and up its output to 300,000 vehicles.

Frank-Peter Arndt, the BMW

Group board member responsible for production, said the expansion would allow the plant to "extend the X family with the new BMW X4. I can assure you it will be another fascinating model by BMW."

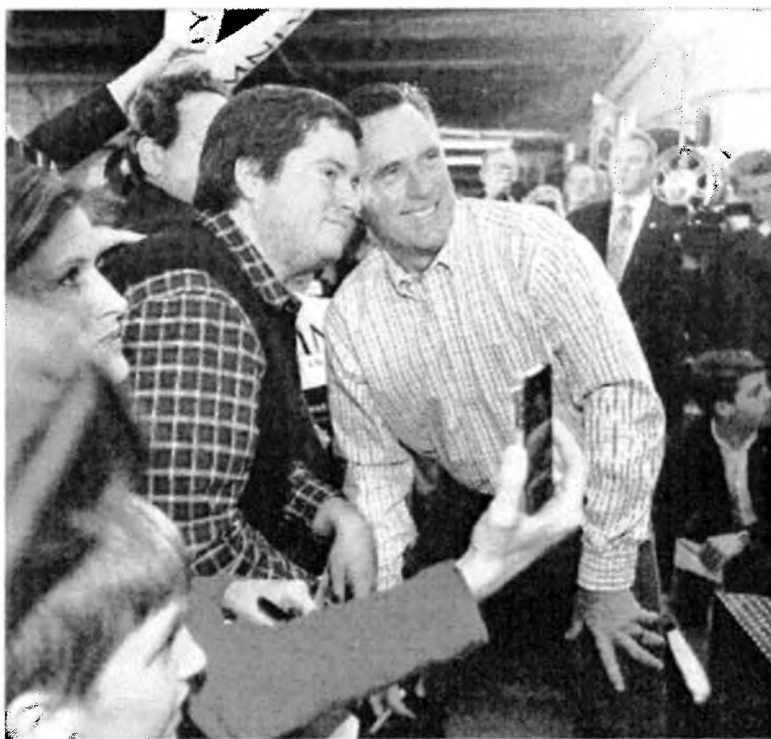
The Spartanburg plant already builds the X3, X5 and X6 models. The X6 is a coupe based on the X5 platform. The X4 is expected to be a smaller version of the X6.

Company officials had little else to say about the new vehicle, including a time frame for beginning production. It could be introduced as a 2014 model, meaning production could begin in 2013.

The announcement came amid the plant's celebration for building its 2 millionth vehicle. The Vermilion Red Metallic X3, built during

COLUMBIA — A state with chronically high unemployment is making it tougher for the jobless to draw benefits by trying to force people to take lower wage jobs and making it easier for laid-off workers to be declared ineligible.

New policies at South Carolina's Department of Employment and Workforce require people to accept job offers that pay incrementally less than their previous wages — eventually leading to minimum wage — and reducing the number of weeks someone let go for misconduct can receive benefits.

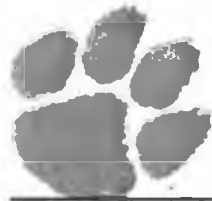

said. "It gave me a greater appreciation for the legislature as an institution, but also the state of South Carolina."

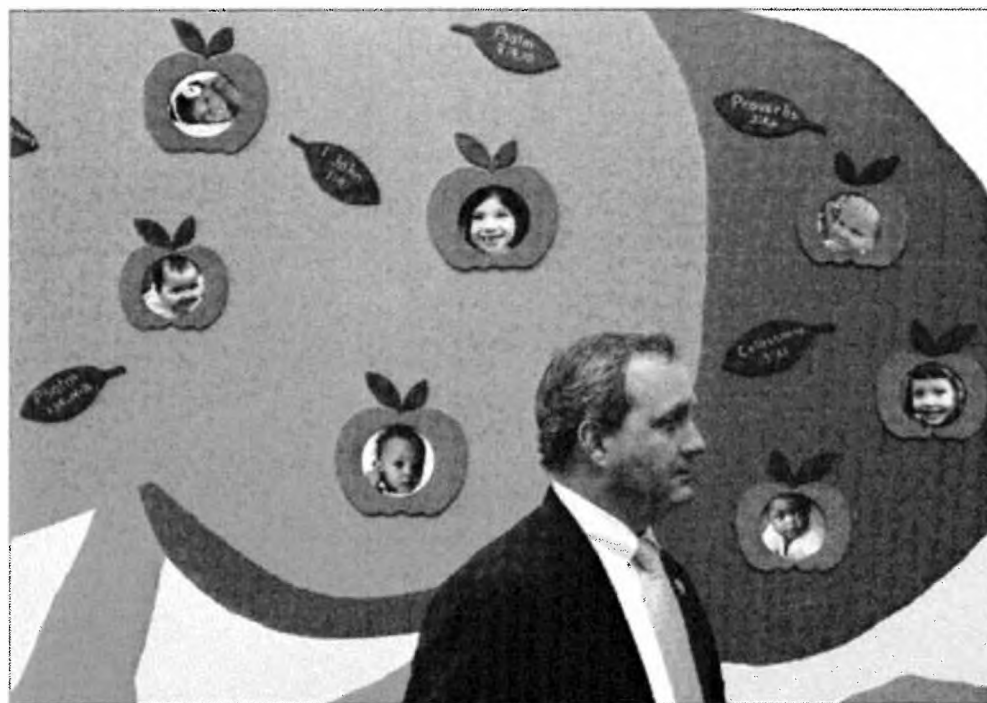
Good constituent service is what Agnew considers his biggest accomplishment during his time in the House. He

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Hawkins Slaying

Police seeking fifth suspect

FLORENCE — Florence police are looking for a fifth suspect in connection with the New Year's Day shooting that claimed the life of community activist Michael Hawkins.

Twenty-five year-old Lakavis Antonio Harrison, also known as Kavis, is wanted on charges of murder, armed robbery,

possession of a weapon during the commission of a violent crime, first-degree burglary and conspiracy, said Florence Police Chief Anson Shells.

Harrison's last known address was 308 N. Chase St. He is a black male, 5 feet 6 inches tall and weighs 145 pounds. He has black hair, brown eyes and tattoos on

both of his arms and hands. He should be considered armed and dangerous.

"We believe Mr. Harrison is still in the Florence area," Shells said. "And if there's anybody helping this individual avoid apprehension, they need to turn him into the police as soon as possible to avoid getting themselves into trouble. Any form of helping a wanted suspect is hindering a police investigation."

Four teenagers also have been

arrested on the same charges in the Hawkins slaying. Hawkins' next-door neighbor, 19-year-old Jacquell McCullum of 911 W. Harmony St.; 17-year-old Jacob White of 712 Habitat Lane; a 16-year-old and a 15-year-old. The 16-year-old will be tried as an adult, Shells said. His name could be released at a later date, but Shells said he wanted to confer with the solicitor before identifying the teen. The 15-year-old's name also has not been

released because he is a minor, Shells said.

Hawkins was shot to death Jan. 1 after three people entered the back door of his home at 909 Harmony St. about 8:20 p.m. on Jan. 1 and held him and his daughter at gunpoint.

Hawkins was shot twice and died from his injuries. His 18-year-old daughter was uninjured.

FLORENCE — Florence School District 1 trustees voted to recommend the Office of Research and Statistics (ORS) Plan 1.3 redistricting map during the board's meeting Thursday night.

District 9 board member Will McLeod moved for a vote on ORS Plan 1.3 after District 4 board member the Rev. Alexis Pipkins' motion and vote to recommend NAACP Plan 2 failed.

After discussion and a vote, the board passed the new redistricting map by a vote of 5-3. District 8 board member Kent Caudle was not present.

The recommended plan puts the black voting-age population in McLeod's district in line with the school board's benchmark plan.

The map passed follows the necessary requirements of Section 5 under the Voting Rights Act of 1965 which requires that a new plan maintain a strong minority population in that district and prevent retrogression.

The new plan, titled Florence School District 1 Proposed Recommendation Plan, puts the black voting age population of District 9 at 45.84 percent.

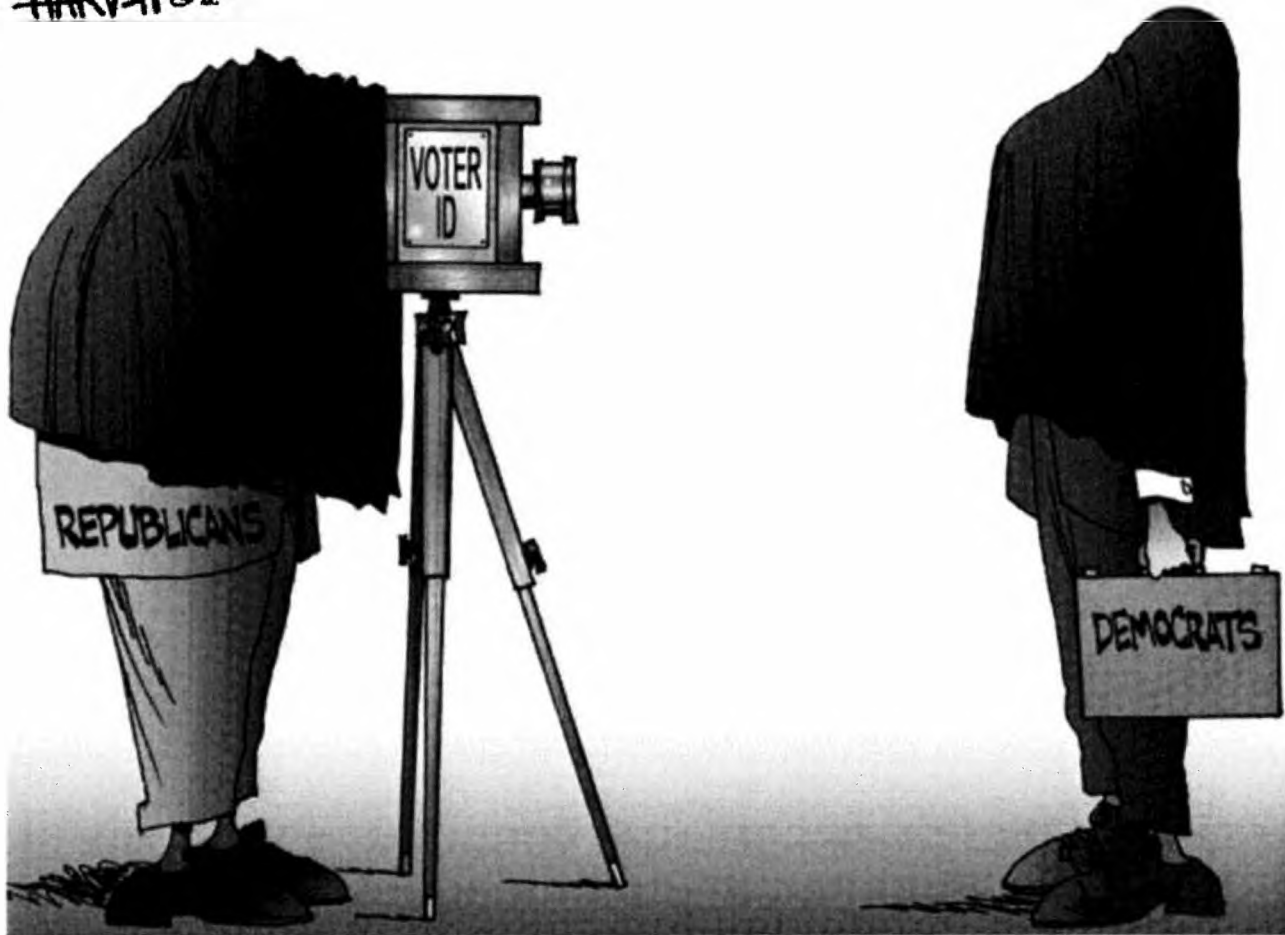

SC jobless rate drops to 9.5%

COLUMBIA — South Carolina's jobless rate plunged to its lowest rate in three years in December as an improving economy had employers putting more people to work making, moving and selling goods.

The 9.5 percent unemployment rate in December was down from 9.9 percent in November and marked the fourth straight month of declines in a state that's suffered among the highest unemployment rates in the country for years.

The lower rate remains well above the national rate of 8.5 percent in December.

But South Carolina has not seen an unemployment rate this low since it was at 9.2 percent in the midst of the Great Recession in December 2009.

And the news isn't great everywhere: Only six of the state's 46 counties reported lower unemployment rates. And Marion County had the state's highest jobless rate, 17.9 percent, up from 17.4 percent. Lexington County's rate of 7 percent was the state's lowest and up from 6.9 percent in December.

There were 3,800 fewer people working nonfarm jobs in December, but that overall category gained 17,800 jobs in the past year.

SC House files anti-union bill, gov signs order

COLUMBIA — South Carolina Republican lawmakers vowed Tuesday to get even tougher on unions in a state where union bashing is a marketing tool, with moves that critics call needless appeals to GOP voters.

Gov. Nikki Haley said the state's anti-union status is her best tool for recruiting businesses to South Carolina. The state ranks as seventh-least unionized, with membership accounting for 4.6 percent of workers, according to 2010 data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"That is the one thing companies love — not only that we don't have to fight the unions as much, but that there is a governor who is flat out saying we don't want you in our state," said Haley.

The governor devoted much of her State of the State address last week to laying out the unwelcome road to unions.

It's a familiar line of attack in the South Carolina Legislature. But Haley said the new measures are needed to keep unions out as the state works to attract more industry and bring down its chronically high unemployment rate, which improved to 9.5 percent in December.

Two things happened Tuesday: The governor, as she promised last week, signed an executive order to ensure striking workers don't get union payment benefits. And the House GOP caucus introduced a bill strengthening the state's already tough "right to work" law. The state's right-to-work status means employees don't have to join a labor union as a condition of their employment. State Representative Bill Sandifer, R-Seneca, drafted the bill.

Critics contend it's about luring Republicans with red meat in the red-voting state, not fixing any problem.

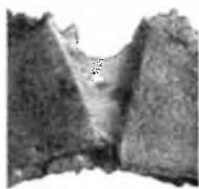
"This is politics of distraction at its worst," said Phil Bailey, spokesman for the Senate Democratic Caucus. Referring to Haley, he said, "It's straw man politics. She's built up a dummy so she can knock it down."

Rep. Gilda Cobb Hunter called the measures overkill.

"I don't understand the point. Most of what's included in here is already in state law. How many times do we have to say we don't want unions? I think that message is pretty clear," said Cobb Hunter. D-Orangeburg.

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Dangerous drugs lurk on horizon

Synthetic stimulants resurface under new names. Bath salts are now 'glass cleaner,' air freshener

Different name, same old stuff.

That's the bad news from law enforcement officers across South Carolina who say they're seeing a resurgence in synthetic drugs known during their near epidemic last summer as "bath salts." What is essentially the same stuff — man-made chemicals with the same, or enhanced, powers of naturally occurring substances such as marijuana or cocaine — is

appearing in stores under new names. The ingredients are slightly different, which could allow them to circumvent existing laws and bans if challenged.

Law enforcement in the Upstate recently became aware of products being labeled as "glass cleaner" and sold in convenience stores and other locations in portions of Spartanburg County. The "glass cleaner" is actually a variant of the "bath salts" and poses the same serious dangers to potential users.

Shake-and-bake meth equals big burns

ST. LOUIS — A crude new method of making methamphetamine poses a risk even to Americans who never get anywhere near the drug. It is filling hospitals with thousands of uninsured burn patients requiring millions of dollars in advanced treatment — a burden so costly that it's contributing to the closure of some burn units.

So-called shake-and-bake meth is produced by combining raw, unstable ingredients in a 2-liter

soda bottle. But if the person mixing the noxious brew makes the slightest error, such as removing the cap too soon or accidentally perforating the plastic, the concoction can explode, searing flesh and causing permanent disfigurement, blindness or even death.

An Associated Press survey of key hospitals in the nation's most active meth states showed that up to a third of patients in burn units were hurt while making meth, and most

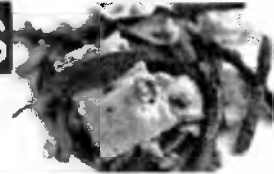

Denmark to get hospital

ORANGEBURG — The new regional hospital for Bamberg and Darke counties will be built on U.S. 79 near the intersection of Gibson's Branch Road just outside of Denmark, it was announced at the Bamberg County Hospital Board meeting Tuesday night.

Rick Greene of Dobbs Equity Partners LLC delivered the news to board members.

The site is within 10 to 12 minutes travel time for 80 percent of the population of the two counties, Greene said.

The South Carolina Regional Health System, a Dobbs affiliate, has acquired options to purchase the land and will take over ownership of the two hospitals once they complete the Chapter 9 bankruptcy process, according to a press release provided by Greene.

Greene said the new hospital will be a two-story structure which will begin as a 25-bed facility that can be expanded to 49 beds, with the necessary infrastructure to add a third floor if the need arises.

The Certificate of Need application is expected to be filed with the Department of Health and Environmental Control by Jan. 31. It will take an estimated three and a half years to complete the new hospital.

"Our challenge in health care now until you open the doors," said Randy Maxwell, a member of the Bamberg County Hospital Board.

Once the hospitals are purchased, "we have a contractual commitment within 12 months to have operational multi-specialty centers in both counties," Greene said.

Greene cited the difficulty in recruiting physicians, noting the greatest need would be for at least two primary care physicians in each county.

"I drive to the helicopter fly over two to three times a week, and think that's a life being saved. Will that continue?" board member Al Palmer asked. Greene assured him it would.

"So the ER will stay open?" Palmer asked. "That's a different question," Greene said. "I've consistently said and my preference is for the ER to stay open, but the reality is we can't continue to lose money."

He said the Bamberg County Hospital emergency room is losing on average approximately \$200,000 a month.

"It's family money. It's my money, and it's John Dobbs' money," Greene said.

"There's a tremendous amount that goes through the ER that isn't emergency," he added.

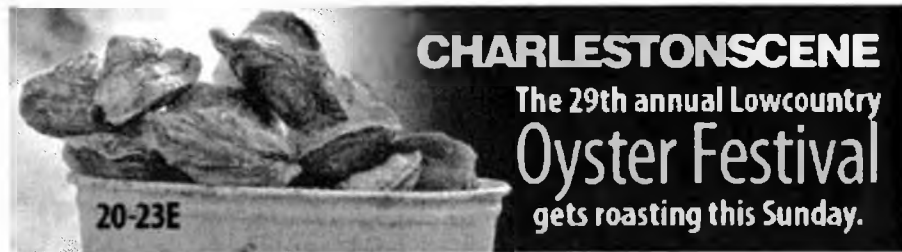

'Hatred, greed and jealousy'

Victim's daughter tormented by questions

LINCOLNVILLE — When Joy Holmes needed help on her homework Monday night, she didn't know it would be the last time her father would drop everything for her.

Leland M. Shannon Jr., 60, was having a drink with friends when he stopped to help his 20-year-old daughter with her college psychology assignment. She's studying social work and wants to open a shelter for the homeless someday.

They later exchanged "I love you's," and Holmes started to get ready for bed.

But just after midnight, three men broke into their first Carolina Avenue mobile home. One of the burglars shot Shannon once in the leg and twice in

the chest with a shotgun. One then penetrated a shotgun at Holmes' head, while another held an A.K.-47 to her chest.

One of the three said, "Come on, hurry up," and they left without hurting her, she told sheriff's deputies.

Her father died within seven hours.

The crime, which investigators viewed as a calculated and focused hit, shocked and has a father's children fatherless. It didn't make sense to Holmes. Why would someone want to kill a man who would do anything to help members of the Lincolnville senior community where he has lived since birth?

"If you needed anything he had, he'd give it to you. If he had food and you didn't, he'd feed you," Holmes said. "He couldn't do everything for all seven

Catawbas plan to build casino

York County tribe faces opposition to building parlor on reservation

CATAWBA INDIAN RESERVATION — In a bold and shocking action that has already drawn cries of a fight from conservative political leaders, York County's Catawba Indian tribe is moving ahead with plans to build a massive gaming casino on its York County reservation.

The tribe's new leadership announced their intent in papers attached to a lawsuit filed Tuesday against the state.

The lawsuit claims state laws enacted in 2005 — allowing casino boat gambling off the Charleston coast — give the tribe the right to build and open the state's largest gaming parlor, buttressed by an entertainment complex and hotel that would generate more than a half-

billion dollars.

The Catawbas, the state's only federally recognized tribe, claim the tribe's 1993 settlement of a land claim with the state and federal governments allows it to open the casino, court papers state.

Construction would start next year and finish in 2014, and employ almost 4,000 people during construction and operation.

At the tribal Longhouse Wednesday, Chief Bill Harris declined to elaborate on the lawsuit.

"The lawsuit states we feel we are entitled to gaming on reservation lands," Harris said. "That's the avenue we are taking."

Assistant Chief Wayne George

and other Catawba executive committee members who run the tribe's daily and political affairs agreed with the lawsuit and decision to move forward on the casino, but declined comment Wednesday.

The tribe is asking the courts to keep law enforcement officials from confiscating any gaming machines while the lawsuit is heard in

Winstead pleads guilty to DWI

York County councilman pays \$1,022 fine, loses driver's license

York County Councilman Eric Winstead has pleaded guilty and paid a \$1,022 fine for his December drunken driving arrest.

Winstead, who represents District 3, covering much of western York County, pleaded guilty to a first offense driving under the influence — with a blood alcohol content of at least 0.10 but less than 0.16 — on Jan. 12 in the Bethel J. Kings Mountain Magistrate Court.

"I feel good about having that part behind me," Winstead said Wednesday. "As behind me as it gets."

Winstead is completing a mandatory program at Keystone Substance Abuse Services and has lost his driver's license for six months, but he recently got a provisional license. Winstead also was charged with driving with an open container of beer or wine, but that charge was dropped.

According to a York County Sheriff's Office report:

- Arcadia on Monday Dec. 10, a deputy pulled Winstead over for noticing his vehicle was weaving.
- Winstead was riding with an empty and open Crown Royal whiskey bottle in the passenger seat.
- He failed road sobriety tests, with a blood alcohol level of 0.11 — above the legal limit of 0.08.

Winstead, a chaplain at Hospice Care of South Carolina at the time, was driving his truck from an open house for a new location in York County when he was pulled over.

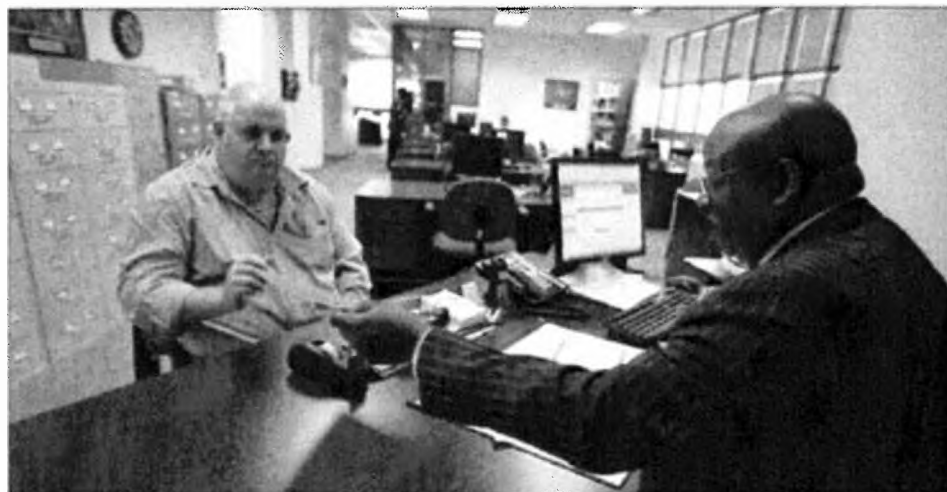
He has no prior criminal history in South Carolina, state records show.

His driving record for the past 20 years lists one speeding violation of 10 mph or less.

Winstead's court date had been set for later this month, but he moved it up, according to court records.

At a Dec. 26 York County Council meeting, Winstead apologized to the public and his family and said he would no longer run for the mayor's office.

SEALs rescue 2 in raid

9 kidnappers killed
in Somali night strike

MOGADISHU, Somalia — Held captive since last fall, an ailing American woman and a Danish man will soon be safely on their way home after a bold, dark-of-night rescue by U.S. Navy SEALs. The commandos slipped into a Somali encampment, shot and killed nine captors and whisked the hostages to freedom.

The raid's success was welcome news for the hostages and their families, for the military and for President Barack Obama, who was delivering his State of the Union speech and beginning a five-state tour as the mission wrapped up. He did not mention it in his address but dropped a hint upon arriving in the House chamber by telling Defense Secretary Leon Panetta, "Good job tonight."

It was the second high-profile SEAL Team 6 success in less than a year, following last May's killing of Osama bin Laden in Pakistan.

The SEALs encountered resistance from the kidnappers at the encampment, two U.S. officials said, and there was a firefight during an approximately 1- to 1½-hour operation.

One defense official said it was likely that the SEALs killed the kidnappers rather than capture them because they encountered armed resistance or the

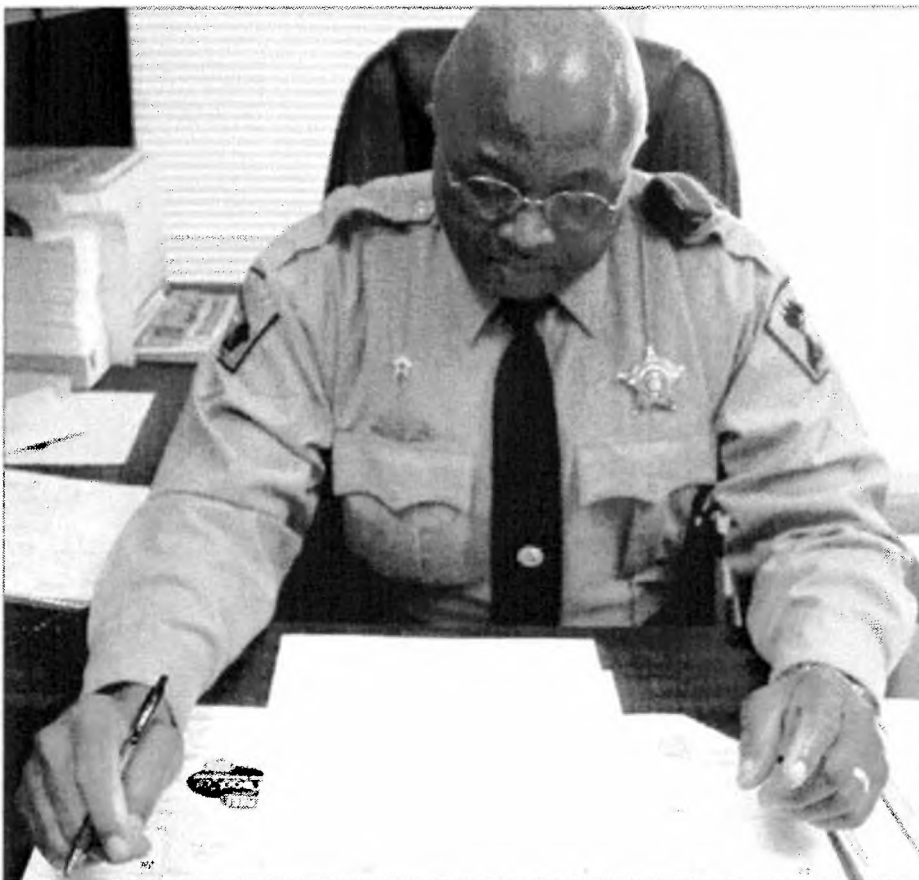
Ingram Moon said she did not

Officials react to State of the Union

Duncan calls President's
address a 'campaign speech'

Millions of Americans tuned in Tuesday night as President Barack Obama delivered the State of the Union address in front of a divided Congress.

During the 65-minute speech, the president advocated for an active government that ensures economic fairness, a position that stands in stark contrast to his Republican opponents, many of whom have demanded government take a step back and let the free market guide the economy.

Reaction to the president's address has been predictably partisan, with many Democrats lauding Obama's proposals, while many Republicans reduced the address to election-year jangling.

Republican Third District U.S. Rep. Jeff Duncan noted, as one of the most conservative members in the U.S. House, he thought Obama was in campaign mode Tuesday night.

"It was a campaign speech, when you get right down to it, versus a State of the Union," Duncan said. "A lot of the same old rhetoric that we've heard. I'm an unabashed conservative, and he's an unabashed progressive. So we are going to see things differently. It's obvious from his rhetoric that he sees things differently."

WASHINGTON — The applause rolled through the big chamber, growing ever louder as hundreds of Republicans and Democrats suddenly realized Rep. Gabrielle Giffords was back in the House.

But this time she had come to say goodbye.

Fellow lawmakers gave her a fitting send-off: cheers, hugs, a cascade of tributes and plenty of tears in a rare moment of political unity.

A year since that fateful Saturday morning, when Giffords was

severely wounded during a shooting rampage in her home district, the Arizona congresswoman resigned Wednesday with a plea for civility — and a hint that she'll be back on the national stage. For now, the 41-year-old said, her movements and speech still halting, she needs to focus on her recovery.

For all the kind words showered on her, Giffords reflected in her resignation letter about a level of respect that seems like an aberration these days in a bitterly divided Washington.

In her five years in Congress, she said, "Always I fought for what I thought was right. But

never did I question the character of those with whom I disagreed. Never did I let pass an opportunity to join hands with someone just because he or she held different ideals."

Said Republican Rep. Ted Poe of Texas in the first of many tributes: "Gabby is the spirit of bipartisanship that we should all learn from."

Giffords' friend Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz, D-Fla., became emotional before reading Giffords' resignation letter in the well of the House. Rep. Jeff Flake, R-Ariz., held Giffords' hand.

Election director: Dead voter reports not correct

COLUMBIA — An initial review of allegations about votes cast under dead people's names reveals clerical errors and problems with records — but doesn't indicate fraud, a top elections official told legislators Wednesday.

The issue arose before the first-in-

the-South presidential primary that took place last weekend, and it's part of the fallout from a new South Carolina law requiring voters to show government-issued photographic identification to vote in person. The U.S. Justice Department challenged the law.

Two weeks ago, Department of Motor Vehicles Executive Director Kevin Shwedo told a House panel that his

agency's analysis of state voter ID data that votes were cast under the names of 953 dead people over the past six years. With the presidential primary looming, he turned the issue over to the State Law Enforcement Division and state Attorney General Allen Wilson to investigate.

State Election Commission Executive Director Marci Andino joined

the call for the investigation, but said Wednesday that a look at some of the cases shows run-of-the-mill problems with dated records or sloppy practices.

Andino told legislators that Shwedo had never told her about the issue of dead voters before taking it to the

Lawsuit won't stop regional hospital plans, officials say

BARBERG — Barber County officials say a lawsuit against Barnwell County officials won't harm their plans to work together to build a regional health care system.

Barber County Council Chairman Chris Wilson said he could not comment on the lawsuit. But he's confident the regional hospital system will be developed.

"We are continuing to move forward with closing this transaction, and hope that we are able to do so," Wilson said.

Barber and Barnwell counties are working with

an affiliate of Memphis, Tenn.-based Dobbs Equity Partners LLC to develop a regional health care system that will ultimately lead to the construction of a 25- to 40-bed regional hospital.

Rick Greene, Dobbs senior vice president, said Tuesday the new regional hospital will be built on U.S. 78 near the intersection of Olsen's Branch Road just outside of Denmark, South Carolina. Regional Health System, a Dobbs affiliate, will take over ownership of the two hospitals once they complete the Chapter 9 bankruptcy process.

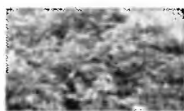

City targets Internet cafes

Council questions nature of games

Walk into some of the Internet cafes specking around Charleston, and you'd think you are stepping back into South Carolina's long gone days of video poker.

Roses of computer monitors line the floor, and brightly lit video screens invite players to test their skills playing games dubbed "Joker Poker" and "Clower Fields."

Instead of payouts, you get a chance to win "sweepstakes," and operators tell you the proceeds go to charities. Charleston City Council, however, wants to know more.

This week council took a first step toward controlling the spread of the cafes, passing the first reading of an ordinance declaring a moratorium on Internet gaming, permits or licenses for Internet cafe-type setups.

That includes arcades and game rooms where "simulated gambling



devices" might operate. Councilman Aubrey Alexander raised the concern about the spread, saying he doesn't know enough about them or how they operate to gauge the effects they might be having on the community.

By definition the ordinance, "device" is defined as any mechanical or electrical contrivance, computer terminal, video or other equipment that may or may not be capable of downloading games from a central server system, machine, computer or other device or equipment.

A group of parent leaders asked the school board this week to require parents or guardians to give eight hours of their time annually to their children's schools. Parents would receive a rating of "highly engaged" or "emerging" at the end of the year based on whether they fulfilled that commitment.

Parents behind the proposal say the "Family Partnership Agreement" would be a way of informing and encouraging parents to get involved, but others see it as fraught with problems.

The school board didn't make a

decision, but board members likely will consider it again at a future meeting. Their reactions were mixed. Some, such as member Candy Behn-Gross, who vehemently supported the premise.

"I love it," she said. "When can we start?"

Others, such as Elizabeth Moffit, said it appeared as if parents were being held accountable for their actions, while schools were not.

"I think there's more to it than what's written," she said.

The placards, hawked every thing from mattresses to real estate, are stapled to poles and stuck in the ground all over the rural island, he said. Not only are they an eyesore, he said, but they fall down and litter the highways. Then moving across drive over them, chop them into little pieces and scatter them.

The illegally placed signs are a growing problem not only on Jobis Island but also across the region. Most enforcement officials say they are trying to stay on top of the problem by removing the signs and warning those who posted them not to do it again.

Sam Browder and some other island residents think that if enforcement of the law hit a few chronic sign posters with whopping fines, it would deter others from putting them up.

"It's just gotten out of hand on Jobis Island," Browder said. "This uglifies our community."

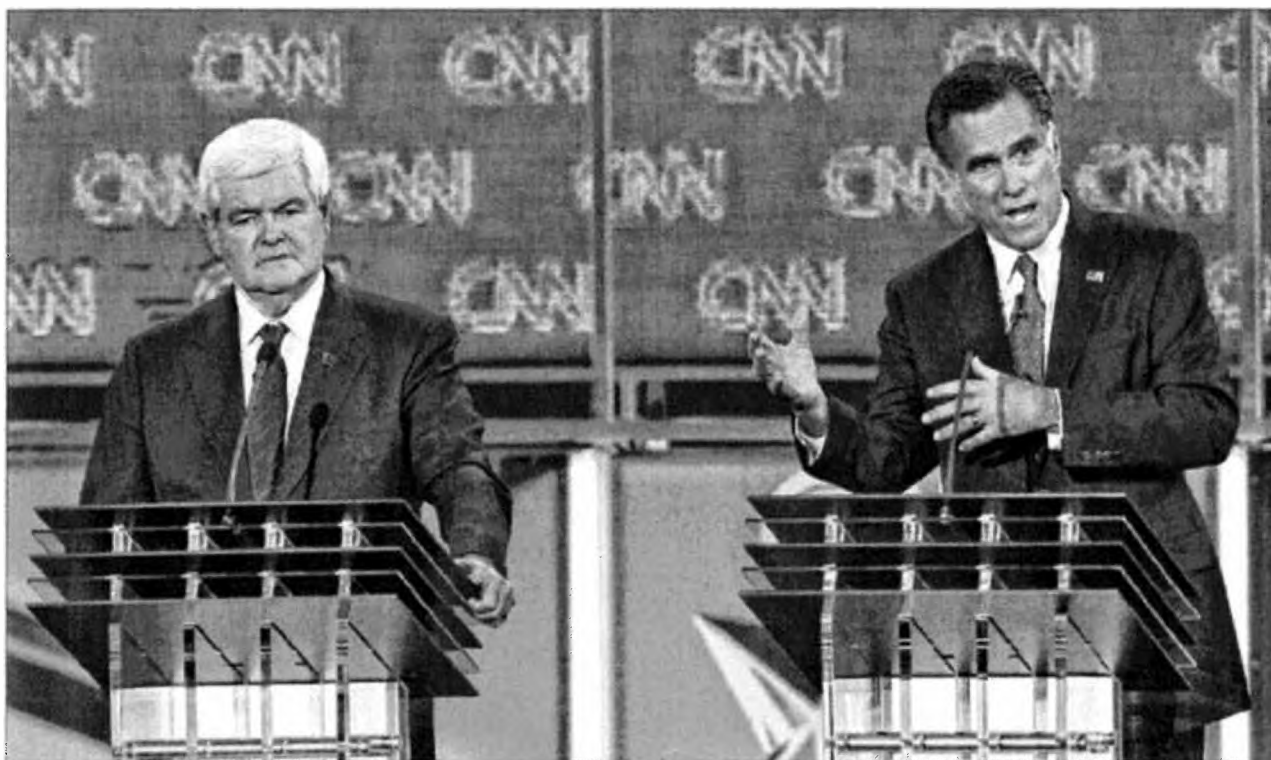

The problem is, plainly, gambling.

There is no way around it. This fight is over money and whether the Catawbas have a right to make it the way other Indian tribes do — huge casinos that attract thousands of visitors who spend not just millions, but billions.

A casino would employ thousands and fill state coffers with taxes, tribal leaders maintain, but several area politicians say a casino is not an acceptable way to boost the economy.

York County Council Chairman Britt Blackwell, a Republican who generally wears the label of pro-business, said Thursday a casino is "not the kind of economic development we are envisioning."

Although the County Council has not met to discuss the casino, Blackwell as chairman said he is confident the group will stand with law enforcement and state politicians who oppose the casino.

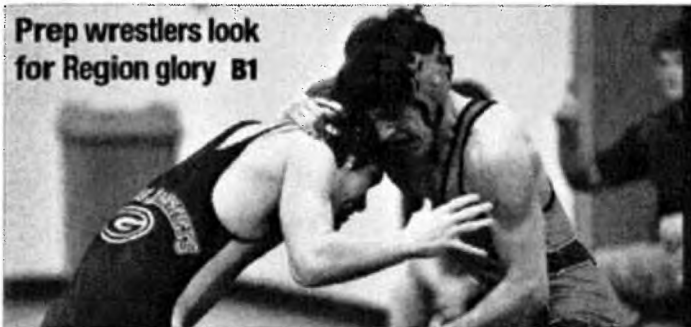

Highland Baking to bring 200 jobs

Chicago-based company buys former Mrs. Smith's facility on Hearon Circle

A Chicago-based baking company is cooking up job growth for Spartanburg County.

Highland Baking Co. has purchased the former Mrs. Smith's bakery at Hearon Circle for \$4 million. The company will use the facility for its new baked goods distribution center.

CoStar Group, a national commercial real estate database headquartered in Washington, D.C., reported the real estate transac-

tion for the property's sale on Wednesday.

County Councilman David Britt said the company's proposed capital investment in the plant is for \$11 million and he expects the project will create about 200 jobs.

"We're very excited about this project," Britt said. "There are a lot of moving parts that have not been finalized. We have made our commitments at the county level and are happy that they've bought the facility."

The transaction stated that

Highland had purchased the 240,000-square-foot bakery at 7001 Asheville Highway and adjacent 8,000-square-foot retail building at 7101 Asheville Highway from Cornerstone GSP LLC for the purpose of opening a distribution center.

Spartanburg County Council adopted a resolution for an inducement agreement and passed the first reading of incentives and infrastructure credits for the project under the codename "Project Rise" at its meeting on Monday.

Britt said the project had been

coded at Highland's request. It is currently clearing its final hurdles at the state level, he said.

Company spokesman John Updegraff could not be reached for comment on Thursday.

The facility has sat vacant since Schwan Food Co. shuttered the plant in March 2008, eliminating more than 500 positions.

"It's going to be great for the Hearon Circle to have that facility back," Britt said. "The ripple

Traffic Enforcement Commission finds no need to alter law

A state commission assigned to study the use of traffic cameras to catch speeders has recommended that a recent ban on the cameras remain in place.

The S.C. Traffic Enforcement Commission filed its nine-page report Jan. 13 after examining the legal, ethical and policy issues associated with the cameras, like those

Ridgeland police used on Interstate 95 until a law enacted last year forced them to stop.

The report found no need to alter the law passed in response to Ridgeland's cameras.

The law bans the use of cameras to enforce speeding laws and issue tickets based upon photographic evidence.

The 13-member commission was tasked with answering more than 20 questions related to the use of traffic cameras. It was supposed to have submitted the report by Nov. 1 but did not hold its first meeting until after the deadline had passed, according to state records.

Firestorm at Pickett Post

Old guard, new leadership at odds over future

WALHALLA — As founding members of the Pickett Post Fire Department, John and Ella Mae Roach don't like the direction they feel the department is headed.

The couple claims that Fire Chief Jeff Heaton is misusing the department's fundraising account and leading the small, rural fire station toward financial ruin.

They say Heaton is "slipping around," making changes to the department by laws, signing for bank notes that put the fire station up as collateral, and spending money on hotels, car rentals and meals at Arby's that they don't feel are legitimate.

A frustrated Heaton picks his words carefully when talking about the Roaches, not even using their names until asked if that's who he is discussing. He sums the controversy up as a generational dispute.

Heaton says the by-law changes were approved by a majority of the 27 member department at a meeting the Roaches attended. He says the property being used to back a loan to expand the station is in the department's name and that, as chief, he is authorized to sign on behalf of the department. As for the travel expenses, he explains that they were associated with a training session members attended on the East Coast.

"Every expense is legitimate," he says.

County Fire Chief Charles King acknowledged that the Roaches brought their concerns to the county and said they are being acted on. King claims the issue is not a "police matter," but said he has asked a third-party auditor to go over the department's books.

Heaton identified the accounting firm as Greene, Finney and Hatten, a Mandolin based group of CPAs.

Plans move ahead

Proof of citizenship bill passes through subcommittee

COLUMBIA — Plans to require better proof of citizenship to register to vote in South Carolina have won an early test in the state Senate and opened the door to a new round of arguments about voting rights.

A Senate Judiciary subcommittee on Thursday approved a bill that says citizenship proof can come from documents that include a driver's license, birth certificate, United States passport or tribal identification.

The U.S. Justice Department last month rejected a new South Carolina law that requires people to show government-issued photographic identification when they vote in person.

Sen. Chip Campsen of the Isle of Palms says the measure is needed to keep people from registering to vote who have lied about being citizens.

Campsen said people who will lie about their citizenship status to get and keep jobs will lie to vote. He said his bill is not just an effort to rehash the voter ID law.

"This bill is about determining someone's citizenship — establishing your citizenship — when you register to vote to make sure that people who are not U.S. citizens do not vote," Campsen said.

"I can't think of a more defensible concept," Campsen said. The citizenship measure cleared the panel with a 2-1 vote and now heads to the full Senate Judiciary Committee.

Columbia Democratic Sen. John Scott voted against the measure. Scott said that bill and others Campsen backs are an effort to keep people from voting.

"This is again about attacking people when they come to the polls and questioning whether they are American citizens and should be able to vote," Scott said.

And, as he did last year, Scott said

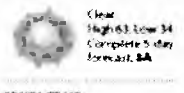

Romney takes big lead in Florida

GOP rivals shift
to other states

ORLANDO, Fla. — Mitt Romney opened a commanding lead in Florida on Sunday, driving his rivals to start shifting their sights to other states as more suitable battlegrounds to keep challenging him for the Republican presidential nomination.

Three new polls showed the former Massachusetts governor setting a double-digit lead over his nearest competitor, former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, in Florida, where voting will end Tuesday.

Rep. Ron Paul, Romney of Texas and Sen.

Mike Lee, R-Utah, trailed far behind, with little hope of victory in a state where the winner would take all 30 delegates, and the rest will get nothing.

Gingrich planned to barnstorm the state by air today in a primary, the path to close the gap. But he also looked for the likely loss on Tuesday, insisting the anti-Romney vote eventually will erode around him.

"We will go off to the convention," he said Sunday. Santorum, who suspended a campaign after the hospital bedside of his ailing 1-year-old daughter, sent

Tracking system fails to curb rise in meth labs

A system that tracks sales of the legal cold medicine needed to cook meth failed to check the growth of meth labs at a time when cleanup costs shifted from the federal government to state and local taxpayers.

Authorities in South Carolina said they had 257 meth lab incidents in 2011, up from 155 the previous

year, according to the Drug Enforcement Administration's El Paso Intelligence Center.

The increase represents a setback in the battle against residue that authorities said is often laden with toxic and potentially explosive chemicals that have polluted homes, motel rooms and roadsides.

Lab incidents rose as state authorities began using NPLEX to track sales of pseudoephedrine in an ef-

fort to keep cooks from acquiring large quantities of the decongestant used by cold and allergy sufferers.

It also came as federal dollars for meth lab cleanup evaporated and costs suddenly shifted to local law enforcement agencies before state legislators stepped in to pick up the tab.

The pharmaceutical industry-funded NPLEX amid growing calls to require prescriptions for pseudo-

ephedrine, a step taken by Oregon and Mississippi. The medicine remains available without a prescription in South Carolina, but the drug is kept behind the counter, and buyers must show an identification card.

In its first full year in the state, the system blocked the sale of 46,408 boxes of pseudoephedrine — 108,281 grams — while authorities conducted 2,224 searches, said Carlos

Gutierrez the director of state government relations for the Consumer Healthcare Products Association, the group supporting NPLEX.

"NPLEX's job is to stop the illegal sale of pseudoephedrine, and I think it has done that," he said.

Authorities hoped the system would cut back on a practice they call "smurfing," which is collecting

Syrian troops hit sites near capital

Regime targets dissidents; scores killed nationwide

BEIRUT — Syrian troops stormed areas near Damascus on Sunday, shelling neighborhoods that have fallen under the control of army dissidents and clashing with fighters.

At least 62 people were killed in violence nationwide, activists and residents said.

The widespread offensive near the capital suggested the regime is worried that military defectors could close in on Damascus, which has remained relatively quiet while most other Syrian cities descended into chaos after the uprising began in March.

The rising bloodshed added urgency to Arab and Western diplomatic

assault rifles stop motorists and protect anti-regime protests.

Their presence so close to the capital is astonishing in tightly controlled Syria and suggests the Assad regime may be losing control or setting up a trap for the fighters.

Damascus residents reported hearing clashes in the nearby suburbs.

"The current battles taking place in and around Damascus may not yet lead to the unraveling of the regime, but the illusion of normalcy that the Assads have sought hard to maintain in the capital since the beginning of the revolution has surely unraveled," said Ammar Abdulhamid, a U.S.-based Syrian dissident.

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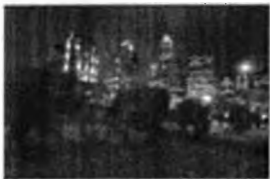

Why Woolworth plans are different this time

It has been more than 20 years since the last cash register sale at the F.W. Woolworth store on Main Street in Rock Hill.

Now, the Rock Hill Economic Development Corporation — owners of the building — the city, Nova Capital and the Turtle Company, are poised to announce a giant fix along a \$4.8 million deal to tear down the former five and dime store and replace it with a multi-story apartment development.

You've read this story before. From the day the former merchant closed, there have been front-page stories in The Herald about someone doing something at Woolworth, and the result would be one

giant step toward a vibrant downtown Rock Hill.

Some wanted to bring restaurants to the space. Others wanted to turn it into a museum. Others envisioned a court

of shops and eateries. In all cases, the result was more people, which would spur even more redevelopment downtown.

Those stories were followed by ones about those Woolworth projects failing through, followed by those expressing hope that someone else would make things happen.

What's different this time around, say RHEDC officials, is they are not pinning their dreams on hope.

"Hope is not a strategy," said Chairman Andrew Shene.

This time, Shene said, the critical

step has been taken — funding. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development is willing to guarantee a loan for multi-family housing, and Stephen Turner, the city's economic developer.

With this guarantee for primary financing in place, the development corporation, the city and the private developer — Nova Capital, where Jason Tuttle is the principal, and the Turtle Company — are moving forward. Turner said a final application to HUD should be ready by March, and if approved, construction could start in early 2013.

The project has been in the works for 40 years, said Skip Tuttle. Current

Three new polls showed the former Massachusetts governor seizing a double-digit lead over his nearest competitor, former House speaker Newt Gingrich, in Florida, where voting will end Tuesday.

Rep. Ron Paul of Texas and former Sen. Rick Santorum of Pennsylvania trailed far behind, with little hope of victory in a state where the winner will take at 50 delegates.

Gingrich planned to banish him the state by air today in a primary, one push to close the gap. But he also looked past the likely loss on Tuesday, insisting that the anti-Romney vote eventually will coalesce around him.

"We will go all the way to the convention," he said Sunday.

Santorum, who suspended campaigning to be at the hospital bedside of his 3-year-old daughter, sent couriers to Florida. He looked ahead to the next contest on Saturday in Nevada. His campaign is opening an office in Las Vegas.

Paul, who already abandoned Florida, wrapped up two days of campaigning in Maine, which also holds caucuses Saturday.

"I think that's a real good place for us to break through," he said.

Mitt's momentum lags

Romney opened his big lead in Florida as Gingrich's bounce off a win in South Carolina evaporated.

Romney led Gingrich by 42 to 27 percent in a new NBC/Marist poll, one of three polls with similar margins. Santorum had 14 percent, and Paul had 15 percent.

New cameras focus on downtown safety

Council might consider upgrading Wi-Fi network

New downtown security cameras will be fully operational next week, and Spartanburg City Council could decide in the next few months to upgrade the Wi-Fi network.

The city used about \$34,000 in federal funds to purchase 10 cameras for the downtown passenger station, with four on Dunbar Street and six for the SPARTA maintenance shop on Airflow Avenue, near the downtown memorial airport this past summer. The cameras, which are more technologically advanced than the older models purchased in 2007, have been installed and

will feed directly into the city's server, said city Communications Manager Will Rothschild.

"They have a wide angle and show a larger area with greater detail than the older models," he said.

The city first purchased digital cameras, which operate on the downtown wireless network, in 2007 after a sexual assault reported downtown. Those cameras are still in place atop the Advance America building, the clock tower, along Church Street near the Marriott and at the SPARTA bus station. There is also a camera at the Business Technology Center on Church Street, which was purchased by the business, but is maintained by the city.

Already built to look alike, Greenwood's three middle schools will soon share more in common: identical size at 133,000 square feet.

Brewer and Westview middle schools will receive a six-classroom addition, using areas prepared when both schools were built in the past decade. Matching these schools to the size of Northside Middle School, built from the beginning with six more classrooms, should help provide for the divergent needs of the students and teachers at the schools, according to District 50 officials. Since they were built, all three schools have come to host a choice or magnet program.

With preparatory work to begin shortly, the additions would ideally be ready by the 2012-13 year, according to Assistant Superintendent for Business Gary Johnson. This might be easier done for another project approved at the same time, he said, the renovations to Emerald High School's older gym and the construction of additional outdoor restroom facilities.

Jennifer Dodd never figured she'd wind up where she did. Not in a million years.

She was a caring and committed healthcare professional, not a thief. Not a criminal.

But there she was all the same, turning herself into the authorities, washing her nursing career down the drain, after she was caught stealing drugs from the hospital where she worked.

It all happened so fast. A year after she was diagnosed for rheumatoid arthritis, the pain increased and she need-

ed more and more pain-killing medication to make it through the day. It was hard to get

more. The drugs were expensive, and it was so tempting. The hospital kept the stuff she needed in easy reach. So she started sneaking pills from the distribution bin on the wing's floor to supplement her own Percocet prescription.

"I just felt that I needed more and more of it to get that ... it just kept me going," Dodd said. "It was just a euphoric feeling."

The euphoria was short lived. The scheme did work for awhile, but then someone noticed. An investigation followed. She was confronted by her superiors, drug tested, fired. An eight-year career

over, a life in turmoil.

It's hardly the first time it has happened. The Florence nurse is just one of many. Some 266 nurses have been arrested in South Carolina during the past four years on charges of drug diversion (and other offenses) related to the disappearance of millions of dollars worth of prescription drugs.

Prescription painkiller abuse has always been a problem, but it's only recently that it has become an epidemic, claiming, according to national statistics, 14,800 lives in 2008 through overdoses. That's a

Gingrich defensive after losing lead

MIAMI — Newt Gingrich slammed GOP rival Mitt Romney on Sunday for the steady stream of attacks he likened to "carpet-bombing," trying to cut into the resurgent front-runner's lead in Florida in the dwindling hours before Tuesday's pivotal presidential primary.

Surging ahead in polls, Romney kept the pressure on Gingrich, casting him at an appearance in south Florida as an influence peddler and continuing his heavy advertising blitz, questions the former House speaker's ethics.

In what has become a wildly unpredictable race, the momentum has swung back to Romney, staggered last weekend by Gingrich's victory in South Carolina. Romney has begun advertising in

Nevada ahead of that state's caucuses next Saturday, illustrating the challenges ahead for Gingrich, who has pledged to push ahead no matter what happens in Florida.

An NBC News/Marist poll published Sunday showed Romney with support from 42 percent of likely Florida primary voters, compared with 27 percent for Gingrich.

Romney's campaign has dogged Gingrich at his own campaign stops, sending surrogates to remind reporters of Gingrich's House ethics probe in the 1990s and other episodes in his career.

Gingrich reacted defensively, accusing the former Massachusetts governor and a political committee that supports him of lying, and the GOP's establishment of allowing it.

"I don't know how you debate a person with civility if they're prepared to say things that are just plain factually false," Gingrich said during appearances on Sunday talk shows. "I think the Republi-

WARMER WINTER BRINGS RELIEF FROM HEATING COSTS

North resident Lynn Robertson is thankful for the balmy winter temperatures that have been the norm throughout The Times and Democrat Region.

"I don't want to see more cold," Robertson said. She and her husband, Randy, are on a fixed income and are enjoying temperatures that have limited their heating needs.

The couple switched over to gas heating this year. That and the warmer temperatures have combined to provide them with significant savings, she said.

Robertson said last year at this time, her heating bill was about \$486 a month compared to \$150 now.

"I just thank God it is not high," Robertson said. "It really helps. We have used the heat less with the weather the way it is."

January is historically the coldest month of the year. This winter, Orangeburg has seen high temperatures in the 70s ten times and highs in the 60s 14 times, according to readings from the municipal airport.

The average high for Orangeburg this time of year is 56 degrees with the average low around 33. The coldest day thus far this winter was Jan. 3, which saw a high temperature of 40 and a Jan. 4 low of 19.

Weather officials blame the unseasonably warm fall and winter season on a La Nina pattern which

produces mild winters in the area.

Orangeburg Department of Public Utilities spokesman Randy Eilers said both natural gas usage and kilowatt per hour consumption have been below the utility's five-year average.

He said natural gas consumption is down about 21.7 percent, with natural gas costs slightly less this year versus last year. One therm of natural gas is 75 cents while last year it was 82 cents, Eilers said.

Based on an average consumption of 101 therms per month, potential savings from the reduced costs and lower usage could be as much as \$24, Eilers said.

Electricity consumption is down about 11.05 percent, but costs have increased to 10 cents per kilowatt hour compared to 9 cents last year, Eilers said.

Based on an average consumption of about 1,200 kilowatts per month, savings of about \$10 a month could be realized with the warmer temperatures.

"Consumption figures vary wildly among our customers," Eilers said, noting the figures are based on averages.

Chad Lowder, Tri-County Electric Cooperative spokesman, said the warmer weather led to a decrease in revenues but not a decrease in costs. He said there has been a 30 percent drop in energy sales from this time last year.

"The cost per unit is higher," Lowder said. "It is warmer, so energy sales are down right now and it obviously benefits our customers because their winter bills are down."

But Lowder said the utility's fixed costs have remained the same, and the price of power has increased by about 12 percent.

"We are able to absorb those costs now," he said. In the future, "It will depend on the cost of power and what regulations are put in effect by the federal government and what EPA's (Environmental Protection Agency's) stance is on coal generation. But we are looking pretty good."

At the Orangeburg Salvation Army, thrift store Manager Rebecca Wolfe said people are still struggling to meet their utility and housing needs.

"People still have not gotten caught up with everything," Wolfe said.

At her house, Deloris Darby says it does not seem to matter what the weather brings.

AIKEN SUSPECT, 2ND DEATH LINKED

Father cites son's
mental problems

AIKEN — A man accused of killing his girlfriend in Georgia and then gunning down a police officer in South Carolina had been dealing with mental problems before the slayings, the man's father said.

Police in South Carolina said Joshua Tremaine Jones, 26, faces charges of murder and possession of a firearm during the commission of a crime in the death of Aiken police Master Cpl. Sandra Rogers. He is expected to appear in court in Aiken on Monday, according to Magistrate Judge Tracey Carroll.

The South Carolina Law Enforcement Division said that Rogers was shot Saturday morning while responding to a report of suspicious activity. The 49-year-old had spent nearly 28 years with the Aiken Public Safety department.

Jones was arrested hours later in Eufaula.

James Jones, the suspect's father, told reporters that his son had past run-ins with the law and "was going through some mental problems," though he didn't elaborate on those problems. Jones said his son had run away from home and moved in with his girlfriend. He said his son is from North Augusta and briefly lived in Atlanta.

In neighboring Georgia, the Augusta Chronicle reported Jones also faces murder charges in the deaths of his girlfriend, 21-year-old Cayce Vice. Police found her body in her apartment Saturday morning after she didn't show up for work at a Five Guys restaurant. She had been shot in the head.

Richmond County Sheriff's Capt. Scott Peebles told the newspaper that the agency had obtained warrants for Jones for murder and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. Peebles confirmed that Vice had filed a complaint

The family will receive friends from 5-7 pm on Thursday, January 26, 2012 at Dunbar Funeral Home, Devine Street Chapel.

MSG Baker, husband of Mrs. Donnell Brazil Baker, died Friday, January 20, 2012. Born October 30, 1945 in Davenport, Iowa, he was a son of the late John Franklin Baker, Sr. and Mary Isabelle Enderton Baker. He graduated from Moline High School in 1966, and later took courses at the University of Hawaii. Baker entered the U.S. Army in Moline, Illinois, serving as a private in "A" Company, 2nd Battalion of the 27th Infantry, known as The "Wolfhounds". He served 300 missions as a "tunnel rat" in Vietnam, a soldier who entered Viet Cong tunnels searching out the enemy and destroying their caches of war material. In Vietnam, Baker took part in Operation Attleboro which began in September 1966. On November 5, 1966, Baker and his unit were called to assist another squad who were taking enemy fire. En route, his Company began to take fire and lost their lead soldier. Together with two other soldiers, Baker took over the head of the column and assisted in destroying two enemy positions. They were moving to take two others when a hand grenade knocked Baker off of his feet. 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several wounded. For these actions, he was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor by President Lyndon B. Johnson in 1968.

Baker made the military his career, retiring in 1989 after serving twenty four years of service for a country that he loved.

MSG Baker began working as a computer analyst at the Dorn Veterans Hospital in Columbia and retired after fifteen years of service. In 2008, the I-280 Bridge, connecting Davenport, Iowa with Rock Island, Illinois, was renamed the Sergeant John F. Baker, Jr. Bridge in his honor. In addition to serving as the Vice-President of the Congressional Medal of Honor Society, he served as a member on the Nation's Monuments and Cemeteries Committee. John was a member of the VFW, American Legion, Vietnam Veterans of America, 25th Infantry Division Association and the 27th Infantry Regiment Historical Society. As a member of the National Infantry Association, Order of St. Maurice, he was a recipient of the Primicerius Award, which is the highest designation for those who have made a significant and lasting contribution to the Infantry. He was a highly decorated veteran to include; Medal of Honor, Silver Star, Legion of Merit, Bronze Star and the Purple Heart. John was appointed as a Special Deputy with the Richland County Sheriff's Department. He was a collector of Eagles, and often supported Patriotic events at Fort Jackson and in the Midlands of South Carolina.

Surviving are his wife, Donnell G. Baker of Columbia; brothers, William Baker and Charles Baker both of Iowa; sisters, Marilyn Edwards of Oklahoma, Eleanor Gring, Mary Anne McCallum and Gloria Helfrich, all of Iowa; brother-in-law, Dennis M. Brazil of Nevada; numerous nieces, nephews, great-nieces and great-nephews. In addition to his parents, he was predeceased by his brothers, Milo Allison and Robert Drury.
