Times and Democrat: Pascoe lauds governor's domestic violence plan

South Carolina tops the U.S. in the number of women murdered by men, 1st Circuit Solicitor David Pascoe says. Additionally, it's ranked sixth highest for violent crime. "We have to reverse this trend," he said. According to Pascoe, Gov. Nikki Haley's 2016 executive budget may be a big part of the solution.

Note: Haley expressed her concern about the way abusers are prosecuted when she announced her plan early in January. "I was mortified when I learned that it was law enforcement who were prosecuting these cases," she said.

Note: Pascoe called Haley's budget the "most significant proposal I've seen come out of Columbia in my 11 years as solicitor on dealing with the domestic violence crisis and docketing issues we have in South Carolina."

Gov. Nikki Haley released a budget proposal Friday for the coming fiscal year that provides roughly \$350 million for roadwork and \$300 million on education initiatives. Her roughly \$7.5 billion recommendation for state taxes comes in a year when there's more than \$1 billion in additional revenue available to spend. Most of the windfall stems from years of conservative estimates by the state's economic advisers and carried-over surpluses.

Gov. Nikki Haley wants to start phasing in a 10 cent-a-gallon gas-tax increase and a huge cut to the state's income tax. Haley's proposal for the state budget, unveiled Friday, outlines her priorities for the state's fiscal year that starts July 1 — a year when the state will have more than \$1 billion in added revenues. S.C. lawmakers will begin writing the state budget next month.

Spending more money to address the state's crumbling roads and better funding for local government are among Gov. Nikki Haley's top priorities in this year's executive budget. Haley unveiled her spending priorities on the state's roughly \$7.5 billion budget Friday. The state has \$1.3 billion in new money and unspent funds this year.

Note: "If I allow just a gas tax to be out there, (legislators) would raise the gas taxes and they'd never cut taxes for taxpayers," Haley said. "The only way I can make sure I'm protecting the taxpayer is to say, 'OK, you want to raise the gas tax? You can do it by 10 cents, but you're going to cut income taxes by 2 whole percentage points.'"

Gov. Nikki Haley has released her fifth spending plan for state taxes in a year when there's more than \$1

billion in additional revenue. The Republican governor detailed her 2016-17 budget proposal Friday at the Statehouse.

Note: "The 1,000-year flood did have a cost to it. That was expected but as I said we were gonna try to cover it as much as we could so we didn't have to go to the feds," said Haley.

Note: The governor's proposal would put nearly \$400 million into transportation and road repair. "Let's quit talking about it. Let's put the money in there. Let's start fixing the roads by priority and let's see the improvements that have happened," she said.

Note: "The billion dollars that we gave to roads two or three years ago without raising taxes is just now going into effect. So you're just now seeing those orange cones."

Gov. Nikki Haley's proposed \$7.43 billion budget will recommend fully funding county and local governments across South Carolina for the first time since 2008, according to a detailed look into her budget proposal. Haley's budget puts an emphasis on five themes: education, public finance, public safety, flood recovery, and economic development.

Note: "We don't owe as much and we have more in savings as we need should something happen," Haley said. "After this past year -- when you think you have to dip into your reserves -- the fact that we didn't dip into our reserves, the fact we were able to pay for the flood tragedy and everything else that we dealt with shows that South Carolina is on good standing."

Gov. Nikki Haley announced her budget proposal for next year Friday at the Statehouse and it includes a gas tax increase to fix roads and an income tax cut. She says taxpayers would come out ahead because the income tax would be cut by \$131 million while the gas tax would go up by \$49 million.

Note: "I'm going to veto anything that is a net tax increase," she told reporters. "I'm just not going to have it when you've got \$1.3 billion in new money. I'm not going to do that to the taxpayers of this state."

Governor Nikki Haley released her executive budget Friday morning, prioritizing what she wants to get done with the \$1.3 billion in the state's added money. Among some of her top priorities for lawmakers were funding education, roads, flood recovery, and local governments and offering tax cuts.

Note: "Being able to cut our debt in half over the last five years, being able to double our reserves, that means something, and it means something to the taxpayers of South Carolina," Haley said. "Going through

a thousand year flood, that would have wiped out a lot of states. It didn't wipe us out, because we were ready, we were healthy."

Note: In dealing with the floods, Haley wants to cover FEMA's match at \$75 million, Department of Transportation's match at \$280 million (which includes \$231 million roads funding), \$40 million for beach renourishment, and \$700,000 to fund state dam inspectors.

Note: "Doing the ten cent gas tax increase and the two percentage income tax reduction, we wanted to show that it can be done, we wanted to show the general assembly how it can be done, and we hope they'll go with that."
