The State: Marion County lands record \$54 million plant, up to 215 jobs

The county with the state's worst unemployment rate will get a boost from a Florida food maker opening a plant in downtown Marion. Essex Holdings will spend \$54.4 million on a rice packaging and distribution plant that could employ up to 215 people, Gov. Nikki Haley and state commerce department officials announced Wednesday.

Note: Haley hailed the plant as a win for rural areas. Her foundation, called The Original Six, held in Marion County a health-and-job fair last year in Mullins, about 10 miles from Marion. Essex Holdings and its chief executive Navin Xavier have not donated to Haley's campaign, according to S.C. Ethics Commission records.

Note: There are bills pending that would raise the fuel tax and index it to inflation. Other bills would direct sales taxes on vehicles to road funding. Gov. Haley has talked about directing \$100 million of unanticipated revenues to DOT projects.

President Barack Obama repeatedly assured Americans that his sweeping health care reform initiative would not adversely affect their medical insurance. As he put it while pitching that proposal in July 2009: "If you've got health insurance, you like your doctors, you like your plan, you can keep your doctor, you can keep your plan. Nobody is talking about taking that away from you."

Note: Keep that presidential "stretch" in mind while pondering whether Gov. Nikki Haley has made the right call by rejecting pleas that South Carolina participate in Obamacare's Medicaid expansion. Keep in mind, too, that the ill effects induced by the Affordable Care Act aren't limited to rising insurance costs.

It would cost taxpayers \$17.3 million to upgrade the state's electronic voting machines to produce a paper record of votes, but a report by the Legislative Audit Council questions whether the investment would be worth the expense. The report notes that "without paper ballots, the reconstruction of the votes cast is not possible to help resolve disputed results. But the report says paper ballots "undermine the voting access of people with disabilities" and that hand counting ballots always introduces "human error."

Note: The State Election Commission sends a list every month to the Governor's Office of election officials who have not complied with certification standards. But Haley's office said they were "provided inaccurate information" by the State Election Commission, noting that 30 percent of the names on the list "were either back in compliance or had resigned." "Our office did in fact take action to resolve this issue," Swati Patel, the governor's chief legal counsel, wrote in a letter to the Legislative Audit Council.

The federal Defense of Marriage Act may be hanging by a thread after a Supreme Court oral argument Wednesday that exposed sharp divisions over the 1996 law prohibiting same-sex married couples from obtaining myriad federal benefits. A day after confronting California's Proposition 8, which bans same-sex marriage, justices showed similar splits over whether the federal government may deny benefits to couples married in the nine states that recognize gay marriage. The division during an unusually long oral argument largely fell along traditional lines, with Justice Anthony Kennedy once again holding the middle ground.
