Dear Governor Nikki Haley,

More than 10,000 Americans a year are killed in drunk driving crashes. And about 3,000 Americans like 7-year-old Zack Davis are killed every year by repeat drunk drivers. It is an outrage that drunk drivers can keep driving drunk until they kill someone. But we can prevent such tragedies, if we stop first-time offenders from becoming repeat offenders.

That is why I urge you to eradicate repeat-offender violations, injuries and deaths by ensuring that South Carolina require the use of ignition interlock devices for all drunk driving offenders and enforce this law. Until we eliminate drunk driving, none of us are safe. So please support the use of all-offender alcohol ignition interlocks now. Thank you.
