On September 12, 2013, an event, tentatively titled *Twenty Years of Mathematics and Science Reform*, is being planned to recognize the work done over the past two decades to help move mathematics and science forward in our state. The evening will bring together many of the key stakeholders, including K–12 educators, higher education leaders, members of the business community, and elected decision makers to celebrate the many successes made in STEM reform. The venue will also serve as a means to discuss ongoing efforts to transform the system using the resources available to us and consider where we'd like to be in 2033.

The planning team has asked that I extend an invitation to you on their behalf, adding that the event would not be the same without your involvement. Your participation would demonstrate the importance your administration places on STEM education and its impact on our economy, job creation, and the well being of our citizens.
