The "Spanish Mount" is a 4,000 year old Native American shell midden constructed by the Late Archaic Indians that you can see at Edisto Beach State Park. A shell midden is a mound of waste shells from mussels, oyster, and clams from past cultures. At one point the mound stood 20ft high and around a half an acre in diameter. An explorer in 1666 claimed that it could be seen from sea. Due to erosion by Scott Creek, the midden is now only a tenth of its original size. Other shell rings and middens are located throughout the Lowcountry and the Southeast, providing a glimpse into the past lives of the Native Americans who lived here.
