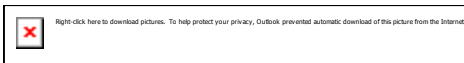

Virtual reality is becoming reality at Lehman College in New York City. The college, part of the City University of New York system, has teamed up with virtual reality software and solutions provider EON Reality Inc. to establish a new Interactive Digital Center. Plans also include development of a new Virtual and Augmented Reality [\(VR/AR\) Training Academy and Development Lab at Lehman College](#) and a new program to help develop applications for VR/AR students to use and learn about.
