Dear Governor Nikki Haley:

I'm inmate Lindsay Robinson Jr. and I'm currently serving a twelve year violent sixty-five percent prison term for a burglary and degree. My projected max out date for this charge is August 1st, 2018. I've been incarcerated since August 25th, 2012. I am currently 25 years of age with no children. I have a high school education. I went to the following high schools Batesburg-Leesville High School, Gilbert High School and Airport High School. I was in school all the way up to my twelfth grade year at Airport when I was arrested for burglary. I came to prison where I recieved my GED from Turbeville Correctional Institution in 2008. I have not went any further with my education because of my prior record as being a felon. Apon my release from prison I would like to enroll in college to become a registered nurse, buisness management, or to become apart of

the law enforcement division. Which has been my long time goal even before my days of getting into trouble. I didn't want to go to college and receive a degree in any of those following areas if I couldn't use the degrees to get a job or career that I like. Basically what I'm trying to ask in this letter to you is if I may be able to receive a pardon for my past felonies? That way upon my release from SCDC in 2018 I can go and enroll into college and obtain a degree in the area I like and move forward with my life. I lost my father in 2004 when I was fourteen years old, just two months after being shot in a drive by shooting. After that dramatic setback in my life I lost all hope and I turned to the wrong crowd of people, right along with drugs and alcohol. Which ultimately led to me being incarcerated two times for burglary. This is my final strike and refuse to ever come back to prison. I want to make a change not only in me but also in my future. All I have left in

my life is my mother who is 54 years old and my church family who is willing to help purposely to pursue my dream of going to college when I come home. I've made bad decisions in my life and regret everyone of them. But the biggest decision I have to make now is "change". I'm not sure how you will take this letter but I hope it would be for the good. I can only pursue my dream and a better future with the help of your pardon Governor Haley. Governor Haley it would be an honor to me and my mother if you would allow me to be pardoned for my past crimes. I look forward to hearing back from you on this matter.
